

1990 State Fair Leave Suspended

For the past several years, questions have been raised about the propriety and equity of the one-half day of paid leave that state employees have been given to attend the State Fair. An inequity exists between state employees working close to Richmond and those working in areas of the Commonwealth where State Fair attendance is not feasible. This inequity, along with the current budget situation, compels the Commonwealth to discontinue the practice of giving State Fair leave.

The estimated cost for employees time off to attend the State Fair is approximately \$500,000 (\$502,040 = average hourly wage of \$11.41 x 4 hours x 11,000, the approximate number of employees attending the fair). As agencies search for alternatives to absorb budget cuts, a moratorium on state fair leave is seen as a prudent way to conserve substantial funds.

This year's dates for the fair are September 20 through September 30, which includes two weekends. Additionally, the fair is open until 11:00 p.m. each week night. Many activities are scheduled during the evenings for those who wish to avoid the heavier crowds during weekends. Employees who prefer to attend the fair during work hours, with their supervisors' approval, must now charge this time to annual, compensatory, or overtime leave, or to leave without pay, as appropriate.



"DR. EARTH" AWARDED GOVERNORS'S CERFIFICATE

Christopher Newport College's Dr. Harold N. Cones Jr., dubbed "Doctor Earth" by a local radio station, has been awarded a Certificate of Recognition from Gov. L. Douglas Wilder.

Cones, chairman of the Department of Biology, Chemistry and Environmental Sciences has been a CNC professor for more than 20 years and has dedicated a great deal of his personal and professional life to environmental protection and conservation.

"I am very pleased to receive the Governor's Certificate of Recognition for my environmental work, although I did nothing special to receive it -- only what I have been doing since I came to CNC in 1968," he said. "I, of course, am honored to receive this special certificate, but more than that, I am most honored that there are others who believe enough in what I am doing to go to bat for me."
