

Weekdays the library remains open until 10pm about which is great for night students who then have no time to research papers because that's the very time class is let out. The majority of night students hold down full-time jobs and are therefore unable to utilize the library during the day.

Many day students have similar situation except thay work until 9 or 10 p.m. In both instances the student has no opportunity to effec-

tively use library facilities.

It seems reasonable that the library could extend its operating hours to 11 p.m. Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, and noon to 11 p.m. Sunday. A few additional operating hours at the library would enable many students to complete assignments and study without undue pressure.



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
