Dean's Colloquia Call for Papers and Nomination of Speaker -- The Dean's Colloquia Committee, in preparation for the 1994-95 academic year, is now calling for papers, and nominations for an outside speaker, to be presented as part of next year's program.

Members of the CNU faculty who wish to submit proposals should keep in mind the criteria used by the Committee in making its selections:

- 1. Scholarly in nature and the product of original research and creativity.
- 2. Suitable to and understandable by a general collegiate audience.
- 3. Similarity to or dissimilarity from recent presentations in the series.

Proposals should include a brief resume of the faculty member and a precis of the proposed lecture. Other significant materials may be attached.

The Committee is also calling for nominations for an off-campus speaker for next year's series. Again, the speaker and his/her subject should be academic in nature and suitable to a collegiate audience. Please include a brief bio. of the speaker nominated and some indication as to the subject(s) he/she may address.

In order to be considered, all proposals must be received by Jim Morris, Chairman, Dean's Colloquia Committee, by Friday, April 22, at the latest. The committee will meet the following week to make its selections for the 1994-95 academic year, and all faculty members submitting proposals will be notified of its selections soon thereafter.

Faculty members whose proposals are selected for presentation will receive an honorarium of \$500.




