SATURDAY September 11 SUNDAY September 12 On behalf of the President, we are creating the abovereferenced committee and appointing the seven of you to its membership. Mr. Williams will serve as chairman of the committee.

The committee is charged with the responsibility of:

- (a) developing criteria (for the President's review and approval) for evaluating the effectiveness of the College's use of resources in its administrative components;
- (b) applying these criteria, in the form approved by the President, to the tasks of identifying inessential administrative functions that can be eliminated and identifying ways and means by which essential administrative functions can be rendered more efficient; and
- (c) making recommendations to the three Vice Presidents which result from the above application.

The committee hereinabove constituted is parallel in function and purpose to the existing Academic Program Review Committee appointed last spring. Therefore, academic programs are not included within the scope of the Administrative Review Committee's charge.

Mr. Williams is hereby requested to convene the committee at the earliest possible time and to arrange for the three of us to attend its first meeting.

In order that the entire college community might be alerted to the actions herein taken, we are having this memorandum reproduced in the next issue of the CNC Community Chronicle.

We appreciate very much your willingness to serve in this important advisory capacity.
