# Exxon awards grant to CNC, writing program to undergo study

The Council of Writing Program Administrators has selected Christopher Newport College to receive a grant (funded through the Council by the Exxon Education Foundation). The grant covers the cost of the honoraria for consultants who will review and evaluate the writing program of the College and offer advice on its development.

The two members of the consultation-evaluation team are Dr. Mary Jane Schenck of the University of Tampa and Dr. John Trimbur of Boston University.

One member of the team will visit the campus for a day this spring to set in motion the production of a self-study for the writing program. After the completion of the self-study and its submission to the consultants, both Drs. Schenk and Trimbur will make an evaluation visit to our campus. Within six months after receiving this report, the College is required to prepare a written statement assessing the evaluation visit and its impact on the writing program.

This grant comes at a par-

ticularly opportune time for the College. The new curriculum will go into effect next year. A committee has been appointed to make recommendations regarding the development and use of a Writing Proficiency requirement for all CNC students. Reports on undergraduate education have, like our own College-wide Self-Study, ushered in a period of self-reflection for higher education.

Details of schedule shall be worked out in the next two-three weeks and shall be reported in the *Chronicle*.

### **Bridges scholarship created**

### "Explosive" drama opens Feb. 7





# Students don't agree with name change

Walking across campus on the first day of the spring semester, a student stopped me and asked, "Where is Newport Hall?"

"This is it," I answered, pointing to the building next to us. "But this is McMurran Hall," he

I replied, "Yes, but it's Newport Hall." To me it will always be Newport Hall.

Lewis A. McMurran was a legislator who helped lobby to establish CNC as a four-year state college, and the name of Newport Hall was recently changed to honor him. He was a man who deserved respect; maybe he deserved to be honored. But does Christopher Newport, the eminent historical figure deserve to be pushed aside, to be less honored?

One student commented that other colleges do not have buildings with the same name as the institution. I have one comment to that: so what?

Christopher Newport College was named such in recognition of the man who is part of our local heritage. And Newport Hall was, at least to me, part of the college's heritage. I interviewed several students, asking if they knew who Lewis A. McMurran was. Without exception, the answer was no. Most of the students say they know now and agree that maybe he deserved recognition for his contribution to the college. But every student opposed the name change.

Why deny Christopher Newport the recognition given him by changing the name of the building? There are three unnamed buildings on campus; recognition could have been given to Mr. McMurran through one of these buildings without causing the present rancor caused by changing the name of Newport Hall.

William Scott Simkins, a senior at CNC, said, "McMurran needed to be honored, but not by destroying tradition; I don't think he would have wanted that."

Adrienne Horrell, another CNC senior, said, "Why should they change the name of that building (Newport Hall)? Why didn't they name the New Science Building after him? They should honor Christopher Newport too."

I also spoke with a member of the Board of Directors of the Alumni Association. He said, "I was not aware that a name change was being made. I would also generally disapprove of such a change unless it is the consensus opinion of students and alumni that such a change is appropriate. Students who come here in five or ten years hence probably will not know who Mr. McMurran is, nor will they care, nor will they attempt to find out. This is the case with the present students and alumnni."

I am not trying to show Mr.
McMurran any disrespect. It is
distressing that his name should
be the subject of such dissatisfaction. I restate that Mr. McMurran
may deserve the hnonor of having one of our buildings dedicated
in his name, but not at the cost
of disgracing Mr. Newport's.

I can only echo the opinions of Simkins and the alumni member that the students, alumni and staff should have been consulted. As Simkins said, "It's our school too."

It is too late to rectify the name change. To do so would show disrespect to both Mr. McMurran and Mr. Newport. To name another building after Newport now would only be a mere consolation. It is a shame that two honorable men should have such a controversy cast over their names.

# Student support needed to prevent CNC's "death spiral"

By now everyone has heard about the threatening "death spiral" of CNC through former Governor Charles S. Robb's proposed budget cuts. If these cuts go into effect, CNC staff could be cut by 32.5 positions in the next two years. This means that some classes will have to be dropped, which means a loss of 322 students, which in turn means a risk of losing \$1.2 million revenue from tuition. In years to follow, more positions will have to be cut, more students will be lost as will more revenue. This will continue until, well...the future is not bright. This is the death spiral.

It should be recognized that CNC is a commuter college with almost twice the average percentage of part-time enrollment in state colleges, and almost twice the average percentage of partime faculty. It should be recognized in the budget guidelines that CNC serves a different mission than other state colleges and universities.

CNC Rector Stephen Halliday offers an alternative to these cuts: he asks that the Ballies administration support "level funding" for the next two years in which appropriations would not grow, but CNC would not suffer the cuts. During this time, the college can concentrate on enrollment and the state's college-financing guidelines can be reexamined by the State Council of Higher Education and the General Assembly.

What can we do about the situation? Well, already petitions have been circulated around campus protesting the cuts. We can sign the petitions. And we can personally write to our state legislators.

It has taken a long time for CNC to rise to the status it now has. We have all been a part of its growth. Are we just going to sit back and watch all that we have worked for slowly disappear? The more letters state legislators receive, the more attention they are likely to give to the problem.

Much has been said about apathy at CNC, but if we do not support our college now, soon there may be nothing left to be concerned about.



### Sexton to Circle Jerks, music alternatives to please all

Since this is the beginning of a new year, many music listeners will once again be frantically looking for the next "big thing." For 1986 there are quite a few contenders already on their way. Some are good, some real good, and some should have tried last year, so we wouldn't have to listen to them this year.

A possible big winner in the last category is the latest in the unending string of pinup/lonely/ leather-clad/young bad boys, Charlie Sexton. His first album. Pictures for Pleasure, delivers what it promises, and not much else. The gloroius black and white photography of Charlie S., age 17, promises him several years in the poster business. This can only add to an obviously well planned business career in

the music world. He's got the face, the look, the videos, and of course, the almost ridiculously long, continuous eighties-style big drums over disco rhythm. Indecipherable "Matt Dillon" mumbles and regular formula production make Pictures for Pleasure the most boring album released so far this year, which means he will probably hit the Top 10 soon. The inside lacket lists Charlie S. as playing nearly every instrument, including "drum tracking." Perhaps this is why each song sounds like a watereddown version of the single 'Beat's So Lonely." Corey Hart fans and Rick Springfield fans will love him.

Charlie Sexton and the other pretty-pretty bad boys may not be the next "big thing," but some

real bad boys from Boston and Minneapolis certainly have a change. The Del Fuegos second LP, Boston, Mass., is the energyloaded follow-up to their 1984 debut, Longest Day. From the electric pluckings of "Don't Run Wild," to "Hand in Hand" and "It's Alright," and the hungry pleas of "I Still Want You" and 'Coupe de Ville," the double guitar lineup of brothers Dan and Warren Zanes, delivers without taking time to make the promises. This album will please any one who likes good Tom Pettyish rock and roll. The Del Fuegos will open ears in 1986.

Another ear-opener this year will be the Replacements, led by young Paul Westerberg. Many of their fans worried at the news of their signing to Sire Records, but all fears were washed away by the sweat, tears, and blood pouring off the 'Mats new album, Tim. The album is a landmark on the rock and roll-horizon. It has everything that the 'Mats do the best, which is party, fight, drink, cry, laugh, and then vomit all over themselves. Their music is raw and played straight from the guts. It is dirty and unclean when dealing with the power of rock and roll, and shining above the music are the incredibly wise observations of Paul Westerberg. His retrospective good-old-boy alcoholic in "Here Comes a Regular" opens up the listener to what might have been missed in Springsteen's often misinterpreted "Glory Days." Those with a taste for hard, fast rock will gladly receive "Dose of Thunder,"

"Bastards of Young," and "Lay it Down Clown." Some good toungein-cheek numbers include "I'll Buy" and "Waitress in the Sky." This album will never disappoint the listener.

Some other good albums recently release are the Dead Kennedys' Frankenchrist, and the Circle Jerks' Wonderful. Look out for the Circle Jerks' single 'Makin' the Bombs" as well.

Do you like to dance? The new 12" singles by the Cult, Siouxie and The Banshees, and New Order are dominating the dance clubs in New York and all are worth the \$4 they cost.

The next "big thing" here at home is the release of Waxing Poetics' first single. "Hermatage" is a great song, and the single comes with a lyric sheet so listeners can sing along. It's available at Tracks for about two bucks. Pick it up, give it a listen, and treck out to Norfolk and see


Hot handed Jerome Nicholson had a hot hand Saturday night and continued to hit for a big win over Averett Monday.
