A New Club is Born

A Modern Language Club is being formed here at Christopher Newport College. This club is designed to promote understanding and interaction among students interested in the fields of English, French, German, and Spanish; and to provide an opportunity to practice speaking and gain proficiency in these languages.

Discussion topics will include literature culture, art, and social issues as well as linguistic analysis of the languages.

The club will have four sections which will meet separately, and be conducted in the language of that group. The English section will provide an excellent opportunity for any foreign student, regardless of linguis-

tic background, to improve his proficiency in English.

The other groups will give language-oriented students practice in expressing ideas in Spanish, French, or German. One may participate in one group or any combination of groups.

There will be a questionnaire distributed in all language classes on which you will be asked to indicate which times are convenient to meet for the purpose of electing officers. These forms are available through the language dept. faculty for those who are not presently in a foreign language course. A date will be set sometime during the week of October 29th.

'American Odyssey' is Challenging

Editorials**LIBRARY SHOULD EXTEND HOURS**

Andrew Carnegie stressed that "A library is the most democratic form of education." The basic notion which underlies this statement maintains not only the existence of a physical structure containing assorted volumes on numerous subjects, but also--and more importantly--the availability of the material to the public.

The availability of material in the Captain John Smith Library is unceasingly mystifying merely because it is acutely inadequate. The lack of material on subjects is probably not wholly the fault of the librarians. Slim budgets determine policies and acquisitions for the library more so than the ideas of the librarians who would be more than willing to expand with the needs of the CNC community.

Nevertheless, the major problem is the library's unreliable and short hours of operation. According to posted hours, the library is open until 5 p.m. Friday. I clearly remember one Friday when I walked up to the main circulation desk at 4:45 p.m. to return two books due that day -- and I certainly couldn't sleep

Ms. Golos hopes to enable the audience to "walk a mile in their shoes," and to explain how the committee seeks to relieve some of the prisoner's problems.

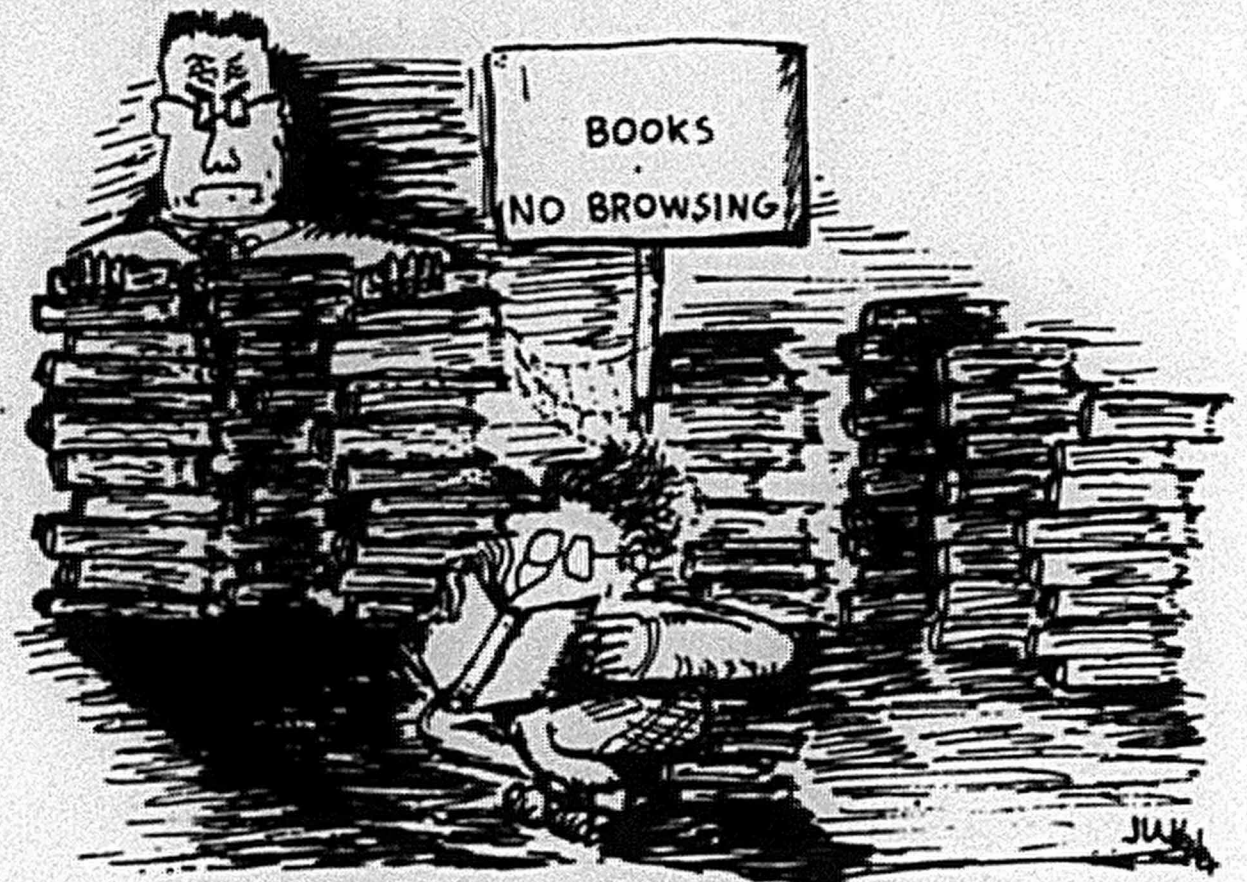
A question and answer period will follow the discussion.

Weekdays the library remains open until 10pm which is great for night students who then have no time to research papers because that's the very time class is let out. The majority of night students hold down full-time jobs and are therefore unable to utilize the library during the day.

Many day students have similar situation except they work until 9 or 10 p.m. In both instances the student has no opportunity to effectively use library facilities.

It seems reasonable that the library could extend its operating hours to 11 p.m. Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, and noon to 11 p.m. Sunday. A few additional operating hours at the library would enable many students to complete assignments and study without undue pressure.

Coming to CNC as Assistant Professor of Chemistry is Dr. C. Ken Chang. He received his Ph.D. degree in Chemistry from the University of Notre Dame at Notre Dame, Indiana. He received a grant from the National Research Council-National Academy of Science, and he has done postdoctoral research work at NASA.

Joining the Biology Department as Acting Instructor in Biology is Dr. Horton Holcombe Hobbs, III. He received his A.B. degree from the University of Richmond, his M.S. degree at Mississippi State College and his Ph.D. degree in Zoology at Indiana University at Bloomington.
