Biology Colloquium

The Biology Department invites you again to be its guest for the annual Spring Biology Colloquium. There will be a series of three lectures during April, all of them to be given at 4:00 P.M. in G145.

The series will begin this year on April 7 when Dr. Richard H. McBee, Professor Emeritus of Microbiology at Montana State University and former Dean of the College of Letters and Science at the University will deliver the annual Louis DeSpain Lecture in Microbiology. Dr. McBee's title will be: "Getting the Most for the Least: The Story of Animal Hind-Gut Fermentation."

Dr. McBee is a microbial ecologist best known for his work on anaerobic bacteria of the gut. His research, which includes studies on both domestic and wild ruminants, the willow ptarmigan, and the porcupine, was done at Montana State University and at the Rowatt Institute in the Arctic. Most recently he has been conducting studies on the gut of the iguana at the Smithsonian Institute for Tropical Research at Balboa, Panama.

Our speaker on April 21 will be Dr. C. Donald Cone of the Cell and Molecular Biology Laboratory of the Veterans Administration Hospital and Eastern Virginia Medical School. On April 28, Dr. Karl Vermeullen of the Department of Biology at the College of William and Mary will speak on the topic "Development of Tissue Culture Models of Human Urinary Infection."

On Friday, April 7, at noon in Newport 115, four distinguished members of the Faculty will debate the topic of civil disobedience. The panel, consisting of Bob Doane, John Hoaglund, Tim Morgan, and Bill Wolf, will present a variety of viewpoints on the question: Is it ever permissible for the individual to disobey the laws of the State? Each participant will deliver an introductory statement of 5 minutes after which the floor will be open for discussion. The audience is encouraged to participate and to prepare for that participation a group of readings has been placed on reserve in the Library under the heading Great Books Debate: Topic #1. You are all encouraged to attend.
