

DEANS' ANNOUNCEMENTS

Status of Six-Year Curricular Plan

CNC's Six-Year Curricular Plan was delivered to the Council of Higher Education staff in Richmond last November 30th. Since then the staff members have been at work preparing their recommendations for presentation to the Council at the February 6th Council meeting. It is anticipated that we will be informed of the Staff's recommendations on either February 5th or 6th. Should any institution not be in agreement with the Staff recommendations, appropriate rebuttal statements may be forwarded to the Council prior to its March 6th meeting. At this meeting, the Council of Higher Education will take action on all six-year plans.

It is anticipated that the Council will either approve or disapprove the following four new degree programs proposed for 1980-81 initiation:

1980 - Accounting, Physical Education, Occupational Safety Management 1981 - Humanistic Studies

It is also expected that on March 6th the Council will vote to either "encourage," "discourage," or take a neutral position on the thirteen new degree programs proposed by CNC for initiation during the period 1982-1984.

As you know, services by a student regularly enrolled and attending classes in the employ of his school are excluded from social security withholding tax. However, this exclusion applies only during periods of regular school attendance. In order to comply with the exclusion, we have designed a new time sheet to be used for students. We will start using the new green time sheet for time worked in February. These are to be turned in on the first of each following month thereafter. The new

time sheets are available in the Payroll Office. It will be the responsibility of the Supervisor or Department Chairman to certify that the student is regularly attending classes. Dear Dr. Durel:

On behalf of Governor Dalton, I am writing to acknowledge the letter dated December 8, 1978, from the faculty of Christopher Newport College and to inform you that we appreciate your concerns about salaries at our institutions of higher education and more specifically at Christopher Newport College.

The question of faculty salaries in our institutions of higher education is a concern to all of us in the Executive Branch. I assure you that we are actively seeking, within limits congruent with President Carter's wage price guidelines, to ensure that faculty salaries in Virginia's institutions are competitive with those elswhere in the nation. My office is currently involved in a review of salaries in our senior institutions, Richard Bland College and the Virginia Community College System. Basically, this review involves the years 1976 through 1980 and includes such factors as actual salary average, benchmark salary average and appropriated salary average.

As you are aware, the question of faculty salaries is not a simplistic one. While there are many factors to consider when responding to concerns about faculty salaries, we are actively engaged in appropriate reviews of and are committed to maintaining a quality faculty in our institutions of higher education.

Keynote Speaker, African-American History Month

Haki R. Madhubuti (Don L. Lee) an international Lecturer, Poet and Organizer will be the keynote speaker at the Opening Celebration of African-American History month. Appearing with Haki Madhubuti will be the Huntersville Dance Ensemble, an African Dance group from Norfolk, Va. This program will be held in the Campus Center Theatre on Thursday, February 1, 1979 at 7:30 P.M. Mr. Madhubuti is being sponsored by the BSA and SAC.

Mr. Madhubuti was Poet-in-Residence at Howard University, Washington, D.C. (1970-June 1977), is one of the founders and Editor of Third World Press, Editor of Black Books Bulletin and Director of the Institute of Positive Education, in Chicago, III. He has published widely in magazines, quarterlies and newspapers and is an active lecturer, community worker and organizer. He is one of the best selling poets in the world. His books in print are in excess of 250,000.

Haki Madhubuti was a participant in the First Pan-Afrikan Festival in Algiers in 1969, a guest of the Tanzanian Government at the Sixth Pan-Afrikan Congress in Dar Es Salaam in 1974, a guest of the Senegalese Government at Encounter: Afrikan World Alternatives, in February, 1976. He currently serves on the Board of Directors of North American Zone of 2nd World Black and Afrikan Festival of Arts and Culture (FESTAC).

His published books are Think Black (1967), Black Pride (1968, Don't Cry, Scream (1969), Walk the Way of the New World (1970), Directionscore: Selected and New Poems (1971), Dynamite Voices: Black Poetry of the 1960's (1971), Dynamite Voices: Black Poetry of the 1960's (1971), From Plan to Planet, Life Studies: The Need for Afrikan Minds and Institutions (1973), Book of Life (1974), and A Capsule Course in Black Poetry Writing co-authored with Gwendolyn Brooks, Keorapetse Kogsitsile and Dudley Randall (1975), Enemies: The Clash of Races (1978). Women of the Sun his first volume of poetry in six years will be published in 1978. Currently he is compiling a collection of essays entitled New Music Screaming in the Sun: Political and Literary Essays 1966-1978, working on two children's books, and a book-length essay on Black Revolutionary Culture.

LIBRARY NEWS

The library has relocated departments of Public Services into temporary quarters while the reconstruction of present facilities takes place. The affected departments include Circulation, Reference, Periodicals, Readers' Services, Reserve Materials and Photocopying.

The Periodicals service desk has been relocated into a small area close to the Media Department. The Periodicals Department cannot be reached by phone. Back issues of unbound periodicals have been sent to storage. Faculty members who use specific issues of unbound periodicals for class assignments should notify Miss Eddins, Readers' Service Librarian (ext. 7134) in advance so that such issues can be obtained from storage in time for the assignment.

Reference Services is relocated into the Reference Room. Mr. Brownson cannot be reached by phone directly. Either Circulation (ext. 7133) or Ms Donna Mitchell (ext. 7131) will be glad to relay messages to Mr. Brownson.

Circulation and Reserve Materials have been relocated into the front lobby of the library. They may be reached by phone at ext. 7133. Space for reserve materials will be severly restricted and the library would appreciate it if the number of materials placed on reserve could be kept to a minimum this semester.

Readers' Services has been relocated into the Conference Room, room 122. Miss Eddins may be reached by phone at ext. 7134.

The XEROX 4000 machine has been relocated in a storage area and is not easily accessible to the circulation staff. Therefore, photocopying should be left at the circulation desk with a completed Xerox request form. We regret that "on demand" Xeroxing cannot be done during the spring semester. All Xeroxing will be batched and done according to the following schedule:

Materials dropped off between 8 am and 11 am will be copied and available for pick-up or delivery to mailboxes by 12 noon.

Materials dropped off between 11 am and 3 pm will be copied and available for pick-up or delivery to mailboxes by 4 pm.

Materials dropped off between 3 pm and 7 pm will be copied and available for pick-up by 8 pm. Materials to be deposited in the mailboxes will be taken to the mailboxes by 9 am the following day.

Materials dropped off after 7 pm will be copied and available for pick-up or delivery to mailboxes by 12 noon the following day.

The relocation of these services will allow for the connection of the old building with the new building and will include better facilities for the Public Service areas of the library. It is expected that the move of the affected departments back into the reconstructed area will take place at the end of the spring semester. The staff of the library appreciates that the relocation will present some difficulties to the staff, faculty, and students, and it is hoped that the inconvience will be slight.
