Veterans granted PE credits

Wednesday March 4th, at a regular faculty meeting, the CNC Faculty voted on a motion to grant any Veterans with 186 or more consecutive days of Active Duty in the U.S. Armed Forces four hours of physical education activities credit hours towards their degrees. The motion was approved 32-31. The motion was submitted by Professor Jones on behalf of the Degrees Committee. A substitute motion was made by Professor Sacks that only two hours be granted Veterans, however the substitute motion was defeated by a voice vote and the original motion was carried.

Recreation Dept. cancels classes

Newport News, Va. - Due to the energy crisis, the Spring Break for the schools, and the many problems in rescheduling classes, the Newport News Recreation Department has been forced to cancel all instructional classes until the second week of April, 1977 (the week of April 11th). The only exception to this cancellation is the Target Project Program (guidelines are set by the Newport News Redevelopment and Housing Authority -- call 247-1670 for schedule), gymnastics teams, volleyball leagues, senior citizens activities, and therapeutic activities.

All citizens registered for instructional classes in the winter or eight (8) week mini session will automatically be transferred to the spring session beginning the week of April 11th, 1977. A spring registration will be held March 28th and 29th, 1977 for vacancies in the instructional classes.

Students have a right to privacy

Christopher Newport College is required to inform enrolled students annually of their rights under the terms of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. The Act does not apply to students admitted to the College who have not officially enrolled. The following are the provisions of the Act for the student's own information.

It is hereby reaffirmed that the College's policies and procedures are in full compliance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, whereby each student's right to the privacy of his or her official College records and access to the same is assured.

Enrolled students have the right of access to his or her official College records under the terms of the Act the College is not required to make available to students the following materials: Confidential letters of recommendation placed in the student's filed before January 1, 1975, and those letters for which student has signed a waiver of her or her right

of access; Parents' confidential financial statements; Medical, psychiatric, or similar records "which are created, maintained, or used only in connection with the provision of treatment to the student and are not available to anyone other than persons providing such treatment; provided, however, that such records can be personally reviewed by a physician or other appropriate profes ional of the student's choice."; Personal files and records of members of faculty or administrative personnel, "which are in the sole possession of the maker thereof and which are not accessible or revealed to any person except a substitute."; or Records of the Admissions Office concerning students admitted but not yet enrolled at the College. Letters of recommendation are removed from the Admissions file before the file are forwarded to the Registrar's Office.

Students have the right to inspect and review his or her official College records and the right to a response from the College to reasonable requests for explanations and interpretations of his or her official records.

Enrolled Students have the right to an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the accuracy or appropriateness of his or her official records. And students have the right to have disclosure of his or her official records limited to College officials or other persons authorized under the act, for legitimate purposes, unless release of such information to other parties is given in writing.

The College has designated the following information as "Directory Information" which may be released to the public: Student's name, address (permanent and local); Student's birthdate; Dates of Attendance at the College, field of concentration, current classification, degrees awarded; Previous schools attended and degrees awarded; Honors or special recognition; and height and weight of members of athletic teams.

A student who does not want the above information made public must file notice in writing of this request to Brenda C. Blount, Registrar, P.O. Box 6070, Newport News, Virginia.

A student wishing to review his or her College records must consult the directory of official student records in the Registrar's Office. The directory lists the offices where official student records are maintained and the name of the official responsible for the maintenance and release of each type of record, and to whom requests for access should be made.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act is a complex law and new guidelines and interpretations are still for acoming.

If any of the rights guaranteed are violated, a complaint may be submitted in writing to: FERPA Office, 330 Independence Ave. S.W., Washington, D.C. 20201 explaining the alleged violations.

Students express needs in Campus Survey

Students generally make use of the Christopher Newport College counseling services, it was shown on the recent Student Reactions to College survey, conducted by Bonnie Hansen of the Counseling Center. Of the 154 students responding, 74 or 48.1% indicated that they had talked to a counselor about future plans at least once during the fall term.

Occasionally however, there is a problem in arranging an appointment. Fourteen percent of the students said they had tried unsuccessfully to meet with a counselor at least one time during the term. Since the students are usually able to be seen whenever they come in, except during the registration periods which may be scheduled for two weeks ahead, this statistic was interpreted as showing that over 85% of the time, a counselor was available at that moment, or within a satisfactory period of time.

Concerning programs and services with which the Center might help students, the following problems were met "often" or always" by the respective percentages of the sample: I have trouble concentrating on studies - 26%, I can't handle the (school) work in the time I have - 39%, I need help in finding time to meet my obligations - 57%, I need help in learning to stand up for myself - 29%, I feel anxiety and am inefficient on tests - 32%, I'm not satisfied with my relations with the opposite sex - 21%, my own sexuality troubles me - 14%, many of my problems are with my family - 25%, I'm not satisfied with my marriage - 7%, Ineed help dealing with my children - 10%, I need to learn how to communicate better - 34%, I often feel lonely on this campus - 33%, a lot of my energy is focused on who I am - 47%.

In response to some of the needs expressed in this survey, the Counseling Center has scheduled groups for this semester that are focused on Assertion training for men, Communication Skills, Test Anxiety, Time Managment, Parenting Skills, Career Development, Women in Transition, and Personal Growth. There's more than one drought

(CPS)--You say your dealer is raising the prices? You say there is a drought, not just one of water, but of dope? Well buddy, a research institute in North Carolina may be able to help if you are a qualified researcher.

The federal government is making marijuana cigarettes under tight security at the Research Triangle Institute (RTI). The joints are produced in RTI and shipped to legitimate and licensed researchers around the country. The dope is stored in a vault under tight security and there are about 1,000 pounds of marijuana there, although normally the amount is expected be less.

A machine in RTI can make from 100 to 200 cigarettes a day when it is running at full speed. Researchers can request marijuana for research from the National Institute on Drug Abuse in Washington which receives and

approves the requests.

On Thursday, March 17, 1977, at 8:30 p.m. the Norfolk Symphony will perform a special St. Patrick's Day Pops Concert in the Grand Ballroom of the Omni International Hotel. The orchestra is celebrating the end of a cold winter, hoping to lift the spirits of all who hear them, and are looking forward with joyful expectation to springtime in Virginia. Presented in the hotel's beautiful Grand Ballroom, the Orchestra will be featured in a light musical program under the direction of Maestro Russell Stanger. Included on the program will be familiar favorites from leading Broadway musicals, including "My Fair Lady" and "Mame". A new arrangement of tunes from the twenties called "Twentiana" will be played by the Orchestra for the first time as well as the currently popular "Feelings" and Burt Bacharach's "Close to You". Featured during the evening will be a sing-along session where the audience will join the Orchestra in singing old favorites including "Memories", "School-Days", and a sprinkling of Irish tunes such as "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling", and "My Wild Irish Rose," in honor of the patron saint of Ireland, St. Patrick. The Orchestra will play for the first time the currently popular "A Fifth of Beethoven" which is a swingy, contemporary

adaptation of a classical work. Mr. Stanger also promises to present a very unusual solo by the Orchestra's new bassonist, Lori Tiberio.

Seating at the concert will be at individual tables of 10, and to add to the evening's conviviality, two complimentary bottles of wine are included in the per table ticket price. Those preferring not to purchase table seats may purchase row seats at \$5.00 and they may obtain refreshments at a cash bar located nearby.

"Portrait of a Modern Family"

The Hampton-Newport News League of Modern Voters in conjunction with the Organization for Women's Equality is sponsoring a five part series of seminars entitled "Portrait of the Modern Family." The series, which is designed to examine the impact of urbanization and changing work patterns on the American family, is partially funded by the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities and Public Policy.

The first program in the series, "The Father and Family Structure," will be held at Christopher Newport College Campus Center on Saturday, March 26. It is open to the Public and registration begins at 9:00 a.m. Robert Vaughan, Executive Director of the VA Foundation, will begin the day with an introduction to the Humanities program. Carmen Grayson, Assistant Professor of History, Hampton Institute, will speak on "The Traditional Family vs the Modern Urban Family." Next, Carolyn Shaw Bell, a Katherine

Coman Professor of Economics, Wellesley College, will address "The Father/The Breadwinner". In the afternoon Dr. T.J. Braganza, Staff Psychiatrist, Riverside Hospital Community Mental Health Center, will speak on "The Role of the Father in Human Growth & Development."

There will be two small group discussion sessions, one in the morning and one in the afternoon, to give everyone a chance to voice opinions and to ask questions.

Other programs in the series will be "Motherhood-Symbol & Central Definition of Womanhood" (April 14, TNCC); "Juvenile Justice - does it reflect dysfunctions in the family and society?" (April 21, TNCC); "Implications of Institutional Structures" (April 28, TNCC); and "Who's Minding the Children?" (May 14, Christopher Newport College.)

Chamber Music to be featured at Christopher Newport

The Department of Fine and Performing Arts next monthly concert will be presented on March 18, and feature the Old Dominion University Faculty Piano Trio. The group includes Ronald Marshall, violinist, Janet Kriner, cellist, and Harold Protsman, pianist.

Harold Protsman, chairman of the Music Department at ODU, has performed frequently in the Tidewater area and is a frequent guest of the Feldman String Quartet.

Ronald Marshall, a resident of Newport News, is concert master of the Peninsula Symphony Orchestra, principal violist of the Norfolk Symphony Orchestra, musical director and violist of the Feldman String Quartet, and a teacher of strings at virtually every college in this area. He is the teacher of CNC's three violin students.

Janet Kriner, perhaps Tidewater's busiest performer, is principal cellist of both the

Peninsula and Norfolk Symphony Orchestras, a member of the Feldman String Quartet, and the primary cello teacher in the Tidewater area. She performed with the CNC Choir last year and appeared here recently in one of the Monthly Concerts featuring the Norfolk Chamber Consort.

On their concert, the Trio will present works by Malapiero, Beethoven, and Dvorak. Malapiero's "Sonata a tre" (1927) has the unusual arrangement of a duo sonata first movement for cello and piano, a duo sonata second movement.

Beethoven's early Trio No. 4, Opus 11, will complete the first half of the program. After intermission, the Trio will present Dvorak's beautiful Trio in B-flat, Opus 21.

The Department of Fine and Performing Arts Monthly Concerts are held on the third Friday of each month. They are sponsored by the CNC Concert Music Club and are free to all CNC students.

I was interested in reading the commentary "Challenge a course, alternative to an "F" which appeared in the March 1, 1977 issue of The Captain's Log.



Incidently, no course may be challenged which appears on a students' Christopher Newport transcript or any other college transcript.


Psychic spying?

Men's Tennis begins season

The Christopher Newport College Mens Tennis Team will open its 1977 spring schedule on March 24 at Old Dominion University. This years schedule is especially highlighted by meetings with Division II schools Virginia Military Institute, Randolph-Macon, and Roanoke College.

Last years Dixie Conference Tournament in Greensboro, N.C. ended in a tie between Christopher Newport and North Carolina Wesleyn, so the Captains goal is a solid first place in 1977. This task will be further accented by the fact that this years D.I.A.C. Tournament will be held right here on the new tennis courts at C.N.C. ON April 25 and 26.

CNC Coach Jack Armistead in his seventh year as Head Coach of tennis views the coming season with mixed emotions. "I think we will have the kind of team that is capable of having a fine season and possibly winning the Dixie Conference Championship. We lost two good players from last years team in no.1 man Petey West and no.3 man Randy Bryant. It will be difficult to fill the holes these players have left but the new players and returning lettermen are strong and we will be in the thick of things if all our players give maximum effort in each match."

Returning lettermen Mike Hash, Johnny Roberts, Larry Shelton and Alex Vazquez give the Captains a fine nucleus around which to build. Top seed Hash along with second seeded Roberts should also form a strong doubles combination.

Newcomers to the CNC squad this year are, Sean Bauer, Kevin Eva, and Gary Lucas, and John Mowing. Bauer and Mowing are outstanding freshmen. Eva and Lucas are sophmores this season so looks as if Armistead can count on strength for the next few seasons.

"The depth of the team this year", says Armistead, "will be one of our strongest assets. We have a returning letterman at each position and competition for singles and doubles is very keen. Challenge matches so far have been close and each of our players seem to be giving 100% each day."







Role reversal used in CNC Spring play

Role reversal is an interesting process by which one person gradually assumes the behavior and attitudes of another until he actually becomes the other person.

Jean Genet has written a play, "The Maids," which deals with such a process and warns of the damaging effects it has on the human psyche.

The haughty, well-dressed Madame personifies that which her maids, Claire and Solange, aspire to: grandeur and wealth. The two girls idolize their featherbrained mistress and they fantasize themselves in her place.

In a kind of dramatization of their fantasies, the servants take turns playing Madame when she is out of the house. Then one of the girls, usually the younger, Claire, assumes the postures, affects the speech and wraps herself in the finery which belongs to her mistress. For a while, this serves as a means of escapism (for the girls) from the reality of their existance as a pair of disposable servant girls.

From this light charade, a whole series of frustrations arise and a sense of being trapped develops as the girls yearn even more to be Madame and as they become more aware that they will never be like their employer. Their confusion increases as they switch between real and imagined lives and the love they feel for their mistress is compounded by hitterness and though they continue to idolize Madame

because of her social position, they begin to hate her because she prevents them from becoming anything more than two ardent, obedient admirers of her.

And so, what begins as innocent play-acting becomes a nightmare for two maids.

The CNC Theatre Department will present 'The Maids' this semester. Dr Brune Koch will direct the show ans John Wynne is the set designer. Actresses featured are Debbie Reams, Debbie Fitch, and Susan Myers.

Education in dollars


(CPS)--Confirming well-established patterns with new information, the U.S. Census produced a new study showing that median family income is highest among families in which the head had four years or more of college.

The report, available from the U.S. Government Printing Office in Washington, D.C., makes the following observations:

Four years or more of college will yield a median income of \$21,961; One to three years of college will yield a mediam income of \$16,579; High school graduates can expect to earn an average of \$14,729; People with eight or fewer years of school will probably make a mere \$8,472.

Movie Reviews by David Bruce

Most talked about film

Screenplay by Sylvester Stallone

For the benefit of cave-dwellers and those recently reactivated from suspended animation, Rocky is the most exciting, most cathartic, most electrifying, most talked about film of 1976.

Sylvester Stallone is Rocky - the small time fighter on the skids who takes fortune in his beefy hands and pummels his way to a personal victory. On the strength of this performance alone, Stallone establishes himself as one of the most powerful new screen presences.

Talia Shire (acclaimed for her role in Godfather II) is Rocky's girl. Both she and Stallone fill their performances with a verisimilitude which strikes resonant chords of identification in the viewer.

Besides being a winning humanistic lesson in achieving self-set goals, Rocky makes the blood Rocky is a winner.

surge with excitment. You may find yourself leaping from your seat and shouting at the screen.

Rocky's ending seems a bit contrived, but it is constructed so as not to force the viewer to suspend his disbelief to an extreme.

Stallone, contrary to studio publicity hype, is not an actor on the level of Brando, Pacino, or De Niro. His Rocky is almost a xerox of Brando's Terry Malone (On the Waterfront); Brando talks to his pigeons, and Stallone talks to hsi goldfish; yet it is safe to say that Stallone does not have Brando's incredible range. Stallone's performance in Rocky does not reach the heights of feverish intensity which Pacino and De Niro rise to (Check out Pacino in Dog Day Afternoon and De Niro in Mean Streets); However, Stallone is magnificent in Rocky, and

The wind and the Lion

Written and directed by John Milius John Milius' sweeping epic The Wind and the Lion is showing in the Campus Center this week.

A member of the faculty of the prestigious cinema department of the University of Southern California, Milius has established himself as a solid screenwriter (The Life and Times of Judge Roy Bean, Magnum Force). Proving himself capable of creating popularly successful "B"-movies (Dillenger) when given directorial assignments by major studios, Milius was finally allowed free rein to create his own films independently.

The Wind and the Lion is a nostalgic, romantic celebration of the heroes of the past and the glories of armed conflict. Sean Connery's characterization of Raisuli, the last of the Barbary Pirates, brings to the screen a character reminiscent of the larger-than-life epic heroes Achilles, Beowulf, and Conan. the thematic scope of the film is stirring as are the brilliantly choreographed battle scenes which prove that Aristotle's rule-"spectacle is the least important part of dreams," does not adhere to the cinema.

Two French cousins

Written and directed by Jean Charles Taccherla Cousin, Cousine is a film worthy of the praise lavished on it. The film is a joyous, often comic celebration of life in the spirit of Francois Truffaut (Day for Night) using the cinematic

style of Robert Altman (MASH).

In an early sequence of the film, a fifteen year old girl is displaying a slideshow composed of photographs taken at a wedding. She has photographed an aged man mooning, secret lovers in various stages of undress, drunks relieving themselves. A shocked woman orders the slideshow stopped and mutters "Such bad taste!"

"But I only photographed what I say; I didn't make it up," comes the girl's innocent reply. This is the key to Cousin, Cousine, as it, like a Truffaut film, appears to have been made by a small child in the sense that one sees all that occurs before the camera's eye without distortion, prejudice, or value judgements. The love affair which blossoms between Marthe (Marie-Christine Barrault) and Ludovic (Victor Lanoux) could be viewed as a cinematic portrayal of the idealized lovers on Keats' grecian urn.

Like Truffaut's films, Cousin, Cousine contains children who behave like adults and adults who behave like children. In a climactic scene. Marthe and Ludovic embrace each other passionately in the midst of a slowly wheeling group of dancing children. The adult world of tedium, responsibility, stagnation, and commitment is cast aside by the two lovers like a bitter rind. The carefree lovers, a husband who fools around with other women on an epic scale, a woman recently widowed, and a neglected, neurotic wife in love with her psychiatrist all indulge themselves in their pleasures and refuse to re-enter the world of pain.

One can make careful, responsible decisions and still be happy, even when those decisions go against the grain of society's mores. If the institution of marriage becomes a nightmarish existential prison, escape it. If your life has become hellish, change it. To enjoy oneself is pleasurable and desirable; to not enjoy oneself is tedious and painful. To embrace happiness is to enjoy life fully; to passively accept pain and misery is to live an insane life of quiet desperation. These are the simple, childlike ideas expressed in Cousin, Cousine.

The film asserts the aforementioned premises via Robert Altman. Altman's directoral style, containing cinematic verisimilitude, rapid fire scene changes, slice of life (or, more appropriately, stream of life) scenes, use of a large number of well developed characters, and organized chaos, has influenced director Tachella greatly.

A particularly refreshing and long overdue element in the film is that the female characters in the film are as well developed and fascinating as the male characters. After Scorcese's Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore, Bergman's Face to Face, Tyne Daly's performance in The En forcer, and Cousin, Cousine, it is evident that female protagonists in films can be as dynamic, important, and entertaining as male protagonists. Films about women give a much needed revitalization to the cinema.

The cast of Cousin, Cousine is extremely talented; the photography is beautiful; the composition is so good that one frequently forgets he is looking at a set; and the realism evoked by the total experience of the film as well as its refreshing views of life make Cousin, Cousine a virtuoso cinematic performance.


