1979-80 Faculty Contracts

It is expected that faculty contracts for the 1979-80 academic year will be issued by 13 April.

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Reorganization

The reorganization of the College which is to be effected on 1 July, 1979, will not involve any major change in the policies and procedures of the College relating to faculty personnel matters as set forth in the "Standards" document nor in curriculum matters, nor in faculty participation in governance.

The business of the Faculty will be conducted at College-wide Faculty meetings, the divisional structure of elected Faculty committees will be retained, and proposals regarding the curriculum will go through the current channels - i.e., from the department, through the appropriate division (or School of Business and Economics), to the Faculty Curriculum Committee. The Curriculum Committee will then make its recommendations to the Faculty as a whole for its consideration and action.

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Search Committees

The search committees which are to identify the top candidates for the positions of Dean of the School of Liberal Arts, Sciences, and Education and Dean of the School of Business and Economics will be formed and the membership announced in a few days. The qualifications required of applicants will also be announced and the positions advertized shortly.

Interested and qualified faculty members and administrators are encouraged to apply once the searches are underway.

The first presentation in this year's Biology seminar series will be given on Friday, 30 March, 1979, at 4:00 P.M. in Gosnold 145.

Dr. Georgia Lesh-Laurie, Professor and Chairman, Department of Biology and Health Science at Cleveland State University, Cleveland, Ohio, will speak on the subject "Models for Cellular Differentiation." Dr. Lesh-Laurie has had numerous articles based on her research published in various professional journals, and is a consultant to eight well-known publishing houses.

Support for Field Research

Interested faculty in need of funds and volunteers to support their field research investigations should contact The Center for Field Research in Belmont, Mass. This private, non-profit organization has raised over \$2 million to support over 350 research expeditions in 25 states and 48 countries. The funds and field staff to assist Principal Investigators are raised through private subscription, i.e., interested citizens who have the time and talent to help scientific investigation and who are willing to make a contribution to project costs.

Working in cooperation with EARTH-WATCH, a national volunteer organization, The Center subsidizes over 65 expeditions annually in the following disciplines: anthropology, archaeology, art history, astronomy, biology, botany, cartography, conservation, ethology, folklore, geography, geology, historic preservation, marine sciences, medicine, meteorology, musicology, ornithology, public health, sociology, zoology.

Preliminary Proposals of two pages should cite research objectives, project dates, and the need for funds and volunteers. After favorable review of the Preliminary Proposal, Center staff will invite a Formal Proposal, which must precede field work by nine months.

Formal Proposal Deadlines are: May 15 and October 1.
