The Consul General of Japan, The Honorable Takayuki Kimura, will speak to the CNC faculty, students and guests in the Anderson Auditorium at 3:30 p.m. on September 28. The topic will be "Japan-U.S. Relations" and "Japan-American Trade Issues."

The Consul General is the number one representative for the Japanese Government in the Southeast Region of America which includes Virginia. He is headquartered in Atlanta, GA.

The Consul General is visiting Newport News to discuss Japan-U.S. relations with business, civic, government and education leaders.

Consul General Kimura believes that his visit to Newport News will give him the opportunity of learning first-hand about the area's dynamic social, cultural and business climate.

Distractions ---- Can Cause Accidents

During the fiscal year 1986-1987, drivers of state-owned vehicles were ruled to have contributed to 58 percent of all crashes. This represents a decrease when compared to the previous year's 59 percent. Although the decrease is small, it indicates that we are moving in the proper direction.

The major causative factor for state-owned vehicle crashes continues to be inattention. In 1987, 43 crashes involving state-owned vehicles were attributed to "driver inattention."

Defensive drivers recognize the accident potential of minor distractions. These can be avoided by:

1. Advance planning.

2. Checking seat position, safety belts, door locks

and mirrors before you start.

3. Pulling off the road and stopping to take care of necessary tasks that may divert attention from the road.

Close shaves are warnings. Safe drivers keep their minds on driving.

Lost and Found Program

In order for the lost and found program to work effectively, it must be properly maintained. The Campus Police Office is responsible for the lost and found program and relies upon your cooperation. Any item found on campus must be immediately reported to the Campus Police Office. A campus police officer will retrieve the item, tag it, and turn it over to the campus police secretary for storage. The secretary logs all reports of lost property and uses these to match found property with the owner. Every possible effort is made to return the item to the owner.

This system can work much more efficiently if all offices on campus comply. Please do not assume that the owner of the lost property will remember where he/she last saw it! If items are turned in immediately, campus police has a good chance of finding the owner. We have received numerous requests for lost items, but have had few turned in. If you are holding something, please let us know and direct any future inquiries to our office.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Student Assessment Steering Committee Meeting

The committee met on September 14, 1988 to review assessment activities in the current year. Most of the discussion centered around formulating a revised assessment strategy for general education.

One strategy will be to examine closely an approach now being developed and used at The College of William and Mary. It was recommended by Dr. Margaret Miller, of SCHEV, that we examine their model, which makes use of portfolios consisting of students' aggregated work, to see whether the methods might be adopted for our use.

Another strategy will be to review evidence on the assessment instruments which are available from the College Outcome Measures Program (COMP) of the American College Testing Program (ACT). To this end we will invite a representative from ACT-COMP to visit the campus as soon as practicable.

A number of concerns and issues were discussed regarding each of these two approaches. The committee agreed that using multiple methods of sampling student outcomes is preferred, and that it will be important to re-evaluate the elements of our plan at regular intervals.
