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Academic Organization; Deans' Offices

After appropriate study and consultation, the President has directed that the VPAA devise for the consideration of the Board of Visitors a plan which organizes the seventeen departments of the School of Liberal Arts, Sciences, and Education into-at minimum--two separate schools, each headed by a dean, and each coequal in organizational status with the School of Business and Economics. This same directive invites concurrent recommendations concerning the conditions of service and selection of school deans (in particular, on the question of whether school deans ought to be appointed from the ranks of the Faculty to prescribed terms of service). These proposals must be submitted to the President early in the week of January 31, 1983.

This office has already requested the formal counsel and assistance of those officers and committees of the College most directly involved. By this announcement, individual members of the Faculty are also invited to share their thinking concerning the criteria that should be used in determining the new organization and the conditions of service and selection that should apply to the office of dean.

It would be especially helpful if such contributions to this process were committed to writing and were submitted to this office no later than Wednesday, January 26, 1983.

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Radio License Renewal

Several State agencies have been contacted by an organization identifying itself as "Federal Licensing, J.V. Renewal Division" and soliciting fees for services in connection with renewal of federal radio licenses. This operation has been the subject of investigation by U.S. Postal Inspectors; it is therefore important to insure that no payment or other response is made to this organization and that we are aware of any current or future attempts at solicitation. If, therefore, you become aware of the receipt by any state agency of such a request, please see that the entire correspondence is forwarded to this office immediately, in order that we may determine the appropriate action to be taken.

No fees of any kind are required to be paid to any federal agency or any other party in regard to renewal of radio licenses. Any state agency holding a current radio license should, within 120 days or no less than 60 days prior to the end of the license term, contact the Department of Telecommunications (DOT), so that we may file a renewal application with the Federal Communications Commission, who will send the re-

newed license directly to the state agency. The DOT is also building a file of all state radio licenses, in order that we may initiate renewal requests in the future without the necessity of any action on the part of the other state agencies.

Authority on China to Speak at CNC this Sunday -- 12/5/82 -- 2:15 PM

On Sunday afternoon, December 5th, at 2:15 PM, in the Administration Auditorium, Michael Lindsay will speak on how changes in the Chinese Communist Party have influenced Sino-American and Sino-Soviet relationships. All members of the CNC community are invited to attend this event which is co-sponsored by the Political Science Department and the Peninsula Chapter, United Nations Association, U.S.A.

Michael Lindsay (Lord Lindsay of Birker) is a Professor Emeritus of The American University in Washington, D.C., and a most unconventional man who is a recognized authority on the Peoples Republic of China. His experience with the Chinese people began in 1937 when he arrived at what is now Peking University to teach economics. Soon he

found himself supporting the Chinese Communists in their resistance against the Japanese who had invaded Northern China. He supported the anti-Japanese guerrillas at a time when such support entailed only hardships and dangers. On Pearl Harbor Day, 1941 he and Mrs. Lindsay escaped capture by the Japanese forces and began a four-year effort in Yenan Province in support of Mao Tse-tung's forces.

After World War Two, Professor Lindsay continued his teaching career with appointments in England, at Harvard University (1946-47), and the Australian National University (1951-59). From 1959 to 1974 he served as Professor of Far Eastern Studies at The American University in Washington, D.C. He is the author of numerous articles and several books including What's Wrong With Communism (1976), Educational Problems in Communist China (1950), and China and the Cold War (1955) among others.

COMMITTEE INFORMATION & FACULTY BUSINESS

Minutes of the Christopher Newport College Faculty

November 12, 1982

The regular meeting of the Christopher Newport College Faculty was held November 12, 1982 in room 125 of Christopher Newport hall. Vice President for Academic Affairs, Richard Summerville, presided.

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 3:01 PM.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Minutes of the October meeting were approved by voice vote.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

- A. For the Faculty Advisory Committee the Chairman, Ms. Daly, informed the membership that reports from the Committee will appear in the current (November 12) issue of the <u>CNC Chronicle</u>. Ms. Daly also reported informally on the meeting of FAC representatives, Jean Pugh and Ms. Daly, with the Board of Visitors' Committee on Academic Affairs.
- B. Representing the Curriculum Committee, Mr. Morgan reminded the membership that the Committee will accept course and program proposals at any time.
- C. For the Degrees Committee the Chairman, Mr. Paul: "The Faculty should be advised that there is an error in the Distribution Requirements for the School of Business and Economics. The 1982-1983 Catalog states that 'Math 110 is required of students not exempted from College Algebra' (p. 174.) This policy has not yet been approved by the full faculty. The approved policy is that Math 110 is recommended."
- D. For the Admissions Committee, Mr. Butchko reported that the Committee is preparing a report concerning admissions policies.
- E. For the Academic Status Committee, Mr. Buoncristiani: "No report."
- F. For the Nominations Committee, Mr. Herrmann: "No report."
- G. For the Faculty Evaluation Committee, Mr. Coker: "No report."
- H. For the ad hoc Committee on Faculty Bylaws, the Chairman, Mr. Morris requested guidance from the faculty for his Committee's charge. In particular, the Committee found difficulty with the phrases, "...is compatible with the College Handbook..." and "...reflects the current thinking of the Faculty".* It was the consensus of the Faculty that the favored procedure would be to first locate fundamental differences in concepts held by the faculty with those expressed in the new handbook and to then reconcile the language of the two documents.

OLD BUSINESS

Motion by Mr. Sacks on behalf of the Task Force on Policies Affecting the Faculty that: "The Faculty endorse and recommend to the Handbook Committee the amending of the College Handbook, section V-B-4, by replacing pages V-16 to V-20 with the statement published in the CNC Chronicle of November 5, 1982 (#29 of 1982) beginning on page 7, line one...4...TENURE and continuing to the bottom of page 8."

Motion by Ms. Daly on behalf of the FAC to amend the motion as follows: "On page 7, line 3 strike contract insert appointment."

Action Motion to amend was approved by voice vote.

Motion by Ms. Daly on behalf of the FAC that: "On page 8, line 15 strike quality, insert overall performance."

Action Motion to amend carried by voice vote.

Motion by Ms. Daly on behalf of the FAC that: "The following paragraph from 'the pink pages' be inserted at the beginning of the discussion on tenure:

Christopher Newport College accepts the principle of tenure and the associated contractual rights thereunto appertaining, as defined in the Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure of the American Association of University Professors (1940). While the College, as a State institution, cannot issue contracts beyond the limits of the State provisions, an appointment with tenure is a continuing appointment which may be terminated by the College only for adequate cause, or by retirement, or under extraordinary circumstances because of financial exigency."

Action The motion to amend was approved by voice vote.

Action The main motion as amended carried by voice vote.

Motion by Mr. Sacks on behalf of the Task Force that: "The following statement be added to step 11 of the evaluation procedure:

If the basis for a probationary appointment is diminished due to declining enrollment patterns, previously anticipated fiscal constraints, or other institutional considerations, notification to this effect is provided in writing to the affected faculty member at the earliest opportunity, but no later than the time of tendering the next contract."

Action The motion carried by voice vote.

Motion by Morgan on behalf of the Curriculum Committee that the seven new courses named and described on pages 5 and 6 of the Nov. 5 1982 CNC Chronicle (#29 of 1982) be approved by the Faculty. A separate motion was presented for each of the seven courses and in each case the motion carried by voice vote.

ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 3:55 PM.
