## GRANTS

FIPSE Accepting Preliminary Proposals The Department of Education's Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) is accepting preliminary proposals for their comprehensive program. Suggested topics are:

1) <u>Curricular Reform</u> - FIPSE invites proposals that seek to ensure that undergraduate curricula provide the knowledge and skills that an educated citizen needs, including comprehension of our intellectual and cultural heritage.

2) Uses and Implications of the New Technologies - FIPSI invites proposals that seek to develop the educational uses of technology, including computers, television and other electronic media.

3) Education for a Changing Economy - FIPSE invites proposals that seek to make postsecondary education responsive to changes in the nation's economy.

4) Faculty, Staff, and Organizational Development - FIPSE invites proposals that seek to develop the abilities of administrators, faculties, and staff, and to achieve systematic improvements in institutions and organizations. The intended focus here is projects that relate to teaching and learning.

5) Reforming Teacher Education - FIPSE encourages proposals that aim to reform the education of school teachers by (i) making it easier for able people who have earned degrees in fields other than education and who currently lack pedagogical training to qualify as teachers; (ii) increasing current and prospective teachers' understanding of the subjects they teach; (iii) ensuring that prospective teachers have a solid grounding in the liberal arts; and (iv) attracting people of high intellectual ability to the teaching profession.

6) Improving Undergraduate Education - FIPSE welcomes proposals that aim to improve the quality of undergraduate education by (i) raising academic standards for the bachelor's and associate's degrees; (ii) strengthening the liberal arts component of undergraduate professional programs; (iii) developing means of assessing programs and institutions, or (iv) recognizing and rewarding outstanding undergraduate teaching through appointment, tenure, and promotion policies.

7) Making Access Meaningful - Proposals are solicited that seek to ensure that recent increases in access to postsecondary

education are made more meaningful by improving retention and completion rates without compromising program quality.

The deadline for applications is October 17, 1989. Guidelines may be obtained from the Office of Grants Development. There will be a FIPSE Preliminary Proposal Workshop presented Sept. 21, 1989 in Washington, D.C. presented by the Association of College and University Offices (ACUO). Additional information and application forms are available from the Office of Grants Development.

Graduate Study Abroad The 1990-91 competition for grants for graduate study abroad offered under the Fulbright Program and by foreign governments, universities, and private donors will close on October 31, 1989. Only a few more weeks remain in which qualified graduate students may apply for one of the approximately 700 awards to over 100 countries.

Most of the grants offered provide round-trip transportation, tuition and maintenance for one academic year; a few provide international travel only, or a stipend intended as a partial grant-in-aid.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens at the time of application, and must generally hold a bachelor's degree of its equivalent before the beginning date of the grant, and in most cases, should be proficient in the language of the host country. Except for certain specific awards, candidates may not hold a Ph.D. at the time of application.

Creative and performing artists are not required to have a bachelor's degree, but must have four years of professional study or equivalent experience. Candidates in medicine must have an M.D. or equivalent (e.g., O.D., D.D.S.) at time of application.

Application forms and further information for students currently enrolled in CNC may be obtained from the Fulbright Program Adviser Sanford Lopater, who is located in 118A Wingfield Hall. The deadline for filing an application on this campus is October 15, 1989.
