It all starts at 11:30 a.m. with a cookout planned by the Over-the-Hill Gang in the grassy area between Ratcliffe and Gosnold. "Little Big Band, booked by the Gang as a "swing band," will be featured. Then, at approximately 12:45, parachutists from the Fort Monroe area sport parachute Club will prepare to jump. The ROTC will assault CNC by air in a demonstration at 2:00. Their simulated assault will feature CNC students as well as William and Mary cadets. There will be two air assault groups. Air attack group A, led by Cadet Lt. Brett Griffin, includes Herb Charity, Mike Edwards, Ken Foley, and Jeff Splenger; Cadet Lt. Larry Percecko will lead air attack group B, made up of Lance Wilson, Vic Southern, Dan Felker, and Jeff Thompson.

When the simulated attack is completed, all ROTC display materials will be left for public inspection until 4:00.

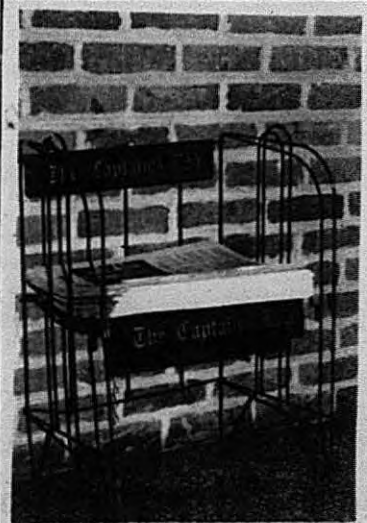
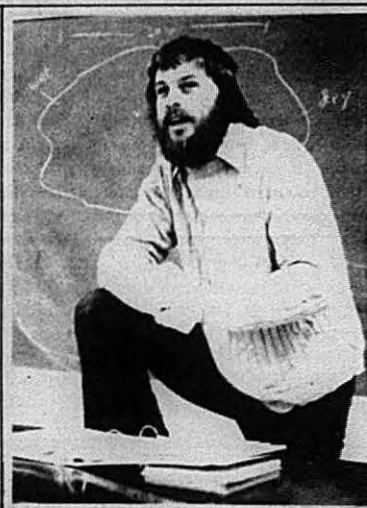

Registrar's Office offers hints

The Registrar's Office provides the following information for all new students, or for those who are confused about registration procedures.

Change of Name and/or Address and Status

Students who wish to make a change in their name because of marriage, divorce, or spelling must fill out a form that is found in a brown wooden box in the Registrar's Office. On that same form is also a place in which one can make corrections in address or phone number. These forms must be filled out in order for any changes to be made in our records and in the computer.

Students who wish to declare a major and have an advisor must fill out a form that is next to the brown wooden box on the counter in the Registrar's Office. Changes made on your registration form are not always changed in our system; they must be done on the proper forms.

Any student who plans to graduate in May 1981 must be classified 30 semester hours (at least two semesters) before graduation. A student who wishes to change from unclassified to classified must come into the Admissions Office and pay a \$10.00 fee. Also, seniors must come in and fill out an intent to graduate form at least one semester before they are to graduate (i.e., if you are due to graduate in May 1981, you must turn in your intent to graduate form at the beginning of this semester). These forms are to be returned to Mrs. Ella Walker Mitchell.

If you have any questions concerning the above information, you may find answers on pages 8 and 9 of the CNC College Catalog 1979-1981, or feel free to come to either the Admissions Office or the Registrar's Office for the answers.

Add/Drop (Schedule Changes) or Withdrawal Policy

Students who wish to add and/or drop a class may do so Sept. 2-4 and 8, 1:00-7:00 p.m.; and Sept. 5, 1:00-5:00 p.m. in the Campus Center Theatre. To do so you must fill out an add/drop form which can be obtained either in the Campus Center at the area of add/drop or from a brown wooden box in the Registrar's Office. When filling out the form, be sure you write the correct course department, number and section. The refund policy (which appears on page 3 of Registration News, is as follows:

1. A class or classes cancelled or moved at the option of the college: 100%.
 2. A student who drops or withdraws from school before classes begin receives 90%.
 3. A student who drops or withdraws during the first week of classes, through Sept. 8, 80%.
 4. A student who drops or withdraws during the second week of classes, through Sept. 22, 60%.
 5. A student who drops or withdraws during the third week of classes, through Sept. 22, 40%.
 6. A student who drops or withdraws during the fourth week of classes, through Sept. 29, 20%.
 7. A student who drops or withdraws after the fourth week of classes, 0%.
 8. NO refunds for non-credit courses
 9. Last day to drop/withdraw without academic penalty, Nov. 3.
 10. Refunds come from the state and take 6-8 weeks to be processed.
- Students who withdraw from a class during the refund period do not receive any grade or a W on their permanent record card (PRC).

legally completely, you must do the necessary paperwork. This requires coming into the Registrar's Office and asking for an add/drop (schedule change) form, filling it out, getting the proper signature(s) when necessary, and returning the form to the Registrar's Office. If the proper paperwork is not done, *F's* will be assigned automatically.

noon to 12 midnight, Monday through Thursday. When Wednesday night activities take over the cafeteria and the Pub, the Pub remains open until 1:00 a.m. On Fridays, the Pub closes at 8:00 p.m.

Students frequenting the Pub must have a valid CNC I.D. card and, to drink beer, they must be 18 years of age. As always, the Pub "retains the right to refuse service to anyone at any time."

Get your "sticker"

Another of those "can't get along without" items is the parking sticker, which is required of all students, faculty and staff.

To obtain a parking sticker, each student must fill out a card at the Campus Center Information Desk. Information required on the card includes name, address, and phone number; status (student, faculty, or staff); and license number, make, and model of the vehicle.

There is a misprint in the *Parking and Driving Regulations* pamphlet regarding fees for parking stickers. The costs:

September 1-August 31: \$2.00

January 1-August 31: \$1.50

June 1-August 31: \$1.00

The bumper sticker is required for security reasons. It prevents use of the parking lots by unauthorized persons. Vehicles without parking stickers displayed on the left rear bumper will be ticketed. Ticket fees and all rules govern-

I.D. opens doors for CNC students

An I.D. card is an important thing to have. A valid, current CNC I.D. card is required to check out books from the library, for admission to dances and social functions, to be served alcohol in the Pub, to cash checks in the bookstore and the business office, and for security reasons. An I.D. is required of all students.

Getting one made is a painless experience. It takes about ten minutes and costs \$2.00. After the initial fee, there is no further charge. Each semester thereafter a new sticker is placed over the current sticker--15 seconds of effort. The only documents required are a driver's license and some proof of registration. The schedule from September 2 through 12 is:

M/W: 9:00-11:00 a.m.; 12 noon-2 p.m.

T/Th: 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.

MTWTh: 6:00-9:00 p.m.

A reminder to all current students:

Renew your I.D. cards! Present proof of registration and your I.D. card at the Campus Center Information Desk any time in the near future.

The Office of Career Planning and Placement was established in 1966 to help students who are seeking part-time and full-time employment. Students have been assisted by the Placement Office in gaining employment in many places, some of which include the A & N Store, Crown Service Station, Fidelity American Bank, James River Convalescent Center, Johnson-Noosinger Associates, Mariner's Museum, and Phillip Levy. The Office of Career Planning and Placement also has an extensive library to assist the students in deciding on a career. The latest additions to the library are the 1981 *College Placement Annuals*. 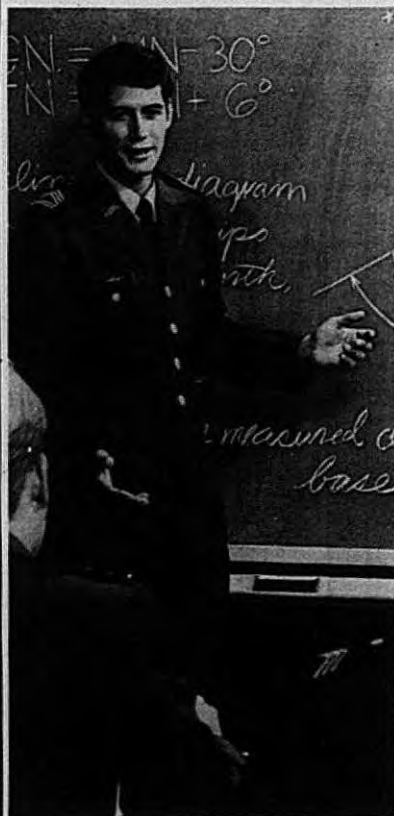
A piano is available for those who wish to bring their own accompanists. Audition pieces may include any selection that best indicates the performer's singing ability.

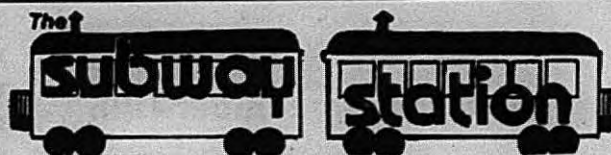

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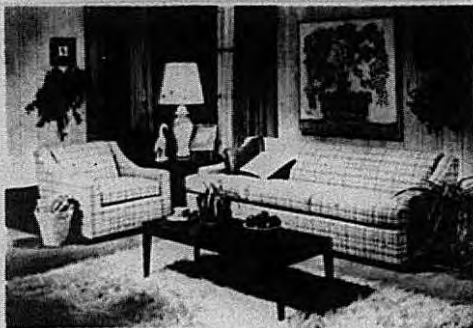
