

USE OF STATE CAR CREDIT CARD.

The following Memo dated January 23rd has been received from Mr. W.R.Davidson, Fleet Manager, Commonwealth of Virginia:

"To Whom it may Concern:

Recent reviews by this office indicate that a good many credit card invoices are being received from the various oil companies with insufficient information shown to identify the party that used the card. First of all, the card is to be used only as a last resort when no highway facilities are available for service. If it becomes necessary to use the credit card, the party making use should make certain that the Pool Number and License Number of the vehicle is shown on the ticket.

Also, the pool credit card is being used for purchases for vehicles that are not pool vehicles. Please see that this practice is discontinued.

REPORT "A"

To: The Faculty

From: The Admissions Committee

At its November 1973 meeting, the Admissions Committee discussed the plight of the marginally-prepared, "high-risk" student. In the fall of 1971, 37% of the entering freshmen fell into this category. Dr. Collins' extensive study of these students at CNC revealed that with the exception of a few older students, this group performed very poorly indeed.

We do not believe that at this period in the College's development we should reject more than one-third of the entering freshmen, nor do we feel that we can continue to do nothing for these students. In response to this problem, the Admissions Committee passed the following motion:

"That Christopher Newport College develop learning skills programs for preparing marginally qualified students to perform successfully at the level required by curriculum standards and that the Curriculum Committee in conjunction with the Counseling Center devise a plan to implement this policy."

The approval of the Faculty is requested in order that the implementation of this program may proceed.

REPORT "B"

The following motion, introduced at the December faculty meeting, is reproduced herewith for your consideration:

Preferential Voting

In the election of faculty members to any committee position or office of the Faculty, a preferential vote shall be held.

- (1) Each ballot shall provide for listing as many names as there are candidates for the position
- (2) Each faculty member shall list, in order of preference, the members for whom he wishes to vote.
- (3) According to the number of positions open, this number of selections will be counted on each ballot, in the order presented.
- (4) Any member receiving a majority of votes so counted will be thus elected.
- (5) If the election of sufficient members is not accomplished, that (those) member(s) receiving the lowest number of votes will be eliminated from consideration.
- (6) On each such ballot the vote for the next eligible candidate on the ballot (not previously counted) shall now be added to the previous total for that candidate.
- (7) Selection and elimination will proceed as before until the vacancies are filled.
- (8) The number of votes required for a majority will be determined from the number of ballots bearing names of candidates still eligible for the remaining positions.
