

Application forms and information about the Virginia Lions Club Youth Exchange are available in the Office of Counseling and Career Services. Placement in ENGL 101 or 103 is determined by a satisfactory score on a required English placement test or by successful completion of ENGL 020. ENGL 102 or ENGL 104 should be completed as early as possible and must be completed before the 84th semester hour.

All students must show verbal proficiency as a requirement for graduation. Students should achieve and demonstrate such proficiency as early as possible in their courses of study. All students must pass a Verbal Proficiency Writing Examination developed by the School of Letters and Natural Science. This examination must be taken before the final 30 semester hours of coursework for the first baccalaureate degree. Transfer students with as many as 90 semester hours credit who have completed the equivalent of ENGL 101-102 are required to take this examination within the first semester of coursework at CNC. Students holding baccalaureate degrees from this or any other accredited institution shall be excluded from this requirement.
