- * The availability of <u>Integrated Manufacturing Predoctoral</u> <u>Fellowships</u> for persons not now holding a Ph.D. and interested in pursuing the Ph.D. in the field of integrated manufacturing. This program is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy through the National Research Council. Due date for submission in the current year is November 5, 1993.
- * The Grants Office has received the Fall 1993 <u>Grant Application</u> <u>Deadline Calendar</u> from the National Endowment for the Arts.
- * The availability of Research Projects for Educating Children with Severe Disabilities for persons now holding a Ph.D. or who are interested in pursuing the Ph.D. in the field of education. This program has five funding priorities and is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education. There are various due dates for submission in the current year beginning December 15, 1993 and running through February 3, 1994.
- * The availability of the <u>Horsley Cancer Research Fund</u> for persons now holding a Ph.D. and who are interested in pursuing the field of cancer research. This program is sponsored by the trust of Mary Louise Old Andrews through the Virginia Academy of Science Research Committee of Virginia Tech University. Due date for submission in the current year is November 2, 1993.
- * The availability of the <u>Spencer Post-Doctoral Fellowship Program</u> for faculty who have earned their Ph.D. or Ed.D. or will complete their Ph.D. by January 1, 1994 in the field of education. This program is sponsored by the National Academy of Education through Stanford University. Due date for submission in the current year is January 4, 1994.

- * Clyde Brockett presented a paper concerning 11th-century music theory in Italy, "Post-Guidonian Practice into Theory: The Tonary De modorum formulis" at the 28th International Congress on Medieval Studies at Kalamazoo, Michigan last May.
- * Jim Hines read his paper "The Songs of Charles Gilfert" at the fall meeting of the Southeast Chapter of the American Musicological Society hosted by the Moravian Music Foundation in Winston-Salem, North Carolina.
- * Wendell Barbour presented a paper on "Sick Building Syndrome" at the annual meeting of the American Library Association in New Orleans on June 26, 1993. The paper was co-authored by Wendell Barbour and Cathy Doyle.
 - Barbour displayed the architectural drawing of the three phases of the Captain John Smith Library during a poster session at the annual meeting of the American Library Association in New Orleans on June 28, 1993. The display was part of a presentation on how library additions are integrated into existing structures; Smith Library was one of the examples. The presentation was prepared by Stanley Krause, Principal of Rancorn, Wildman, Krause, Brezinski Architects. Cathy Doyle assisted with this display.
- * Dr. Jack Anderson, Professor of Management, served as Chair of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) Accreditation Visiting Committee to Reinhardt College in Waleska, Georgia in July (1993). The College is undergoing a "Substantive Change: move from the status of a level I (two year) institution to that of a level II (four year) institution.

The first degree to be offered is the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration scheduled for spring 1994. The Committee verified the information submitted by the College in its plan for the transition, and will make recommendations to the College Delegate Assembly as to compliance with the criteria for continued accreditation. Other members of the Committee were administrators and faculty from Kentucky and the Carolinas.

- * Deborah Mullen of the Department of Philosophy and Religious Studies presented a paper entitled "Reversibility and Mirror-Play: Trust in Merleau-Ponty" at the Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Merleau Ponty Circle at Muhlenberg College, Allentown, Pennsylvania, September 23-25, 1993.
