Bush barely escapes death at rally

Assassination attempt foiled by Secret Service

As the excitement was brewing in Ratcliffe Gymnasium with the anticipation of ex-President Bush's speech, more was going on than anyone knew, until now.

After the initial introduction, CNU's Senator Trible came out accompanied by ex-President George Bush to a standing ovation. When the crowd quieted, the color guard proceeded to present the flags. What was seemingly a normal presentation was anything but. As the ROTC officers marched by the washed-up president, one unnoticed officer lowered his rifle and took aim at the has-been. The Secret Service reacted with lightning speed to the situation without causing a stir and Bush kept his composure even in the face of death.

The Secret Service was able to stop the perpetrator seconds before taking what could have been fatal shots at the beloved Old President Bush.

As President Trible took the podium to begin his introduction, the agents escorted the would-be

assassin, later identified as Public Enemy Number One, Osama bin Laden, out the back doors located behind the curtain. bin Laden seemed to put up very little fight as he was escorted away.

Even the most observant onlookers missed the quick rescue. When asked about the incident, fellow reporter Al L. Soul responded, "Who? What are you talking about? Who got escorted away?"

There has been an increase in terrorist group activity- including bin Laden's Al Qaeda organization. CIA Director George Tenet noted - "[the terrorist groups] are using computerized files, e-mail, and encryption to support their operations." Tenet also said, bin Laden's organization is often using "surrogates" or third parties when attacking in an effort to avoid detection, although bin Laden felt that CNU's event was seemingly deemed important enough for him to carry out the objective himself.

When approached about the incident, one Secret Service agent exclaimed,

"After that son of a [bin Laden] was taken back behind the

much for just one robot to handle as malfunctions and system crashes have become more and more frequent in the Office of Student Life.

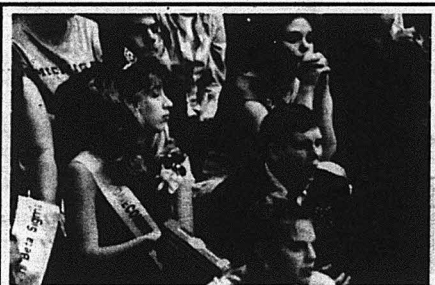
Therefore it was decided late last week that a new human-cyborg confusion unit would be sought out to assist the ailing Donna robot.

Once the new software is installed the new and improved Sinclair will be shipped back to CNU and begin assisting her robotic counterpart Eddleman in the Office of Student Life.

Together the two should be able to guide the university in the direction of realizing that at CNU students and not robots come first.

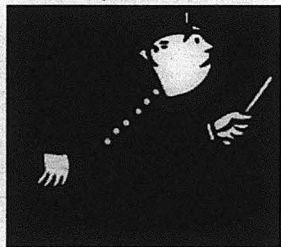

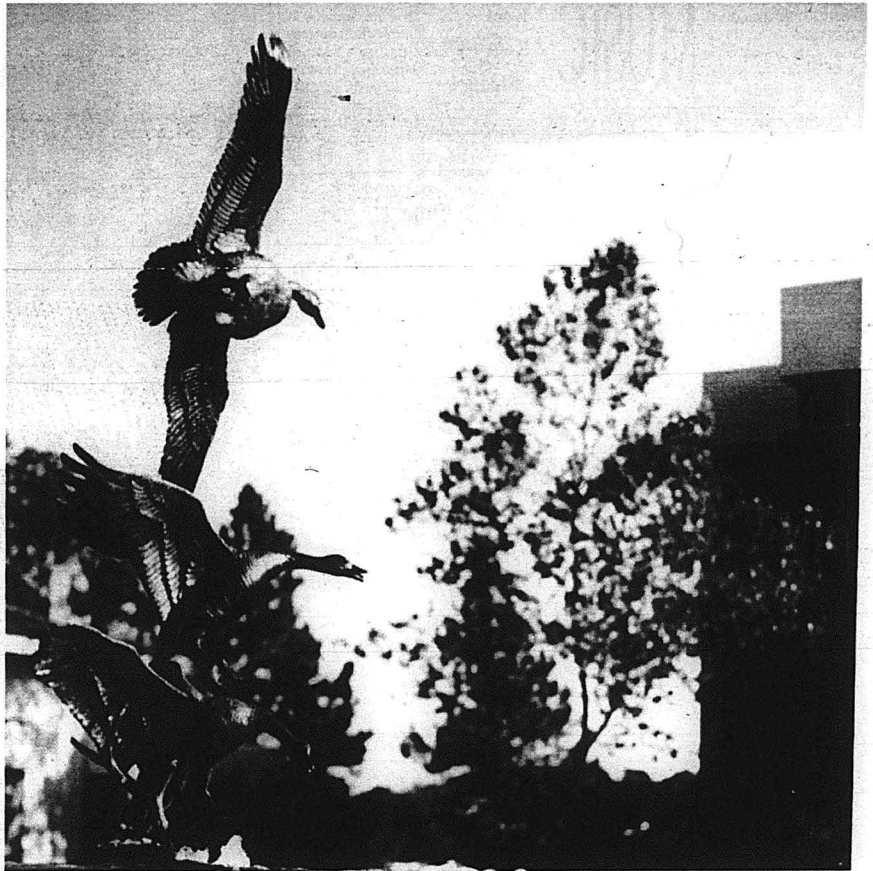

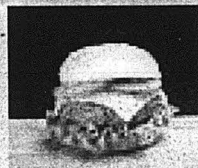

(Wednesdays, 9 p.m., ABC)

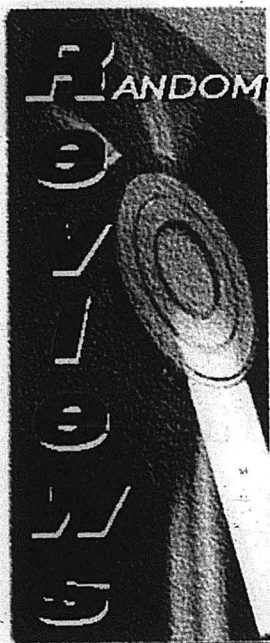

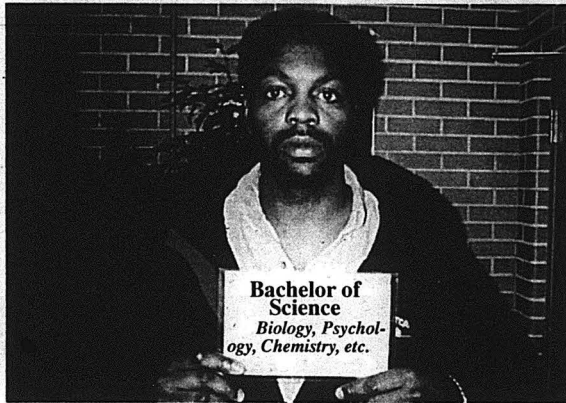

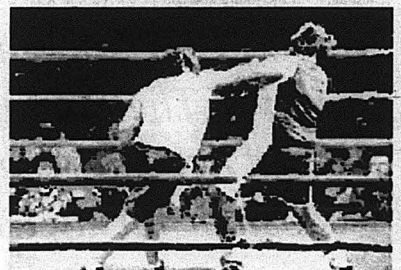
Staff remains optimistic about his future here at CNU.

Shoe Lane will be closed by fall of 2000. The announcement came along with the news that CNU will be the first college in America with a drag racing team.

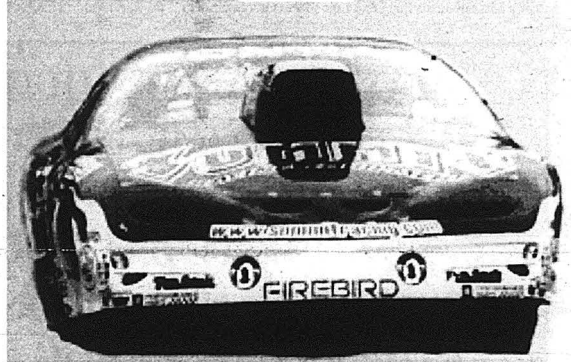

The formation of the team was initially in jeopardy due to Title IX restrictions. The University was able to get around restrictions by promising that all drivers will wear dresses. The CNU administration announced this week that the proposed bond referendum was passed and a new dome facility will be built on campus.

The new building will be called the Steve Pappas Sports and Convocation Center named after the former Director of Auxiliary Services for the school many years ago.

"I am glad that they are going to name the building after him," Svetlana Pappas, widow of Steve Pappas said. "Steve would be so happy on this joyous day if he were still with us."

The sports and convocation center will house the football team, the baseball team, the track team, softball team and any other matches that can't take place outdoors due to

inclement weather.

The facility will also have a fitness room and a state of the art weight room. Also, concession stands will be found on the main concourse level with the main food being Italian Sausage. On the top of the dome will be a life size statue of the late Pappas. He donated \$10 million dollars to the school so that the process could get off the ground.

letic programs on the east coast."

The facility is slated to be finished in time for the first football game in the history of the school. Fall of 2001, we will see the Captains play host to J.D. University in September.

Richard Cranium Construction Company will be handling the completion of the project. "There should be no problem completing the project on time," Foreman Dus T. Bottoms said. "Everything is moving smoothly since the demolition of Ferguson, where the Performing Arts Center was supposed to go, but was never fully funded, therefore was dropped from the proposed buildings list."

Look for the Captains to take the field and run all over the competition in every sport they compete in.

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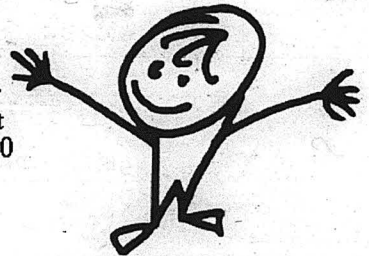

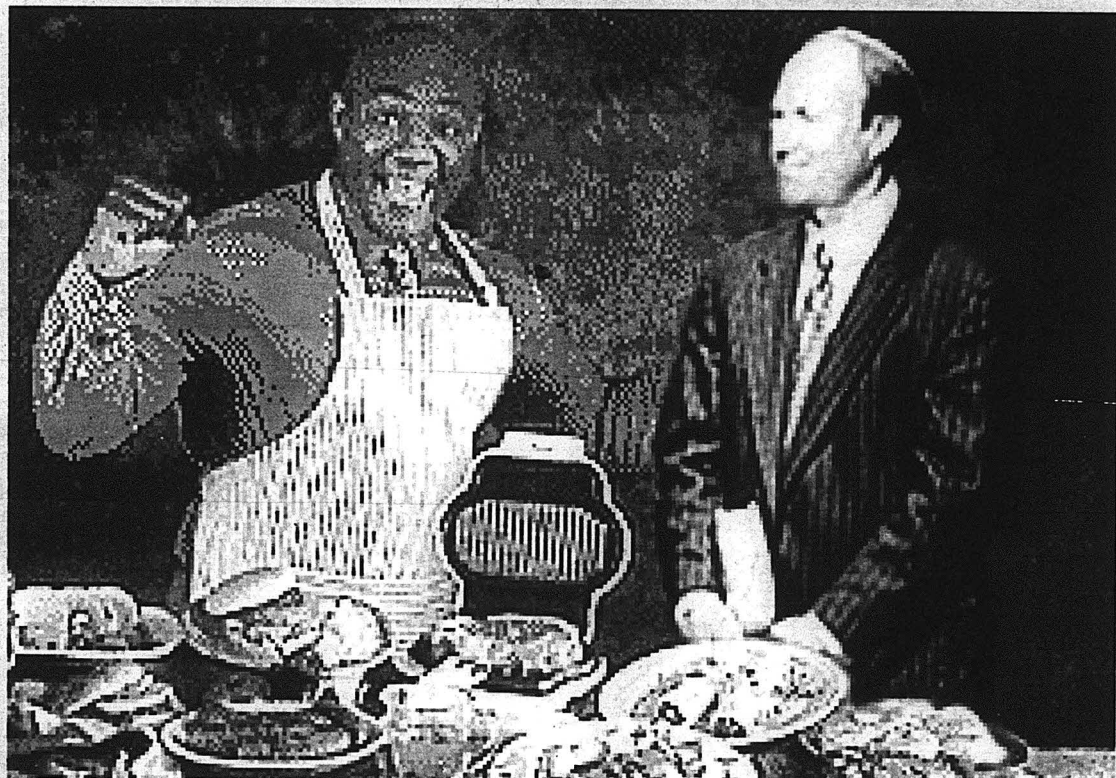
