

.GRANTS AND FELLOWSHIPS

National Science Foundation

NSF's Office of Science Information Service (OSIS) is currently accepting applications for FY 1976 assignments as Scholar-in-Residence under provision of the Intergovernmental Personnel Mobilization Act. Assignments are for 4-month periods, between July 1, 1975, and June 30, 1976, and include completion of an approved research project and professional interaction with members of the OSIS staff. To qualify for this assignment, an individual must currently hold a position with a college or university or State or local government agency.

The purpose is to augment OSIS' staff analytical capability by providing the assignee an opportunity for independent research of an interdisciplinary nature within a Federal Government science support agency. Inquiries should be forwarded to Robert S. Cutler, OSIS, NSF, Washington, D.C. 20550. Applicants should include a vita and description of research interest.

National Institutes of Health

The Swedish Medical Research Council will make available in 1975 three research fellowships to qualified biomedical scientists who are citizens of the U.S.A. They will provide research experience and training in Sweden at the postdoctoral level in basic or clinical sciences related to health.

Candidates must have a doctoral degree and must have been engaged in independent responsible research. They must present evidence of aptitude and promise in basic

science or clinical research with an active interest in pursuing a research career.

It is the applicant's responsibility to arrange for his research training with the preceptor in Sweden under whom he will train. Fellowships will normally extend for 12 months after the starting date. The fellowship award will cover payment of a stipend and transportation expenses.

The deadline for receipt of completed applications is January 31, 1975. An NIH committee will review applications and forward nominations to the Swedish Medical Research Council. Final selection will be made at the May 1975 meeting of the Swedish and nominees will be notified of the results shortly thereafter.

NIH provides National Research Service Awards to postdoctoral individuals for training experiences in specified areas of biomedical and behavioral research. Awards are made to individual applicants, for specified training proposals, selected as a result of a national competition. Provisions of this announcement are tentative in nature and their final applicability will depend upon their being consistent with final regulations, which are now being developed and will be published in the Federal Register.

Applicants must be citizens or non-citizen nationals of the United States, or have been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence. As of the beginning date of the proposed fellowship, an applicant must have received a Ph.D., M.D., D.D.S., D.O., D.V.M., O.D., Sc.D., D.Eng., D.N.S., or equivalent domestic or foreign degree Proposed study must encompass biomedical research training with an opportunity to carry out supervised research in specified areas, and offer opportunity to researchhealth scientists, research clinicians, etc., to broaden their scientific background, or to extend their potential for research in health-related areas. Christopher Newport College is host to a Symposium on Outdoor Recreation in Virginia to be held in Gosnold Hall 145, Thursday (November 14) beginning at 9:15 A.M.

The Symposium is being sponsored by Christopher Newport College and Virginia Commission of Outdoor Recreation.

The speakers for the morning and afternoon sessions will be Richard G. Gibbons, Landscape Architect of the Virginia Division of State Parks, James F. McInteer, Assistant Executive Director of the Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries, Charles E. Sheed Jr., Assistant to the Mid-Atlantic Regional Director and the National Park Service's Bicentennial Coordinator for Virginia, Carl P. Schreiber, Chief of Planning of the Virginia Commission of Outdoor Recreation, Parker Nelson, Executive Vice President of the Virginia Travel Council, and L. Gregory Low, Middle Atlantic Representative for the Nature Conservancy.

Dr. James C. Windsor, President of CNC, will give welcoming remarks to the Symposium delegates.

Dr. E. Spencer Wise, Associate Professor of Biology at CNC, will preside at the morning session, and Rob R. Blackmore, Director of Virginia Commission of Outdoor Recreation, will preside at the afternoon session.

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EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE

The Tidewater Conference on Early Childhood Development sponsored by the Prepared Parents Society and conducted by the Psychology Department of Christopher Newport College will be held at the CNC Campus Center, Saturday, October 26th from 9:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M.

The conference will have as its theme "Enriching Your Child's Environment," and will hold 16 90-minute workshops.

Some of the topics to be discussed at the conference will be "Turning Your Child on to Life; Enriching the Environment of the Newborn Child; Everything You Wanted to Know About Childhood Sexuality but Were Afraid to Ask: Growing Up In The Technological Society; and the Effects of T.V. and Movies on Children's Behavior."

Dr. Lee Doerries, CNC Assistant Professor of Psychology, and Mrs. Kenneth Allen of the Prepared Parent's Society of the Peninsula are the directors of the conference.

Leading the topics discussions will be Dr. Doerries and Dr. Ruth Mulliken, Professors of Psychology: Dr. Robert Wildblood, Assistant Professor of Psychology and Director of the Counseling Center: Dr. Bruce Hoiberg, Assistant Professor of Psychology, all faculty members of CNC. Ms. Lois Fears, Assistant Professor of Early Childhood Education and Ms. Jane Goldman, Instructor of Early Childhood Education, both of Hampton Institute: and Drs. John and Sandra Gadell, Assistant Professors of Education of Old Dominion University.

The purpose of the Prepared Parents Society is to provide the community with a resource of information and education on the various aspects of parenthood and family life.

This conference is designed for parents. All workshops will be structured to

TRIP TO FRANCE

The Department of Modern Languages is organizing a trip which offers to all students the opportunity to earn three credits by studying French at the Alliance Francaise while enjoying life in Paris from May 15 to June 15.

The Alliance can accommodate students at all levels of language ability. No previous knowledge of French is necessary, and all placement is on the basis of examination. Classes run on a two-hour per day schedule, leaving free time for individual interests and excursions. Room and partial board are available with French families.

The approximate comprehensive cost of the four-week program will be \$600 - \$700, depending upon the size of the group. The fee includes round-trip air fare (N.Y. - Luxembourg), train to Paris, tuition and fees, and room and partial board. Anyone interested in further details is invited to attend an informational meeting which will be held at noon on Monday, November 25th, in W-203.

PHILOSOPHY LECTURE

Dr. John N. Findlay, university professor of philosophy at Boston University, will speak at Christopher Newport College in Newport Hall 125, Friday (November 15) at 12 noon.

Dr. Findlay's topic will be "Essence, Existence, and Personality." He will give the same lecture at Old Dominion University, Thursday (November 14) at 8:00 P.M. in the Arts and Letters Auditorium.

The lecture is the second in a series of Hampton Roads Franklin J. Matchette Lectures in Philosophy. The series are being sponsored jointly by the philosophy departments of Christopher Newport College, Old Dominion University, Hampton Institute, Virginia Wesleyan College, and Norfolk State College in cooperation with Tidewater Community College and Thomas Nelson Community College.

The lecture series are funded by the Franklin J. Matchette Foundation in New York, the only private foundation dedicated to public propagation. The foundation grants \$50 000 annually for lectures throughout the country.

The theme for the Hampton Roads lecture series is 'The Concept of the Individual."

Dr. Findlay was born in South Africa, attended Oxford University, England as a Rhodes Scholar where he received his B.A. and M.A. degrees, and his Ph.D. degree from the University of Graz in Austria.

Prior to joining the Boston University in 1972, he held the following previous positions at the University of Otago in New Zealand, Rhodes University and Natal

University in South Africa, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, England, University of London, England, University of Texas and Yale University.

Among his major books are Meinong's Theory of Object and Values, Hegal: A Re-Examination, Values and Intentions, and Plato: The Written and Unwritten Doctrines.

Dr. Findlay was elected Fellow of the British Academy in 1956, and he gave the Gifford Lectures at St. Andrews University, St. Andrews, Scotland.

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Drs. Ross Brackney and Steve Sanderlin attended the annual convention of the South Atlantic Modern Language Association in Washington, D.C., from October 31 to November 2. Seminars in American, Renaissance English, and world literature were attended, as well as meetings of the American Dialect Society and the Committee on Freshmen English. It was found that colleges and universities all over the South are facing the problem of freshmen who come with high grades but cannot write correct or effective English. Since neither transformational grammar nor structural linguistics can describe Standard American English, many English Departments are returning to traditional (classical) grammar and to a demanding review of the fundamentals of Standard American English. (Minority groups were represented in Washington by an Indian summer during that period of time.)
