

Notice to Employees

This year we encountered very substantial difficulty in reconciling information for tax purposes because two employees of the College were paid by two state agencies and the maximum deduction for Social Security Taxes was met. If you are now employed by another state agency and your total anticipated annual salary and wages from both agencies is expected to exceed \$45,000 during calendar year 1989 you should contact the College's payroll Accountant, to make arrangements concerning the deduction for Social Security Taxes (FICA). We would like to avoid the same difficulty next year and you can help by declaring an exemption with the other state agency.

Notice to Employees Hospital Pre-Admission Certification/Continued Stay Review

All employees should be aware that the State Division of Risk Management has initiated a cost containment program with Intracorp Medical Review Services for pre-admission certification and continued stay review. This program applies to Workers' Compensation hospital admissions and is now effective. The program is applicable to all hospital admissions under the Workers' Compensation program. It is the doctor's and hospital's responsibility to follow the proper notification procedure. Risk Management has asked that the College make employees aware of this new procedure.

Proper Use of State Vehicles

The following memorandum was received from Vivian Watts, Secretary of Transportation:

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During the past few months several citizen complaints have been received concerning apparent inappropriate use of state-owned vehicles. In each case the complaints have been investigated and disciplinary actions in some cases were warranted and implemented.

My office recently received a complaint from a citizen regarding actions of a state vehicle operator which related to safety and were considered to be a flagrant disregard for both life and property. The state operator manuevered his vehicle between lowered railroad crossing gates across the path of an on-coming train which was travelling at 70 mph. The results of such recklessness could have been catastrophic.

State-owned venicles are a highly visible aspect of state government. The actions of their operators are closely scrutinized by the citizens of the Commonwealth. Inappropriate use of a state-owned vehicle and its unsafe operation cannot and will not be tolerated.

Please emphasize to each of your employees the importance of the proper use and operation of their vehicles. Any wrong doing or even the appearance of wrong doing is a negative reflection on

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each of us as state employees. The use of a state-owned vehicle is a privilege that can be revoked.

Beyond the Dream Teleconference

On February 1, 1989, the Minority Student Association, the Student Government Association and the Division of Student Affairs will sponsor a national teleconference as a part of National Black History Month. The teleconference will be in room A-105 (Anderson Auditorium) from 1:00 P.M. to 3:00 P.M.

This interactive teleconference, entitled "Beyond the Dream," will bring together distinguished experts on the contributions of Blacks to this country with audiences at colleges and universities, military installations, secondary schools, national associations and federal and state agencies. The two hour program is divided into six segments:

- 1. Education---speakers include Mary Hatwood Futrell, President of the National Education Association; Judith Eaton, President of the Community College of Philadelphia and Board Chair of the American Council on Education; and Donald M. Stewart, President of the College Board.
- 2. Politics---speakers include Representative Cardiss Collins (D-Illinois); The Honorable Cleo Fields, State Senator in Louisiana; and Yvonne Brathwaite Burke, former Congresswoman (D-California).
- 3. Business and Economics---speakers include Joshua Smith, CEO and Chairman of Maxima, Inc.; Dorothy Brunson, CEO of Brunson Broadcasting; and Sybil Mobley, Dean of the School of Business and Commerce at Florida A&M University.
- 4. Social Issues---speakers include Marian Wright Edelman, President of the Children's Defense Fund; Dorothy Gilliam, Columnist for "The Washington Post"; and Asa Hilliard, Professor and Lecturer of Ancient Egyptian History.
- 5. Military---speakers include General Bernard Randolph, America's only Black active duty four-star general; Mae Jemison, America's first Black female astronaut; and Colonel Charles Bolden, USMC and a

NASA astronaut.

6. Arts, Enterta pment and Sports---Take 6, a contemporary Jazz/Gospel group, & The Winans, a contemporary Pop/Gospel group.

Other speakers include: John Hope Franklin, prominent scholar, author and pioneer historian; Derek Bok, President of Harvard University; and Ernest L. Boyer, President of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.
