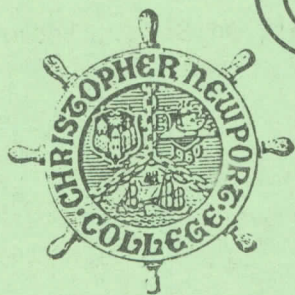

### Requests for New Periodical Subscriptions

All requests for new periodical subscriptions must be submitted to Faculty-Library Coordinators by department chairmen. Prior to the fall of 1980, the periodicals request policy allowed each faculty member to submit requests directly to his Faculty-Library Coordinator without first having the request reviewed by his department. However, due to the fact that financial constraints limit the number of periodical subscriptions that can be added each year, the procedure was changed to insure that requests reflect the needs of the department as a whole instead of that of individual faculty members only. Requests for new periodical subscriptions may be submitted to the Faculty-Library Coordinators with the Spring Book Orders or may be submitted to the Coordinators early in the fall when they will meet to review requests for new periodicals. Department chairmen are reminded, however, that funds to cover the cost of a new periodical subscription should it be approved must be reserved from the departmental allocation and that requests for new periodical subscriptions should be kept to a minimum.

As always, requests for back issues of periodicals to which the library subscribes do not need the approval of the Coordinators since this is a one-time only purchase, is charged to departmental allocations, and therefore will not involve future expenditure of library funds.

We appreciate your cooperation in these matters.

Section D.8.a. of the Faculty Handbook (pages V35,36) states, in part, the following:

A final examination is, in most courses, an important part of the evaluation of each student's work. There are some courses, however, such as seminars, colloquia, studio, or creative writing courses, where final examinations are unnecessary or inappropriate. The instructor will determine whether or not a final examination in a course is necessary. When an examination is required, it will be prepared and administered according to the policies described in the following sections of this Handbook.

From the foregoing, it is apparent that a final examination is required for a large percentage of the courses offered by the College.

### Christopher Newport College and the Peninsula Agency on Aging Receive Grant

"Sharing the Past," a series of Ingatherings for older people in Peninsula senior centers, nutrition centers, or residential facilities will begin in April and run through the end of June, thanks to a grant from the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities and Public Policy to Christopher Newport College and the Peninsula Agency on Aging.

The Ingatherings will focus on six different themes, and local faculty members will explore with the older people their memories of their home places, the churches in which they grew up, the food their family ate at celebrations, their stories of adventures on water, tales of when and why their families came to America, and the stories that they tell their own grandchildren in order to transmit the values of the family itself.

As many as 500 older people will be involved first-hand in the Ingatherings, which will be offered at eleven different sites in Newport News, Hampton, Williamsburg, and Poquoson.

The goal of the program, according to project director Ruth Kernodle of CNC, is to explore the sources of values for the older people and the significance of these values for their life view. It is Professor Kernodle's hope that the Ingatherings will encourage the older citizens to think about the positive achievements of their lives, and to share with the faculty members from area colleges the wisdom that comes from women and men who have lived long and reflected on the meaning of their lives.

Jane Webb, a second project director and a professor at CNC, says that "many older people are not aware that the stories they tell their grandchildren have any purpose than just passing the time. But we know that those stories tell the children what the proper behavior of people in their families is. The children learn from their grandparents stories how to act in certain situations and what choices are good choices for their family."

"For example," Webb continues, "a story of how the family coped with the extreme poverty that hit the South during the Depression gives the child the family's attitude toward coping with adversity. Or, a story of how a family figure handled a burgler or a terrifying hurricane tells the child what the meaning of bravery is for that family."

Project directors Webb and Kernodle have joined forces with Mary Ann Wright, Nutrition Director of the Peninsula Agency on Aging, to handle the movement of people and faculty members involved in the project. Faculty members who will work in the Ingatherings include Jouett Powell, Keith McLoughland, and Betty Anglin of CNC; Wayne Kernodle and Sylvia Scholnick of The College of William and Mary, Jerry Safko of Thomas Nelson Community College, and Chee Ricketts of the Peninsula Fine Arts Center.
