Effective March 1, 1991, the Writing Instruments Contract #62001-10 has NO MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS and its use is MANDATORY under the Code of Virginia, 2.1-450 and Agency Procurement and Surplus Property Manual, Section 11.6. The Writing Instrument Contract includes all pens, markers, highlighters, and mechanical pencils.

Departments may not use their delegated purchasing authority to purchase writing instruments from another source, when using state funds. There will be an adequate variety of writing instruments stocked in the warehouse for departments to purchase. All orders for writing instruments not stocked in the warehouse, must be requisitioned through the Purchasing Department. If you have any questions concerning the procurement of writing instruments, please contact the Purchasing Department.


