

Recently the Christopher Newport College 1985-86 Financial Aid Guide was distributed to all departments and to each faculty member. The wide distribution was made for two reasons. First, the newly published guide provides answers to most questions you may have about financial aid at CNC. It also lists all of the financial aid programs that are available to our students. Staff and faculty members involved in counseling students are encouraged to become familiar with eligibility criteria discussed on page 1 and satisfactory academic progress requirements on page 10. The second reason for the wide distribution is to solicit your comments and suggestions. This guide is the result of our first attempt to incorporate private scholarships, both need-based and non-need-based, as well as other non-need-based federal and state resources such as VA Benefits, Virginia War Orphans Education Scholarship and the Virginia Transfer Grant Program. Career Guidance Offered at CNC

Christopher Newport College currently offers career guidance programs and services through three of its offices for both the new entrant into the job market and the employed person who would like to re-examine personal talents and interests.

The Office of Counseling and Career Guidance as well as Smith Library's Media Services Department have available the Virginia VIEW Career Search microcomputer program. Virginia VIEW consists of a series of questions in several career/interest related categories; answers selected by the user determine the personal profile of career options. Virginia VIEW is available Monday through Friday in the Office of Counseling and Career Services (599-7046) and during all regular library hours in Media Services (599-7136).

Demonstrations of its use will be held Monday through Thursday, January 28 through 31, from 6 until 9 p.m. in the lobby of Smith Library.

Smith Library's Reference Department also provides resources and services for the job seeker. One such service, the Career Placement Registry, connects potential employees with employers across the country. At a reasonable cost, résumés can be entered into and reviewed by users of this national online database.

For the professional already on the job who wishes to refocus his/her career goals, the Office of Continuing Education has prepared a day-long event. "Career Options for Professionals" will be offered March 23, coordinated by Dianna Batina. This annual program has recently been expanded to include options for teachers, human service professionals, retired military and those with "out-dated" college degrees.
