

Routing of Departmental Requisitions

The College departmental requisition form should be submitted to the purchasing department for control logging after department chairman and Dean's or Vice President's approval. Submission of requisition forms direct to the VPFA results in a delay in processing, rather than expedited processing. True emergency service and repair orders may be processed by telephone and confirmed. Individual requisitions may also be hand carried through the processing steps, when timing dictates this step.

Fund certifications on the form are as follows:

Department Chairman signature: Funds are available within departmental budget and the intended purpose is departmentally approved.

Dean or Vice President signature: The intended purpose of expenditure is legitimate and included within functional plans for the appropriate school or organizational function.

Financial Officer signature: Funds are available within budget total for the particular program or Vice Presidential area of supervision. (Individual account balances will not normally be checked in making this determination.)

Requests for New Periodical Subscriptions

The Faculty-Library Coordinators will be meeting the last week in October to review requests for periodical subscriptions. As in the past, because of the rapid increasing cost of periodicals (20% to 30% a year), the increase in binding costs, and the need to have our expenditures for books and periodicals in an appropriate ratio, the number of new periodical subscriptions added must be kept to a minimum and include only those titles which will round out or improve our present periodical holdings.

Any department wishing to request a periodical subscription, given the above limitations and constraints, should turn in its request to the appropriate coordinator by October 23, 1981, if it has not already done so. Requests should be submitted by department chairmen so that they reflect the wishes of the department as a whole, and department chairmen are reminded that funds to cover the cost of the subscription must be available from their departmental allocation. All requests must be accompanied by written justification for the need of the title in question in order to be considered for acquisition.

Professional Development Program

The State Department of Personnel and Training has established a new Tri-Level Profes-

sional Development Certificate Program for new supervisors, experienced supervisors, and managers. After nearly a year in development, the new tri-level Professional Development Certificate Program is scheduled to be in operation in October of this year.

The Professional Development Certificate Program provides individual training and development curriculums designed to strengthen the managerial skills and knowledge of Virginia's supervisors and managers.

An interdisciplinary approach allows participants to explore the functional areas of management including government policies and procedures, financial and operations control, organizational design and development, human resource utilization, and planning and setting priorities for cost effective results.

The program is divided into four distinct phases of instruction including a brief preparatory requirement for non-supervisors and three comprehensive instructional levels. Each level provides a complete curriculum with specific objectives.

To provide motivation and recognition, a Certificate of Accomplishment, signed by appropriate state officials, will be presented on completion of each of the three levels. A copy of the certificate will become part of the participant's permanent personnel record.

The overall purpose of the Professional Development Certificate Program is to provide participants with a foundation of relevant management concepts and knowledge upon which they can base their day-to-day decisions as they mobilize ideas, people, and financial resources in support of the Commonwealth's goals and objectives.

The cost for each course is \$50, which includes lunches and breaks for 2 days, and most courses will be held in Richmond at the Training Center.

The Professional Development Certificate Program is designed for four different categories of state employees:

1. The preparatory requirement is for employees with no supervisory experience who are interested in exploring the supervisory role and responsibilities, either for career planning purposes or for possible future enrollment in Level I.

2. Level I is for employees who have recently been appointed to a supervisory position and have two years or less experience. This level is primarily concerned with the basic elements of supervision.

3. Level II is for employees who have had considerable supervisory experience and are interested in learning advanced concepts of supervision.

4. Level III is for managers who are responsible for directing the work of supervisors and staff administrators. The emphasis of this level is on planning, organizing, setting priorities, delegating, integrating, and measuring operating results in terms of cost effective accomplishment.
