## Honorary degrees to be awarded

Gen. Robert D. Russ and Jean Berman Falk will receive honorary doctorates from CNC during commencement exercises May 12 at 4 pm on the Great Lawn.

Gen. Robert D. Russ, who retired this week as commander of Tactical Air Command, will receive the Doctor of Laws degree for his "distinguished service to the Commonwealth and to learning," said Dr. Anthony R. Santoro, CNC president.

Gen. Russ, who led TAC since 1985, retired Apr. 9 after more than 35 years of active duty. As the leader of one of the Air Force's major commands, Gen. Russ was responsible for more than 112,000 military and civilian people stationed at 300 locations in 20 countries.

A command pilot with more than 5,700 flying hours, he flew 242 combat missions in Vietnam, and received numerous military honors including the Distinguished Service Medal and Silver Star.

In addition, Gen. Russ was instrumental in bringing several major weapons systems, such as the F-15 Eagle and the F-117A Stealth, into the Air Force inventory.

Falk, for "her commitment to, and scholarship in, the humanities," according to Santoro, will receive an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree.

An important Peninsula community activist and civic leader for more than 45 years, Falk is no stranger to accolades.

In 1985, she received CNC's highest honor, the Medallion of the College, for her interest in and support of the performing arts program.

Her contributions to CNC include the Emanuel E. Falk Art Gallery, an endowed music professorship in her name and raising a substantial amount of money to open the Cary McMurrin Music Library.

Falk, who moved to Raleigh, N.C. in the summer of 1988, will return to the Peninsula May 12 to receive her honorary degree.

## Students' disappearance still a mystery

Three years after their mysterious disappearance, the whereabouts of two CNC students remain a mystery.

Cassandra Lee Hailey (Sandra) and Richard Keith Call (Keith) were last seen attending a party at University Square Apartments at 12366 Warwick Blvd. between 1:30 am and 2 am Sun., Apr. 17, 1988.

Later that morning about 7:30 am, Keith's Toyota Celica was discovered

at the Yorktown overlook off the Colonial Parkway. Bloodhounds followed separate paths down to the York River and later picked up scents at spots in the water.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation is currently going back through information on the case and interviewing people. The case has remained open, but neither Keith's nor Sandra's parents have been informed of any new information.

Terri Booth, a friend of Sandra, was the last person to see her; however,

the FBI has not yet approached her.

"Three years is a long time to not know any more than the first day," said Booth.

Mrs. Joanne Hailey hired private investigators who determined that her daughter and Keith were never on the Parkway and that the disappearances occurred at the party or on the way to Sandra's house. The couple would have had to pass the house, located off Route 17 in York County, to get to the

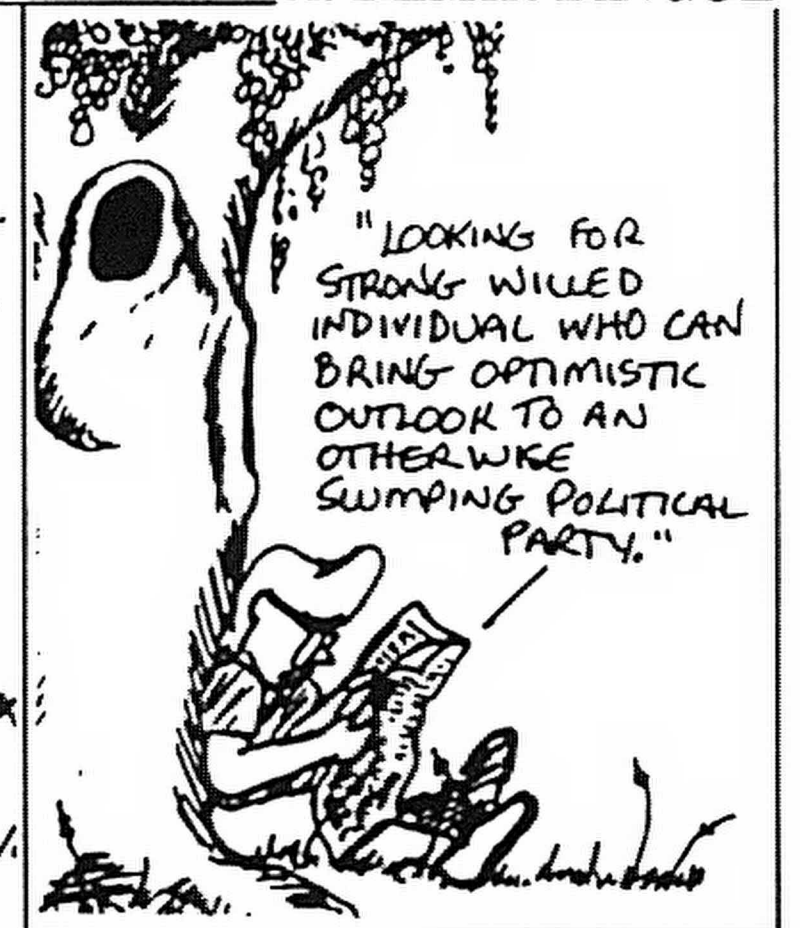

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# "Vision Thing" builds on cult status

Stare, for a moment, into the fire. Look past the flames, to the embers burning ever so brightly, performing the mesmerizing final dance of their short lives as they turn and soar toward their infinite sleep, burning ever toward darkness. That's the dark, somber sound of The Sisters of Mercy.

With the release of "Vision Thing," the band's third album, The Sisters is building upon a cult status that has elevated vocalist Andrew Eldritch, his work, and his offstage antics to near-mythical proportions.

Eldritch, who has a deep, growling, tortured vocal style, is the brains behind The Sisters of Mercy, as well as its founder, songwriter and constant focal point.

He started it all in 1980 in Leeds, England.

"There was a gap," Eldritch explains. "Everybody in London, which is where the whole English music industry is, was promoting at the time, very much like they are today, in fact, a rather

hideous blend of cocktail and disco music.

"Nobody I knew up in Northern England could relate to that," he remembers. "We had our own different

thing going."

So Eldritch, along with original guitarist Gary Marx, formed The Sisters of Mercy.

"We had a fuzz bass, a very cheap

drum machine, and I used to shout a lot through an echo machine," he recalled. "People really got off on it."

A few months later, "Damage Done," the Sisters' first single, was released on their own Merciful Release label, to instant acceptance.

"We spent the following 10 years trying to keep as much of that as possible," says Eldritch of the early sound, "while fitting it into song at the same time, which is not easy."

Eldritch originally got into music, he says, "because it seemed the natural thing to do if you were a punk rocker. Everybody was in a band then. Someone asked me to play on their record, so I did and it just kind of grew from there."

"Long after that," Eldritch continued, "people started saying, 'Andrew, you're actually quite good at certain elements of this,' and people

Parkway. Sandra was due home at 2 am and Keith told her mother he would have her home early.

Sandra and Keith attended classes together at CNC for two semesters before their disappearance. Keith is described by Mrs. Hailey as friendly, outgoing and personable.

Sandra, said Mrs. Hailey, is the type of person who is "friends to everybody, happy-go-lucky," no matter from what background they come or who they are.

"Sandra worked three jobs and went to school, and then someone interrupts her life like this. But you don't just touch one life, you touch many lives," said Mrs. Hailey.

Keith's father, Richard Call, is offering a \$10,000 reward for information leading to discovery of the couple. An additional \$1,000 is being offered by the local Anheuser-Busch Teamsters Union.

To help cope with his son's disappearance, Call is involved in a group called Friends and Family Against Crime Today (FFACT).

FFACT members are friends and family of unsolved murder victims or missing persons. They work with the police to make sure efforts are continued to solve the crimes, and that the cases are kept in the public eye.

Mrs. Hailey is working through children's organizations "Children's Rights of Pennsylvania" and California-based "Vanished Children's Alliance," which have sent Sandra's picture across the country.

A "Call-Hailey/FFACT" bowling tournament is being planned for May 11. The money raised will be divided between Mrs. Hailey and FFACT. The tournament will include celebrities and may be held at Denbigh Bowling Lanes. Further information will be announced.

CNC's Alpha Kappa Psi sponsored a car wash and raised \$200. A check will be presented to Mrs. Hailey for the Hailey Hope Fund, which was established to finance the on-going investigation.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Call are having a memorial for Keith and Sandra Apr. 13 at 10:30 am at the Yorktown overlook off the Colonial Parkway.

The public is encouraged to attend.

## New officers to be added to CNC campus police force

New personnel will be added to the campus police force; however, they will not be sworn police officers.

Due to budget cuts, security officers will fill two positions recently opened for hourly officers. The new officers will not need the academy training which sworn police officers require; the cost of academy training is approximately \$6,000.

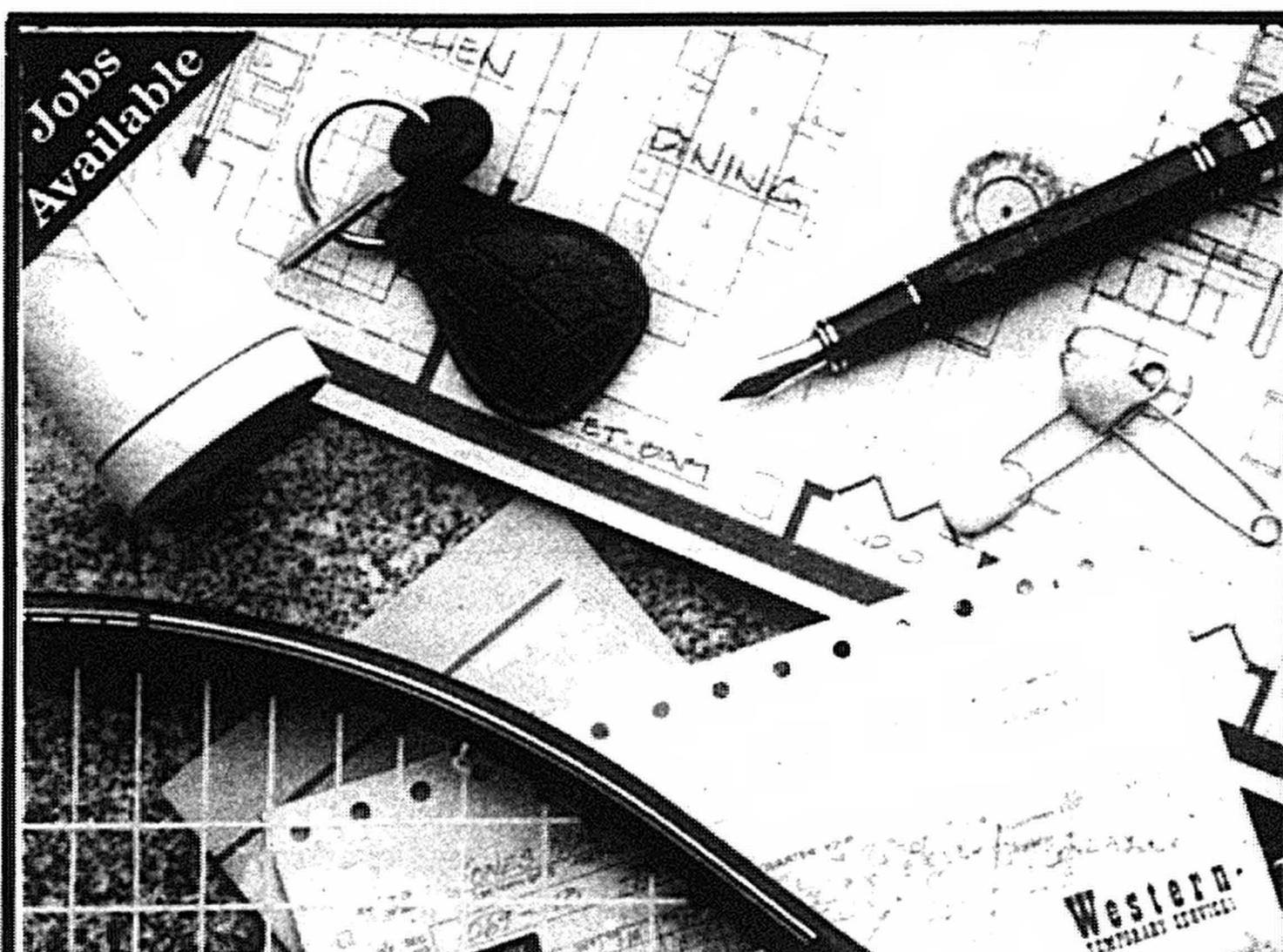
The officers will supplement the campus police force. Their primary tasks will include securing buildings and patrolling the campus.

To aid in distinguishing between campus police officers and security officers, campus police will change from light blue shirts to darker blue shirts; the insignia will remain the same.

The new shirts will be short-sleeved and ties will not be worn. The security officers will wear light blue shirts. The change in uniform will occur within the next couple weeks.

"People like changes," said Chief Bright of the campus police. "It's a boost of morale to the officers."

One security officer will begin within the next couple of weeks, and another will be added to the force at the beginning of the next budget year.



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# Rate your potential for getting ahead

**W**ith the coming of Spring, the class of 1991 will be facing its biggest challenge this side of finals—competing successfully for a job after graduation.

It is no secret that the college campus and corporate America are worlds apart, and in today's competitive job market, graduates need to adapt accordingly.

Many collegians are not always adequately prepared for their first encounter with business. According to a recent survey, even straight "A" students often get failing grades in good grooming and making a successful first impression on recruiters.

How people change from the Walls of Ivy to the Halls of Business was the subject of a study by Audits & Surveys, a New York-based market research firm. A total of 250 young (age 21 to 30) professionals from around the country were queried.

The survey found that, in addition to the changes graduates undergo in areas such as eating and drinking, sleep and living arrangement, there is an increased emphasis on good grooming.

Among young professionals in New York, Atlanta, Chicago, Dallas and Los Angeles, Audits & Surveys found that only 50 percent of the respondents said they considered good grooming important while they were in college. However, 90 percent of those same young professionals now consider good grooming important to getting ahead professionally.

Audits & Surveys also surveyed 250 personnel professionals nationwide how many applicants met such grooming and first impression standards as wearing a suit, trimming their nails and making frequent eye contact.

More than one-quarter of the corporate, executive recruiters and agency personnel people who responded said that less than half of their applicants met the six basic first impression and grooming standards.

Although 83 percent did say that job seekers generally wore a proper suit, attention to detail often stopped there.

The most common mistake among male job applicants was the failure to have a good shoe-shine; 43 percent of the survey respondents said that less than half of the young men they saw had freshly-shined shoes. Among women applicants, the lack of a firm handshake was the number one mistake.

"The Image Index is designed to enable people to calculate their prospects for getting ahead in situations where first impressions are important," explained Edward L. Collier, president of Kiwi Brands. This includes getting a new job, earning a promotion or completing a successful sales presentation.

The Image Index, developed in conjunction with Donald and Karen Kaufman of Kaufman Professional Image Consultants of Philadelphia, lists 12 elements that make up a person's overall image.

According to Donald Kaufman, anything that calls attention to itself, either negatively or positively, can detract from an overall favorable impression.

*Find out how your potential for getting ahead rates. One is designed for men and one for women. The tests are based on the probability of making the best first impression on the greatest number of people in business and professional situations. To take the test, simply circle the number opposite the entry that best describes you. Then, total up your score according to the directions following the test, and gauge your Image Index.*

## Image Index for men

### SHIRTS

1. Long-sleeved, all-cotton, white, striped or pastel.
2. Button-down oxford, any color.
3. Short-sleeved, or anything that is wash and wear.

### TIES

1. All silk with a subtle pattern or stripe.
2. Knit ties.
3. Clip-ons.

### SUITS

1. Traditional single-breasted, navy or grey pinstriped, expertly tailored and well-pressed.
2. Designer double-breasted, with bold patterns or weave, molded to body.
3. Prefer sports jacket and slacks.

### SHOES

1. Classic dress shoes that tie, always freshly shined.
2. Usually casual, rarely shined.
3. Don't think about shining shoes.

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### SOCKS

1. Mid or over-the-calf, brown, navy or black.

### HAIR

1. Regularly cut in a conservative style.
2. Sometimes need a haircut.
3. Always worn in the latest avant-garde style.

### NAILS

1. Groom at least once a week.
2. Clip and clean nails occasionally.
3. Bite regularly.

### JEWELRY

1. Classic style watch, leather or metal band.
2. Wear a sporty watch.
3. Don't usually wear a watch.

### HANDSHAKE

1. Firm with both men and women.
2. Firm with men and limp with women.
3. Squeeze hard to show superiority.

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# Captains man-handle Panthers

This past weekend the Captains swept a doubleheader from nationally ranked Ferrum to gain a share of the Dixie Conference lead after the first games of conference play.

CNC tamed the Panthers, 5-3 and 2-1, before falling in the final game of the series, 13-6. These two wins tied the Captains with N.C. Wesleyan which took its series from Methodist, two games to one.

The week began with a 12-6 win over Bridgewater, as freshman **Jasen Simpson** equalled his own school record with six RBIs. However, the game proved to be a bad one in that **Greg Mears**, the starting first baseman who has provided some potent hitting, suffered a broken wrist on a bunt attempt and will be out about four weeks.

The following day CNC's school-record 12-game winning streak was snapped in a surprising 7-4 defeat at the hands of Eastern Mennonite.

The two games against the tough Ferrum Panthers proved to be a bite-and-claw contest. In the opener, strong

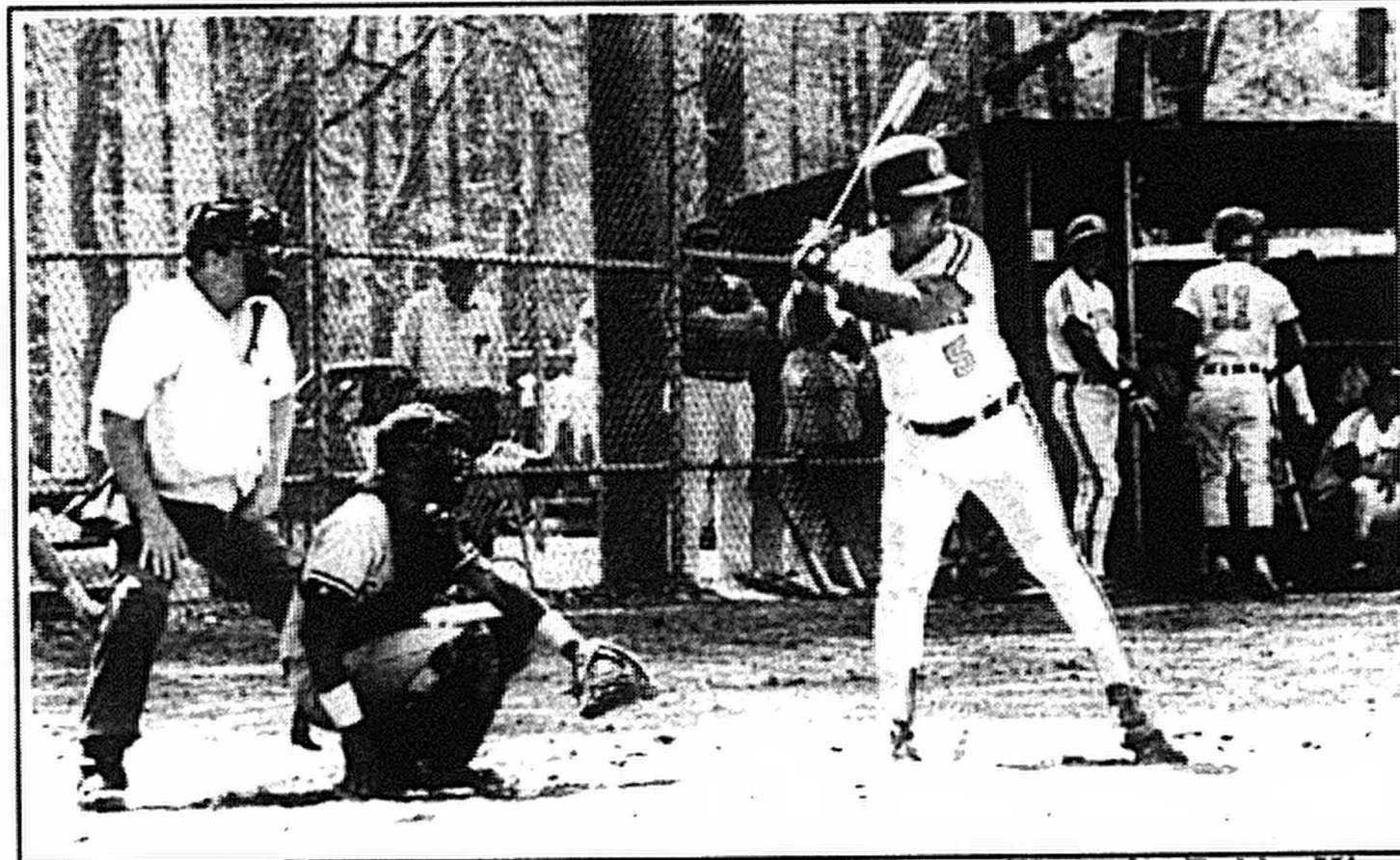

performances were provided by **Dwayne Ray** and **Tab Pabst**. Ray picked up his sixth win of the season with a commanding fastball and disabling off-speed pitches. Pabst secured the win with his second save of the year by striking out the side in the eighth inning with the bases loaded and one out. He provided an emotional spark with his "Mad Hungar-

ian" impression.

In the nightcap Pabst hurled a five-hitter, striking out 12 in the 2-1 victory. **Ricky St. Peter**, who filled in for the injured Mears, had the game-winning hit. In addition, **Elly Bratton** led the Captains with two hits in each of the games.

The Panthers took the series finale 13-6 despite two home runs by Pabst.

## "L" moves closer to the big time

In a recent article in *The Daily Press*, David Teel reported the extraordinary performances of CNC basketball star **Lamont Strothers** in the Portsmouth Invitational Tournament. Teel stated Strothers has impressed NBA scouts with his explosive scoring, tenacious defense, team leading, and aggressiveness.

He was the leading scorer of the tournament with 67 points over three games. Furthermore, he has played good defense by blocking shots, draw-

ing charges, and stealing passes. Overall his aggressiveness was his most outstanding characteristic. Portland Trailblazer scout Keith Drum stated how Strothers' aggressiveness has impressed him, and that this quality is important in a player.

To sum up Strother's performance, John Gabriel, director of scouting for the Orlando Magic, said "The main thing for Lamont was to show he could compete at this level. He has done that, and more."

In an update, Lamont is in Florida for the Orlando Classic this week. The Classic is a smaller field of 36 players

by invitation rather than the PIT field of 64 by invitation. This makes it harder to be invited, and is another level up from the PIT, so Lamont will have to work just as hard.

Furthermore, he has been invited to a tournament in Chicago, taking place in the beginning of June. This tournament is directed by the NBA and its coaches. Thus, there will be even more pressure put on him due to the number of scouts. The NBA draft will be held in late June and if things go right, Lamont will be one of the 54 chosen in the draft.

## Tracksters take Classic

The men's and women's teams both captured the team titles at the 10th Annual Captain's Classic, the eighth time each has won the meet.

The men pulled off a surprise victory, without the services of top sprinters **Ed Milling** and **Warner Seay**, who were both injured.

Freshman **Brian Gwaltney** took the 110-meter hurdles (15.28) and the 400-meter hurdles (57.18), while **Greg Davenport** won the 400 meters (50.35). In addition, **Jerome Valree**

won the 800 meters (1:55.10).

But CNC did not clinch the title until **G.W. Dameron** placed second in the 5,000 meters, the next to last event, and Davenport rallied his 400-meter relay team from third place to victory in the meet's last event.

Five different women won events for the CNC women's team. **Lisa Molineaux** won the javelin (105-3); **Sandy Shelton** took the long jump (18-4); **Cynthia Bryant** captured the 200-meter hurdles (15.40); **Toni Bass** won the triple jump (34-9 1/2); and **Carey Foar** was victorious in the 800 meters (2:24.8). In addition, CNC won both relays.

**Softball:** The Lady Captains lost three close games in their first excursion into the tough softball of the Northeast.

Before venturing north, CNC won twice over Division II St. Paul's on Wednesday Apr. 3. In the 13-3 opening game win, **Jennifer Fields** collected three hits, including a home run, and had five RBIs.

Fields then had a triple, homer and six RBIs in a 16-4 win in the nightcap, and **Deanna Blythe** added three hits and three RBIs.

In the first game of the Montclair St. Tournament, CNC took on the hosts and quickly fell behind, 11-0. But CNC fought back, closing within a final margin of 11-9.

Following a 5-2 loss to Ithaca, CNC dropped a 2-1 decision to Cortland St., with the winning run coming in the bottom of the seventh inning.

**Women's Tennis:** The Lady Captains split a pair of tight Dixie Conference matches, but lost to defending champion Methodist, 9-0.

CNC won the first three singles and the No. 1 doubles against Ferrum, but lost the lower matches in a 5-4 defeat.

But all three doubles teams came through in a 6-3 win over Averett. Newcomer **Kim Schenk** scored a key victory at No. 6 singles, and teamed with **Dawn LeCounte** for a win at No. 3 doubles.

**Men's Tennis:** Bridgewater took the top two singles and No. 1 doubles, but the bottom of the CNC order came through for a 6-3 victory.

**Matt Allen**, **Robert Downen**, **George Davis**, and **Mike Gibson** all captured singles matches, while Allen and Downen teamed for a No. 2 doubles win and Davis hooked up with **Marty Reinfeld** to win at No. 3.

Later, Lynchburg swept the Captains, 9-0.

started encouraging me. That's when we started taking it seriously. That would have been about 1982, when we started realizing the potential power of what we had."

A handful of singles and live performances won the Sisters a small, though loyal European following,

prompting Warner Brothers to offer the band worldwide distribution of the band's records in 1984.

The spring of 1985 saw the release of the self-titled Sisters' debut album, which jumped immediately into the U.K. Top 20 album chart, yielding a number of hit singles in the process.

It wouldn't be until two-and-a-half years later, with the 1987 release of the single "This Corrosion," that the Sisters would become known stateside.

The alternative music scene happily embraced "The Sisters of Mercy," the album release that followed. The enigmatic "Floodland" came next, selling a respectful 200,000 copies in the U.S. market and providing college radio with two additional hit singles, "Dominion" and "Lucretia My Reflection."

Of "Vision Thing," Eldritch says, "it's loud and it's exciting and it's very funny."

"I don't think that rock music,

certainly not the way I do it, is in the business of converting people or persuading them of anything that they don't know already. One, I think that that's a conceited thing to do, and secondly, I just don't think that I'm very good at it."

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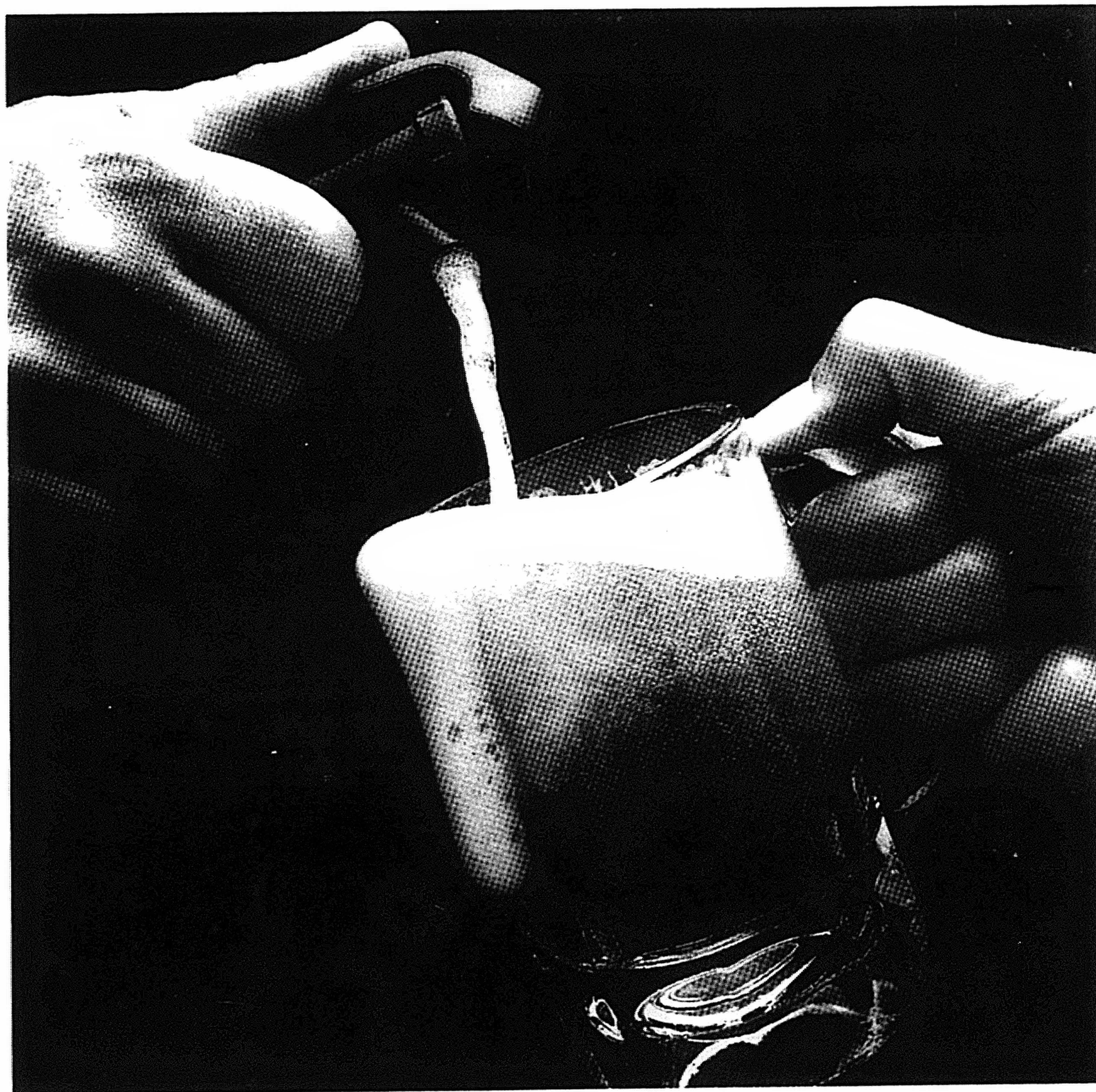
