Violations of the Code for Academic Work

Professors who discover firm and reliable evidence that a student has cheated have the serious responsibility to determine whether such an offense has taken place. If such firm evidence is discovered of willful cheating, the student should be called in and confronted with the evidence. If he admits guilt, the professor must, if he considers the violation serious, drop the student from the course with an "F." A letter stating the reason for the grade and signed by the professor and the student, is then sent to the President's confidential file. If the infraction is minor and the student repentant, the professor may simply wish to give a grade of zero for the work in question, counting that as part of the student's other grades in the course. The Smith Library is pleased to announce that it has been accepted for membership in SOLINET, the Southeastern Library Network. SOLINET is a consortium of 200 libraries in the Southeast and permits the library to communicate by computer with OCLC (Ohio College Library Center), a nationwide consortium of 1,300 libraries. The capability of such communication by computer will assist the library in acquiring and cataloging materials and in interlibrary loan. Membership will also enable the library to build a machine readable data base of our library's holdings.

Department of General Services

<u>Division of Purchases and Supply Directive No. 1 (79)</u>

<u>Subject: Printing Purchase Orders</u>

Recently, the Division of Purchases and Supply has been receiving confirming orders for the purchase of certain printed matter in cases where bids for the subject printing were taken at the agency level.

This directive will serve as a notice that <u>all printed matter must be bid by</u> the Division of Purchases and Supply without exception, as written in Sections 2.1-458 and 2.1-460 of the Code of Virginia.

<u>Division of Purchases and Supply Directive No. 2 (79)</u> Subject: Lease and Lease/Purchase Contracts

Effective this date all contracts for the lease or lease/purchase of any material, equipment or supply must be submitted to the Division of Purchases and Supply for written approval prior to execution of a contract by any individual on behalf of an agency or institution of the State government. Approval of the Division of Purchases and Supply will include coordination with, and approval of, the State Treasurer.

This directive governs contracts for acquiring such items as, but not limited to, radios, printing and reproduction equipment, vehicles, dictating and other office equipment, etc. It does not govern contracts, however, solely for servicing equipment of buildings of State facilities, such as, but not limited to, elevators, boilers, office equipment, termite or rodent control, etc.
