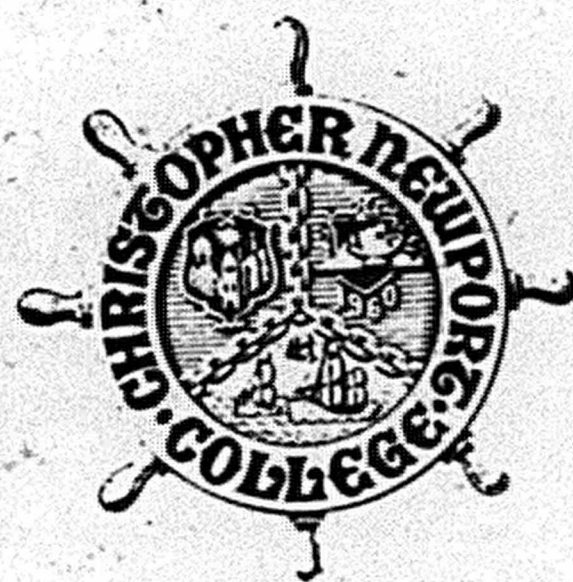

## Coach Vaughan has a hustle club

Determination. Defined by Webster as "a settling or ending of a controversy; a fixing of the position, the resolving of a question." Clearly looked at in light of last week's basketball victories and defeat, it's apparent that Bev Vaughan's Christopher Newport basketball team has resolved the fact that this word has become an ingredient of the team's cage actions.

First there is the point of resolving the question - can Christopher Newport beat the two North Carolina teams (UNC-G and Greensboro College) that they lost to in North Carolina? Answer - Friday night in Ratcliffe Gym the score was CNC 84 - UNC-G 82. Also in that same tone, on Saturday night, the score was CNC 75 - Greensboro College 67. So when you look at determination, you have to say that not only is the question resolved, but that a controversy has been ended. By the same token, determination can only be achieved when all surrounding factors are at the point that a smooth transition can take place and the determining factors are quelled. Such was not the case Wednesday night in the clash between Christopher Newport and Virginia Wesleyan.

Outside of the fact that the game could have gone either way, (the game was tied up five times and the lead changed hands seven times) the plaguing outside *constituent* seemingly lay in some very "questionable" calls by the officiating corps which led to a general disruption of the entire evening. As it turns out, the Captains ended the evening with a season high of 32 team fouls and fell to the Marlins 72-68.

Looking back at the two weekend games, in the Friday night affair against the University of North Carolina-Greensboro, the Captains showed a well-balanced attack both in scoring and in defense. The Ratcliffe gymnasium crowd was delighted by a hot-handed Dale Travis who scored 33 points (3 short of his previous career high of 36 last year). Also for

the loyal CNC fan was the opportunity to see Steve Brown ice the cake on his 1,000th career point as a Captain. Second highest in total points scored for the night was Ed McSweeney with 18. About McSweeney's play, Vaughan said, "He gave me heart failure several times on some of his jump shots and layups, but he did the job for us." The coach added, "The effort of Dale Travis is the best ever for a player at Ratcliffe Gym. All in all, I'd say we had a super effort."

On Saturday night, the Captains again came out victorious (75-67) over Greensboro College. The difference in this game however, was that for most of the game, Greensboro controlled the offense by staying on top of the score and penetrating the boards. It was not until 1:19 left in regulation that the Captains went ahead 66-65 on a John Paden field goal. After that, the Cagers never lost the lead and held onto the finals. Steve Brown led the comeback with 22, followed by Dale Travis with 16 and Dennis Casey with 10. "I couldn't be prouder of my kids," remarked Vaughan. "They never lost their composure, even when they were four or five points down. They never lost that competitive edge."

Wednesday night the Captains traveled over to Virginia Beach for a meeting with Virginia Wesleyan (The Captains had already beat Wesleyan at home 101-86). The dismal outcome was Virginia 72 - CNC 68. There were some bright sides to the loss, however. Christopher Newport shot a sparkling 49% from the floor and 80% at the foul line. The Captains also upped their rebound percentage, monopolizing the Marlins' boards 45-31. The unfortunate break for the Captains came as a result of the already mentioned "questionable" calls of the officials. There were entirely too many close calls with the advantage going over to the Marlins' squad. This reporter is not one to get down on the officials, but when bad calls are very obvious even to the "armchair" basketball watcher it's time that they be questioned. The loss didn't do anything to hurt CNC's chances in the playoffs, as the Captains held a sure lock on third place and assured themselves of that first round home game advantage in Ratcliffe Gym (see story in playoffs in this issue).

The biggest comment made by Coach Bev Vaughan and his staff was directed at the fan support driving CNC at the Virginia Wesleyan game. "I was most appreciative of the large number who showed up in response to our game with Virginia Wesleyan. It's not only encouraging to us as a staff, but your backing of this team means so much to them in their efforts. We wanted to win, but losing this one isn't going to get us down right here before the playoffs."

At press time, there was no word on the final regular season game with Randolph-Macon, but its importance is surely overshadowed by the up-coming Dixie Conference playoffs and tournament. Again it must be mentioned that your support of this team is imperative if the

## Tournament to be held at CNC

The Christopher Newport College Captains, by virtue of their 15-8 regular season record, have finished third in the top four teams of the Dixie Conference. In doing so, they qualified for a home spot in Ratcliffe Gym Wednesday night, February 23, against St Andrews College. The Captains split their two games this year with St. Andrews losing in North Carolina 93-85, but in a home game at Ratcliffe Gym they smashed the St. Andrews team 94-64.

The other Dixie Conference matchups have Averette (no. 8) against Methodist (no. 1); North Carolina Wesleyan (no. 7) versus Greensboro College (no. 2) and Virginia Wesleyan (no. 5) versus the University of North Carolina-Greensboro (no. 4).

The first round winners compete in the Dixie Conference semifinals February 25 at Virginia Wesleyan College (two games that night, one at 7 pm and one at 9 pm). The championship game will be played Saturday night February 26 at 8 pm. There is no consolation game.

When CNC makes that tournament, all of you fans who did not go to last Wednesday night's game at Virginia Wesleyan will want to know how to get to Virginia Wesleyan for the tournament. It's very simple to find. Take I-64 to Norfolk, after crossing the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel and stay on I64 until reaching

the Virginia Wesleyan College exit. The exit is a fair distance past the bridge, it is the same exit as the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel and the Lake Wright Motel. After leaving the ramp, the turn is approximately a half mile and there is a large sign reading "Virginia Wesleyan College." Please come out and support our team at this tournament, they really value and appreciate you doing it for them.

## Girl's basketball makes it at CNC

Being a first year coach for a college basketball team isn't easy. Add to this a predominantly Freshman squad and you hand the prospective coach an almost impossible task - especially when the team's previous record was not particularly remarkable. Terry Gooding was handed this task and has made it clear she is determined to make a name for women's basketball at CNC. She certainly has the background and credentials to do just that.

Ms. Gooding is a basketball star in her own right, having started for the ODU Lady Monarchs when they took the state title, and presently she is the leading scorer on her women's recreation basketball team. She also plays recreation softball where she is an outstanding and award winning outfielder.

Aside from her athletics, Ms. Gooding is also an elementary Physical Education resource teacher and a gymnastics coach at Ferguson High School. "I think I spread myself a little thin this year," comments Ms. Gooding. "Next year I'll have more time and energy for the basketball team." She also feels that next year will be better for the team too. "We're basically a Freshman team - which means we lack the college experience needed to make a contending team," reflects Coach Gooding. "Next year, with a year of experience under our belts and assuming that everyone from this year's squad is coming back, we will improve."

The team currently stands at 3-14, but as a few fans might be quick to point out, that record in no way reflects on the team's ability. They have lost seven games by less than five points in the closing minutes, so it is not as if they were getting blown away every game. It might be said that the team lacks the maturity to keep their composure when things get rough, but time and experience will cure this problem.

Leading CNC efforts are Freshman guards Allison Kinmonth and Joyce Harlow. Kinmonth is the team's leading scorer with an 11.9 average and leads in team assists. Harlow carries an 11.3 average and continues to put in clutch performances. She holds the team high scoring game with 39 points.

Also helping CNC efforts is Junior captain Karen Gleaton; who is the team's leading rebounder. She has been hampered somewhat this season, having to play half of the schedule

with a broken thumb. The thumb, however, has not bothered her in the blocked shot department - Karen has collected 23 so far this year. Defense is CNC's strong point. The Lady Captains play a very aggressive rotating zone. Leading the defense is Gail "Short Shot" Seiberlich, who is currently ranked third in the conference in steals.

Christopher Newport may not be a powerhouse in women's basketball now but anyone who knows anything about basketball can forecast a bright future for the Lady Captains. "You can't build a team overnight" adds Coach Gooding. Patience and recruiting have to be incorporated into a "gradual growing process."

And the Lady Captains are growing. "I'm very proud of them," comments the men's basketball mentor Bev Vaughn. "People are now saying CNC has a girl's basketball team." And the girl's basketball team would be quick to agree "Damn Right!"

The fund drive's main purpose is to raise money for the continued improvement of the educational programs here at CNC. The fifth is CAPTAIN'S CREW. These donations will do much to improve the athletic programs at CNC.



Applications and information on all programs are available in the Financial Aid Office. Students are encouraged to apply.

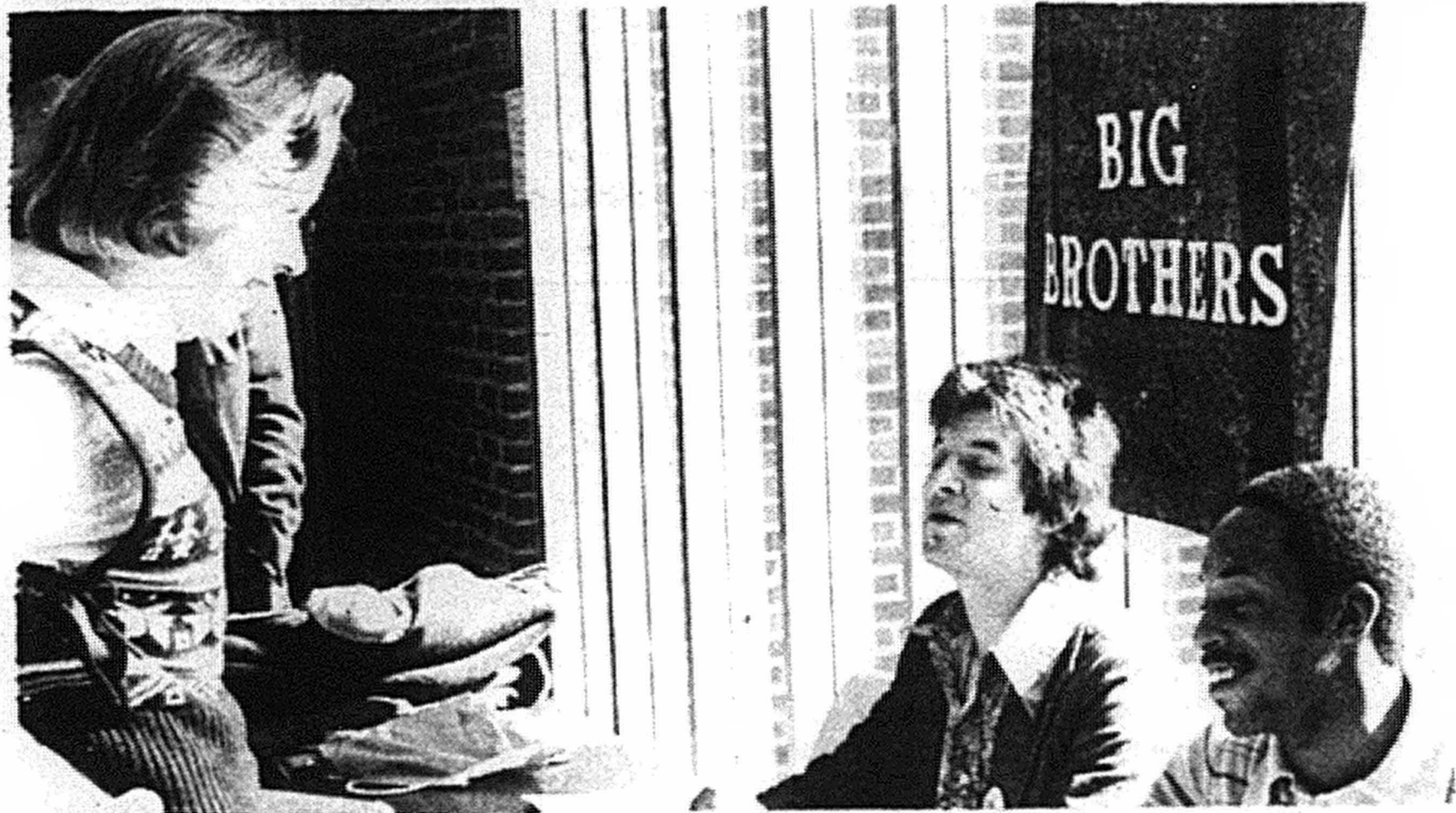
### Tennis Courts Open Friday
