




New Building Takes Shape On Campus

The new addition to the Christopher Newport campus is nearing completion.

The company contracted to build the Pre-Professional and Business Studies Building is the W. M. Jordan Company. On May 12, 1968, construction of the new building began. The date of completion was set for May 1, 1969, but work will end in January with the completion of the first floor.

According to the architect's blue print, the first floor will contain a mechanical equipment room for the heating facilities, a lecture hall which will seat approximately two hundred people, four classrooms, two laboratories, three instructors' offices, and three falculty offices. The tentative floor plans for the second floor nearly duplicate those of the first floor.

The money for the new building was appropriated by the Virginia State Legislature under the Capital Expenditures Act of 1968. When the money for the second floor is appropriated, the building will be completed and ready for use. It is hoped that this will be done in time for the 1970-1971 Summer will be discussed on December 5, School Session.

Point 3 - How many students were aware of the significance of October 15?


Point 4 - How many students have supported the basketball team by buying season tickets? One could composite the above examples with one sentence. How many students give a damn?

There was once a group called TEN YEARS AFTER, and they were on to fame. Alvin Lee and company had one of the most remarkable sounds in all "musicdom"; but now, after the release of their latest lp, it is this writer's opinion that they have laid a veritable bomb on the public! Sides one and two show very little, if any, of the great musical talent posessed by the TYA (Alvin Lee-lead guitar and vocal, chief songwriter; Leo Lyons, bass; Chick Churchill-organ, piano; Ric Lee, drums - no relation to Alvin). On all previous albums the sound has been straight; that is, without the gimmick of a loud, screaming, fuzzy guitar. Alvin is one of the very best blues guitarists alive, and demonstrates this great talent on almost every cut of their UN-DEAD Ip. Ssssh contains one cut in which the inimitable style of his guitar playing is recognizable. Some of the record sounds a bit on the CREAMY side. The first song on the second side sounds very close to a song done by the BEE GEES, and yet, all are stated as being originals (with the exception of one J. L. Williamson number). This DERAM release leaves quite a bit to be desired. I happen to have had the misfortune of owning TYA's Ssssh album. If you have the cash and/or the desire, don't! 


One Moratorium view expressed.


Jack Dove believes in what he is doing, and that is to be admired.


