NSF GRADUATE RESEARCH FELLOWSHIPS

MINORITY GRADUATE **FELLOWSHIPS**

WITH THE SPECIAL COMPONENT WOMEN IN ENGINEERING

Program: Three-year graduate fellowships in science and engineering fields offered by the National Science Foundation.

Eligibility Requirements:

- 1. Applicants must be United States citizens or nationals who are members of one of the following ethnic minority groups: American Indian, Black, Hispanic, Native Alaskan (Eskimo or Aleut), or Native Pacific Islander (Polynesian or Micronesian).
- 2. Fellowships are awarded for study and research leading to master's or doctoral degrees in the mathematical, physical, biological, engineering, and social sciences, including the history and philosophy of science, and to research-based PhDs in science education.
- 3. Those eligible to apply in the Fall of 1990 are college seniors, first and second-year graduate students. and others who have completed a limited amount of graduate study in science and engineering.

Special component - Women In Engineering graduate fellowships: Additional awards will be offered to encourage women to undertake graduate study in engineering fields. Women In Engineering eligibility is the same as for other fields in the Minority Graduate Fellowship Program.

Stipend and Allowances: \$13,500 stipend, for a twelve-month tenure, and tuition waiver at U.S. institutions (or up to \$6,000 at foreign institutions). A \$1,000 Special International Research Travel Allowance is also available under the conditions specified in the Program Announcement.

Special Feature: Mentoring Assistantships for new Minority Graduate Fellows entering their fellowship institutions for the first time as graduate students provide one, two or three months of additional stipend support for Fellows to participate in research during the Summer before they begin their Fall fellowship tenures.

Christopher Newport College seeks applicants for the position of Director of Information Technology Services who want to participate in the development of an exemplary center for quality service and technological vision. This is an administrative position reporting to the Vice President of Academic Affairs and is responsible for the coordinated planning, practical acquisition, effective development and efficient use of information technology resources serving the needs of the Academic Departments and Administrative Offices of the College. Such technology resources include management information systems, automated data processing, office automation, telecommunications, and related equipment, goods and services. This position offers the challenge and opportunity of developing a long range plan for the information needs of the College as well as operational management of the central computer center for the College.

Christopher Newport College is a four-year, comprehensive, state-supported college on an attractive campus in the heart of Virginia's Tidewater. CNC enrolls nearly 5000 students, and offers the Bachelor's in 30 fields. The College is ten minutes from two national labs, the Continuous Electron Beam Accelerator Facility and NASA-Langley, and high-tech companies such as Canon-USA and Siemens. Virginia Beach and Colonial Williamsburg are within 30 minutes. Washington D. C. is a two and one-half hour drive.

The central computer center consists of 8 full-time professional staff. Equipment for academic computing consists of a PRIME 9955 with related terminal lab, three personal computer labs each equipped to handle 30 students, and telecommunication linkage to INTERNET. Equipment for administrative computing consists of Hewlet-Packard mainframe and related peripherals. Plans for expansion include the development of LAN for both administrative and academic computing. There are over 200 personal computers for faculty and staff use which are maintained by the computer center.

The successful candidate will have an earned advanced degree with academic concentration in fields related to Information Technology, significant experience as a non-management member of a computer operations or software development team, a history of successful long term project management, experience in the management of computer operations and application software development / maintenance, and proven skills in personnel management. Effective English language communication skills are essential. Experience in the operation of state agency financial reporting systems, a background in higher education, and awareness of the academic operating environment are desired. Salary is in the low to mid 50s with an excellent benefits package.

The Director of Information Technology Services reports to the Vice President for Academic Affairs. The Director of Information Technology Services is responsible for:

Promoting the coordinated planning, practical acquisition, effective development and efficient use of information technology resources serving the needs of the Academic Departments and Administrative Offices of the College. "Information technology resources" means management information systems, automated data processing, office automation, telecommunications, and related equipment, goods and services.


In the performance of her/his powers and duties concerning the planning, budgeting, management, and use of information technology resources, the Director of Information Technology Services' responsibilities include:

- * Providing effective and efficient operational support for the day to day computer hardware and software needs of the Academic Departments and Administrative Offices,
- * Managing operations of the central computer center in a manner that conforms to the guidelines established by the State Auditor, and
- * Hiring, training, managing and evaluating central computer center employees and performing other personnel related activities consistent with accepted personnel management practices.
- * Monitoring implementation of information management plans
- * Monitoring trends and advances in information technology,
- * Developing a comprehensive, College-wide, four-year planning process, and plan (to be updated yearly) for the acquisition, management, and use of information technology resources including personal computers and local area networks,
- * Developing standards for the use, acquisition, and maintenance of personal computers and telecommunications,

* Working with State agencies and sister institutions of higher education to remain abreast of policies and procedures that effect the information resource plans of the College,

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- * Soliciting Academic Departments and Administrative Offices of the College to submit information management plans annually and integrating these plans into the College-wide planning process for the acquisition, management, and use of information technology resources,
- * Directing the development and promulgation of policies, standards, and guidelines for managing information technology resources at the College.


BLECHMAN SCHOLAR NAMED AT CNC

Christopher Newport College freshman Jennifer Ann Reeder was named the first Franklin O. Blechman Scholar and awarded a full scholarship to attend the college.

The new scholarship program, which provides \$2,500 per year, was established as a testimony to the memory of Franklin O. Blechman, an important community leader and one of Newport News' outstanding citizens. The program provides an opportunity to disadvantaged Newport News Public School students who have the potential to go to college but lack the financial resources to do so.

The unique aspect of the Blechman Scholarship is the multiyear tracking and selection process, which begins in the seventh grade, and the requirement of the scholar to serve as a mentor to other potential Blechman Scholars.

CNC President Dr. Anthony R. Santoro said, "...not just anyone has what it takes to become a Blechman Scholar. It requires someone who, like Franklin O. Blechman, is intelligent, energetic and dedicated to improving life in this community."

PULITZER PRIZE WINNER TO READ AT CNC

Award-winning poet Henry Taylor will conduct a free public reading of some of his works Sept. 19 at Christopher Newport College.

Taylor's presentation marks the beginning of the 1990-91 Dean William Parks Colloquium Series.

The reading will be held at 12 noon in the John Gaines Theater, located inside the Campus Center building on the grounds of CNC.

Taylor, a professor of literature at American University, won the 1986 Pulitzer Prize for his book The Flying Change. He is noted for poems that are unobtrusively crafted, humorous and easily accessible to listeners.
