Utilization of Equipment and Tools from the Buildings & Grounds Department

COMMITTEE INFORMATION & FACULTY BUSINESS

Report of Faculty Liaison to Board of Visitors Finance Committee for December Board Meeting.

1. Vice President for Financial Affairs reviewed fund revenues and expenditures for first 5 months of the fiscal year. A budget reversion of 1 1/2% is in process by the state--this amounts to \$79,223.
2. Vice President for Financial Affairs covered the State Council for Higher Education proposed salary increase for next two years of 10%.
3. FAC Liaison reported problems in recruiting and turnover in high demand disciplines due to CNC salary schedules.
4. Vice President for Financial Affairs reported the loss of \$195,225 carried forward from the first year of the biennium.

Building and Grounds Committee

The following are major items of information reported to the committee.

1. Science Building
The panel problem has been corrected but there are now a few other weather dependent

construction items to be completed. The building will probably not be available this semester. It will possibly be ready by summer and will definitely be completed by fall.

2. Campus Center Addition

The new addition is largely in use. Renovation of areas in the old Campus Center is now under way and construction work should be completed by March 1. Some areas may be ready for use by then but in others the work of furnishing will take some weeks more.

3. New sidewalk lighting in front of and beside the Campus Center addition will be installed this spring.

4. Roof repair of various campus buildings is proceeding and there will consequently be vehicular traffic over the campus. Members of the college community are asked to be cautious and stay clear of construction areas.
