The Department of Information Technology signed a contract for a new Standard Feature Package with C&P Telephone Company effective January 28, 1985 at a reduced cost to the State.

Call Forwarding Variable has been added as part of the standard offerings in the package and included as part of the main line cost for all unrestricted lines. For those unfamiliar with the feature, it enables you to have all your incoming calls ring at another telephone on campus or off campus by using the following procedures:

To have all your incoming calls ring at another telephone on campus:	to activate:	DIAL (75)..Dial Ext. #..

	no answer:	Your calls will be forwarded within 2 minutes.

Professor Sang O. ### COMMITTEE INFORMATION & FACULTY BUSINESS

#### The Honors Council

In its final meetings of the academic year, on April 24 and 29, the Honors Council initiated several practices springing from changes in the Honors Program approved by the faculty at the end of the Fall semester, 1984.

The Honors Program now extends four years instead of two. Styron Scholars moving into their junior years will be electing honors independent study projects in their majors or upgrading existing courses in their majors to honors level. Thanks to the generosity of the Board of Visitors, financial support for these students will continue.

More students are being invited to enter the Honors Program during the freshman year. The Admissions Office is informing students whose high school records are of high quality and whose SAT scores exceed 1000 to meet an honors advisor and to enroll for the honors section of English 103 in the Fall.



A recommendation for the first of two student members of the Honors Council has been forwarded to the VPAA. The other recommendation will follow in the Fall.

During the summer, the Honors Council will elect this year's Styron Scholars from the students who have accepted invitations to join the Honors Program. For the next year, until the question of long-term funding of the Program is resolved, the Board of Visitors has doubled their support of the Program. The Honors Council is grateful and believes that the entire faculty should be heartened by this encouragement of fine students.

To accommodate the new honors students, all faculty members of the Honors Council are participating in advisement. New students are already making appointments, and several have already been on campus.

Finally, the Council hopes to expand its activities during the coming year and requests suggestions from any interested party. We would like to provide two types of activities not only for designated honors students, but also for other capable students who might be interested:

- (1) informal discussions of intellectual and social concerns;
- (2) picnics; parties; trips to the Chrysler Museum, the Virginia Stage Company, the Smithsonian, etc.
