

Curriculum Committee

The Curriculum Committee met January 27, 1989, at 2 p.m. In attendance were Glenn Weber, who presided over the meeting, Deans Powell, Durel, and Hunter, and Professors Lawrence Mills, Sanford Lopater, Jennilou Grotevant (sitting in for Wendell Barbour), and Madeline Smith. The following business was transacted:

- I. The Curriculum Committee unanimously agreed to recommend to the Faculty Senate that SOCL 301 (Principles of Sociology) be added to the curriculum.
- II. The Curriculum Committee unanimously agreed to recommend to the Faculty Senate that FNAR 377 (Contemporary Art) be added to the curriculum.
- III. The Curriculum Committee unanimously agreed to recommend to the Faculty Senate that FNAR 374 be divided into two courses-FNAR 374, Arts and Asia, and FNAR 375, Primitive Art (Pre-Columbian American, African, and Oceanic).
 - IV. In compliance with the College requirement that courses be housed within an academic department, the Curriculum Committee agreed to recommend to the Faculty Senate that College Studies 101 be housed temporarily with the English Department, but that it be advertised in the Registration News as College Studies. The recommendation is contingent upon the approval of the English Department.
 - V. Professor Douglas Gordon appeared before the committee to address his concerns regarding independent studies. The questions he raised were as follows:
 - 1. Are they subject to assessment?
 - 2. Are independent studies used to circumvent other, more demanding courses?
 - 3. Is the independent studies form now in use adequate?

The committee agreed to ask the dean's to solicit information from department chairs--procedures followed in their departments and their suggestions regarding the use of independent studies.

- VI. The Director of Student Records, Brenda Blount, was unanimously approved as a permanent non-voting member of the Curriculum Committee.
- VII. The Curriculum Committee approved a subcommittee of three members (Dean Powell and Professors Lopater and Smith) to consider the feasibility of keeping the International Studies

Program housed with International Culture and Commerce.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:45 p.m.

Institutional Review Board for the Protection of Human Subjects

The IRB met on February 2, 1989 to consider the plans of the Student Assessment Committee to conduct research on student subjects via administration of the ACT-COMP examination. A brief report of this proposed research appeared in the Chronicle on January 20, 1989, at which time prospective subjects had already been recruited. Initial testing is slated for 2/13/89. Upon the request of the IRB Chairman, Dr. Dennis Ridley and Professor Harry Greenlee submitted further information to the IRB. With the addition and subsequent modification of a consent form and the written specification of the procedures for safeguarding confidentiality and use of scores, the IRB approved the Student Assessment Committee's plans.

Following this action, the IRB met briefly to discuss the formulation of criteria or general guidelines that might be used by prospective researchers in seeking approval from the IRB when their research involves contact with human subjects. The chairman will circulate a list of potential guidelines or principles and receive member comments and suggestions. When this list is available it will be published in the Chronicle and sent directly to Departmental Chairmen, Directors and Deans. Further, the IRB agreed that all committee actions should be reported in the Chronicle in order to further sensitize the College community to the role and function of the IRB.
