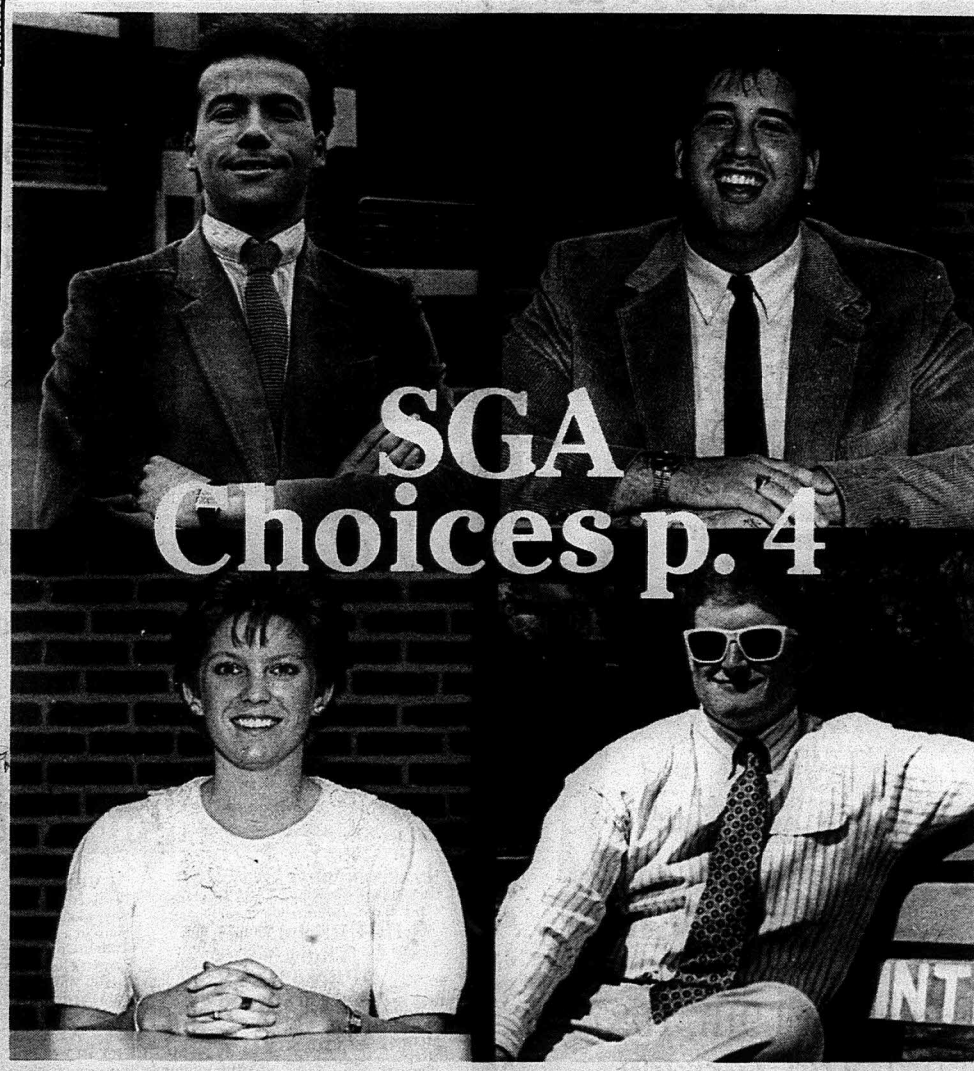

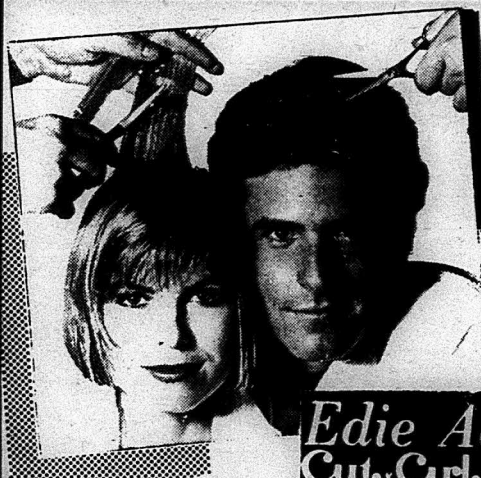

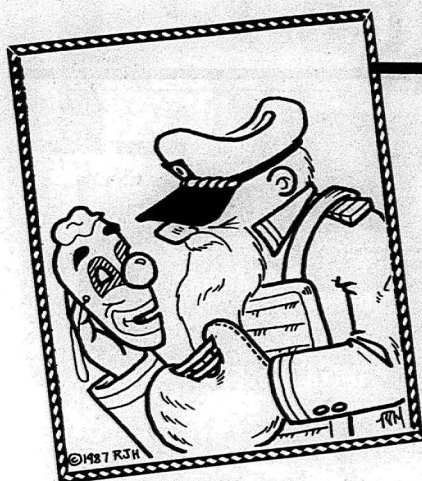

## Campus USA

APPALACHIAN STATE UNIVERSITY (CPS) — Stephen G. Travis, 26, on trial for allegedly lacing coffee pot contents with "acid," testified he and codefendant T. O. Phillips had never been serious about carrying out a "threat" that was intended as "a humorous thing."

Police arrested Travis and Phillips last May after seven people who had consumed some of the coffee from the pot in question complained of dizziness and hallucinations.

UNIVERSITY OF IOWA (CPS) — Police arrested 25 U. Iowa students trying to keep the CIA from recruiting on campus last week, while 20 U. Wisconsin-Madison students sat in at Chancellor Bernard Cohen's office for the same reason.

About 700 U. Colorado students rallied in support of seven CU protestors who were banned from campus for a year in punishment for their conduct during a Nov. 17 anti-CIA demonstration.

TEXAS-AUSTIN (CPS) — Paul Bartley, head of Texas-Austin's YCT chapter, says the YCT got the transcript of campus radical Marc Salomon as part of an "investigation" of Salomon.

Bartley said he knew it was illegal to have the transcript, but that he wasn't sure who in the group had purloined it.

# Santoro takes over reins as CNC's fourth president

Dr. Anthony R. Santoro became the fourth president of Christopher Newport College yesterday, April 1, following a nationwide search.

Dr. Santoro had been president of Saint Joseph's College in Windham, Maine since 1979.

A native of Chicago, Ill., he holds a Ph. D. degree in History from Rutgers University, an M.A. degree from the University of California and an A.B. degree from the College of the Holy Cross.

"From the first I felt a warm and caring feeling in the people at Christopher Newport College. Their interest in service to the students impressed me and my wife. We look forward with great anticipation to my work at CNC," Dr. Santoro said.

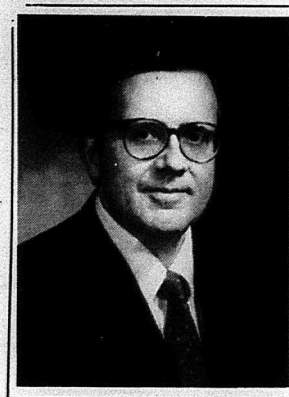
Prior to his presidency at Saint Joseph's College, Dr. Santoro has served as Vice Pre-

sident for Development and College Relations at Ladycliff College, Highland Falls, New York. He has held a succession of positions from Professor of History to Vice President for Administration at Briarcliff College, Briarcliff Manor, New York.

His recent professional activities include serving as President of the Maine Independent Colleges Association, Past President of the Executive Committee of the State of Maine Higher Education Council and he is the founder and Director of the Greek, Roman and Byzantine Studies Conference.

Dr. Santoro, 47, and his wife Carol have one daughter, Melissa, aged 16.

Mrs. Santoro is an active volunteer in the public school system in Maine where she helped establish the Great Books Program for Children in grades 2 through 8.

## Kerrey speaks at Vietnam conference

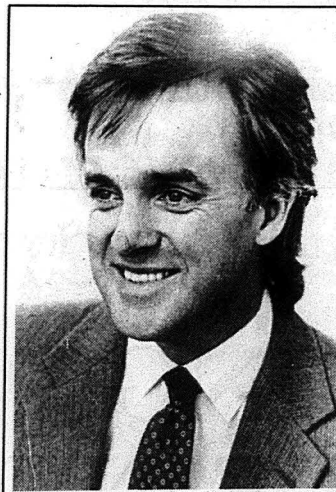
The Honorable J. Robert Kerrey, former Governor of Nebraska, was the key panel participant in a three-day, CNC symposium of "PLATOON...The Film...VIETNAM...The Experience" on March 31 and April 1 and April 2.

Kerrey was a platoon officer of a 14-man Navy SEAL team in Vietnam in 1969. He was wounded in the line of duty and earned the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart and the Vietnamese Campaign Ribbons.

He shared his experience and perspectives in the program, "Experiences...In Country and on Film", yesterday, April 1 in the CNC Campus Center Theatre.

The first day's program was "Fit and Misfit...Politics and War" in the Anderson Auditorium. The third day focused on "Vietnam in Perspective." Many of the programs' panelists are Vietnam veterans and they shared their perspectives and experiences in the 1980's as educators, retired professional soldiers, businessmen and community leaders.

The program focused on Vietnam veterans and the American society — have they recovered from the physical, emotional

and cultural battle scars of the war?

This symposium was designed to help the veteran by talking about the experiences and sharing their feelings.

Kerrey was Governor of Nebraska from 1983 until this past January. He chose not to run for a second term and joined the investment firm of Printon, Kane & Co. in Lincoln, Neb.

Kerrey, 43, enlisted in the Navy in 1966 and became an officer the following year. He attended the Army Airborne and Ranger Schools and completed underwater demolition training. He was selected for the U.S. Navy SEAL Team 1. Today the SEAL Team's West Coast Training Camp is named in his honor.

After recovering from his Vietnam wounds, Kerrey returned to the Midwest in 1970 to pursue a career in pharmacy. He went into the food, sports and fitness business with his brother-in-law and then entered politics.

Kerrey is a member of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Disabled Veterans, Sertoma and Lions Club.

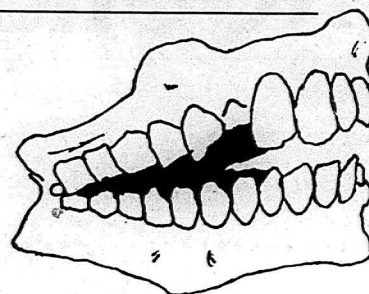

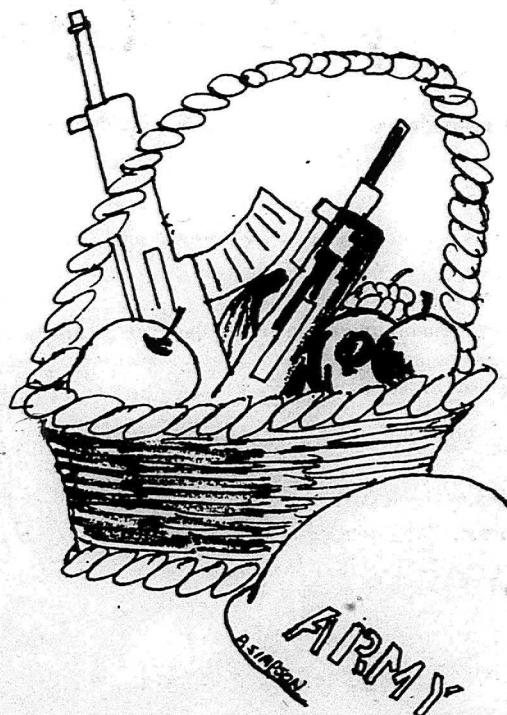

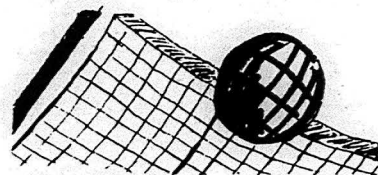

## Baseball team has its best week ever

Although rain shortened the week a bit, it will still go down as one of the best in CNC baseball history.

It actually began on Sunday as CNC took a 5-3 win over Ferrum College, a game that was actually forfeited by the home plate umpire and is being protested by the Panthers. But it still counts as a CNC victory over

what was then the No. 4 team in the nation in Division III.

Two days later CNC had a chance to take on the nation's No. 8 team, and scored another victory. This time it came, 8-6, over Virginia Wesleyan which entered the contest with a 15-2-1 record.

Freshman Mike Wiechman had the best day of his young career with two doubles and a triple, three RBIs and a pair of runs

scored. In addition Bryan Wheeler and Benny Elliott picked up two hits each and Mark Parnell won his third game of the year, allowing just one earned run.

Thursday the Captains won their fifth straight, equalling the school record set last year, by clobbering the Newport News Apprentice School, 12-3. CNC used a big eighth inning, in which it scored seven runs, to seal the victory. Elliott had two more hits,

as did Dave Lindsay, Chris Rankin and Tim Krisik. Wheeler went the distance on the mound for his second victory.

CNC hosted Franklin Pierce, of New Hampshire, in a doubleheader Monday, and Norfolk State, Wednesday, before hitting the road for single games at Atlantic Christian, Thursday, Methodist Friday and St. Andrews Saturday. Then it's back home for a tentative doubleheader with Longwood Sunday.

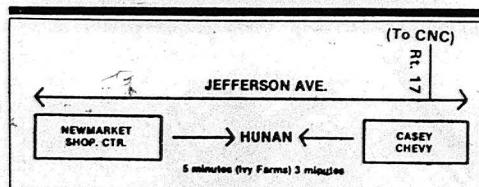

choice: good old Fancourt Babberly - Babbs to those whose champagne he pilfers - must dress and act the part.

Here's to propriety!

The young ladies arrive - Amy in purple, Kitty in yellow. But wait here comes the elder Chesney, Sir Francis, recently retired from the army in India, a little downcast in his widowerhood, but game for romantic sport.

Not far behind, Stephen Spettigue, stoop-shouldered misanthrope of the Scrooge variety, squinting through glasses as far out on his nose as imaginable, hunting for his darlings - daughter Amy and Kitty, his ward. Trouble for the boys. Uh-huh.

Yes, there's a lot of positioning needed to start this old play, but once that's achieved - midway through Act I (of III) - the fun erupts in the person of Babbs, played hilariously by Sam Parker, lunging about the stage in a ghastly mountain of frills and a hideous black hat tugged over a wig of blond curls.

As hard as the boys try to steal away with their coy loves, Babbs - er, Donna Lucia - receives more of the attention. Then Stephen takes to chasing D. L., and Sir Francis gets it in his head to woo her, too.

It's a goofy plot, complicated by the arrival of the real Donna Lucia, played with the perfect mix of dignity and amusement by Cindy Kreicar, and her ward, Ela Delahay (Susan Stein), who happens to resemble that bereaved young lady back in Monte - why, it is her!

You can imagine that Parker has a good many emotions to contain inside that frilly dress - this woman knows more about his supposed past than he does, and the young lady has possessed his heart since his Mediterranean cruise.

Ah, in a moment alone, he cannot resist: he steals a stogie, lifts his dress, strikes a match on his (man's) shoe, and puffs away.

The fun of this production is multifold. There are enough fools running around to keep your eyes dancing - you don't want to miss a laugh. Sam Parker is the source of much merriment (as he was in his role as the ridiculous young doctor in *Invalid*). Russell Hackney convinces as Jack, the more-or-less clever leader of the lovers. Tim Morgan, who created two foppish characters in *Invalid*, plays the debonair, if weak-hearted, Sir Francis very nicely; and David MacKay makes his fragile Spettigue the butt of much of the joking.

Carole-Sue Hansley as Kitty and Margaret Thomas as Amy are appropriately pretty, giggly - sure of themselves when necessary.

Praise also to the technical side of the production: Hank Sparks' sets, which rise around a single white frame, are spare, decorous, and eminently workable for the various romps. Gwen Sharoff's costumes - the tuxedos, rich gowns, and dress suits - are carefully chosen and attractive.

The costumes and staging say right away that this production will entertain well. And that's what happens, thanks in large part to Director Bruno Koch's genius for comedy. The timing and blocking are skillful, the composition balanced and pleasing. You'll enjoy the expressions and gestures: Koch trains everybody to be in a play.

*Charley's Aunt*, which plays again in the Gaines Theatre on Friday, and in a dinner theater format at the Hellenic Community Center on Saturday, offers all the plusses of expertly managed, live theater.

## Virginia Teaching Scholarship/Loan Program

Applications for the 1987-88 Virginia Teaching Scholarship/Loan Program (formerly known as the Virginia Math/Science/Foreign Language Scholarship/Loan Program) are available in the Financial Aid Office.

The scholarship/loan is for \$2,000 per academic year for a maximum of two years or \$4,000. The recipients will be expected to sign a promissory note upon receipt of the award. The loan is cancelled by teaching math, science, foreign language or special education in a Virginia Public School. The loan is cancelled at a rate of \$2,000 for every year the recipient teaches math, science, foreign language or special education.

To be eligible, the student must be a full-time junior or above, enrolled in a state-approved teacher preparation program in math, science, foreign language or special education, intend to teach in Virginia and be a resident of Virginia.

For more information and/or to obtain application forms, please contact the Financial Aid Office in Room 239 of the Administration Building or by telephone at (804) 599-7170. To be considered for an award for the 1987-88 school year, your application must be received by the Financial Aid Office no later than April 10, 1987.
