

Discussion, Actions, Decisions:

I. Summer Update

Professor Royall described the Self-Study work and planning that took place over the summer. This update to the Steering Committee included the new Steering Committee membership, workshop planning, the operations of the Self-Study office and the questionnaire completed by Dr. Lopater to be reviewed by the Steering Committee.

II. Old Business

A. The organizational chart, calendar and prospectus for the Self-Study was discussed and approved with some minor editorial changes. These three documents will be sent to the VPAA for approval and forwarded to the College Commission of the Southern Association for their acceptance. Copies of these documents will appear in a future edition of the Chronicle.

B. The membership of Standard Committees was discussed and suggestions were made regarding vacancies. The "working pool" of possible participants was enlarged and the director was asked to continue efforts to secure alumni and students for committee work. A list of committee participants will be published in a future edition of the Chronicle.

III. New Business

The In-House Manual was distributed to the Steering Committee. Professor Royall discussed its' content and purpose.

IV. Report from SCRAP Director

A. Dr. Lopater distributed 10 sets of questionnaires developed for each

of the standard committees. He discussed the ways the Steering Committee might use these questionnaires and the function of the Special Committee on Research, Analysis and Projection (SCRAP).

B. The Steering Committee established the data base parameters. The data for the initial study will fall between July 1, 1979 and August, 1984. An update to include data from the 1984-85 academic term will be used by standard committees if and when the data is available.

C. Dr. Lopater discussed the possibility of a departmental study as a part of the larger Institutional Wide Self-Study. As a result of this discussion, the Steering Committee referred the matter to the SCRAP Committee to review ways the departmental studies might interfere with the work of the Program Review Committee. A report will be forthcoming.

What is needed to register?

You are required to furnish full legal name • residence address • date & place of birth • length of residence at current address • social security number • any previous place of registration • Given under oath to the registrar •

When can I register?

Anytime prior to October 6, '84 (30 days prior to the general election)

Where can I register?

Information is available from the Grants Coordinator for 1985 Summer Stipends offered by NEH. These Summer Stipends provide \$3000 in support of two consecutive months of full-time

study or research. CNC may nominate three faculty members to NEH for consideration of the stipends. NEH particularly encourages applicants undertaking projects of an historical or philosophical treatment of the social and natural sciences.

In observation of the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution, NEH is offering stipends for study dealing with the philosophical and historical questions surrounding the Constitution and the founding period. There is no limit to the number of applicants that can apply for this stipend.

Deadline for applications for both programs is October 1, 1984. Awards will be announced by mid-March, 1985.

White House Fellowships

The White House Fellowship program, beginning its nineteenth year, is designed to provide gifted and highly motivated Americans with firsthand experience in the process of governing the Nation and a sense of personal involvement in the leadership of the society.

U.S. citizens are eligible to apply during the early and formative years of their careers. There are no basic educational requirements and no special career or professional categories. Employees of the Federal Government are not eligible, with the exception of career military personnel of the Armed Services. The Commission seeks candidates of demonstrated excellence in their professional roles as well as significant breadth of interests and community involvement.

During their one year assignments in Washington, Fellows serve as special assistants to Cabinet Secretaries, or senior members of the White House staff. Additionally, Fellows participate in an extensive education program including seminars with top government officials, leading scholars, journalists and private sector leaders.

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
