The Computer Center has arranged to offer an introductory computer course entitled "Introduction to Runoff" to all CNC secretaries.

Runoff is a versatile text-formatting software which provides users with limited word processing capabilities.

It is particularly useful to those who are faced with the tedious task of preparing standardized letters, technical reports, research papers, or tabloids, and, because it can be done on the computer, eliminates the need to type complex formats repeatedly. Minutes of the Regular November Meeting of the Christopher Newport College Faculty

November 11, 1983

The meeting was called to order at 3:06 p.m. in A-105. Dr. Summerville, Vice President for Academic Affairs, presided.

I. The minutes of the regular meeting of October 14, 1983 were approved.

II. Committee Reports:

- A. Academic Status Committee. (Dr. Mazzarella). No report.
- Admissions Committee. (Mr. Butchko).

1. Proposed Education Forum

- To establish linkage between CNC and local "feeder" secondary schools to create dialogues regarding changes in secondary schools' college preparatory programs and deliberations on CNC Admissions Policy issues.
- Proposed to take place during the second half of the spring semester, 1984.
- Will be reported to faculty as development unfolds.

2. Policy Changes

- In light of the deadline for catalogue revisions and given that final decisions have not been made regarding changes in Admissions Policy, the following rewording of extant policy was approved by the Committee: (cf. College Catalogue, p.3, "Classified Status," items 182.)

Item 1.

From: "Graduation from an accredited secondary school or its equivalent, as shown by examination.

To: (remove period and append) "and recommends those units associated with college preparatory programs. Students who plan to major in mathematics, science or engineering should choose their options accordingly."

Item 2.

From: "An overall grade average of "C" or better, in a program in the top halves of their classes."

To: "An overall grade average of "C" or better, and upon graduation to be ranked in the top half of their class."

- D. Degrees Committee (Dr. Paul). No report.

- E. Faculty Advisory Committee (Dr. Daly). No report.
- F. Faculty Evaluation Committee (Dr. Coker). No report.
- G. Nominations Committee (Dr. Herrmann). No report.
- III. President Anderson made brief remarks on a recent meeting at the Governor's Mansion; the court action involving Dr. Nauman; the proposed COC/SACS Accreditation Criteria and their importance; and, the ongoing interviews for a new Assistant to the President.
 - IV. Mr. Eagle, the Vice President for Financial Affairs, gave a report on the nature of liability claims and the insurance coverage in force for the CNC community.
 - V. A. Dr. Hoaglund was elected to fill a vacancy on the Faculty Advisory Committee.
 - B. Dr. Mazzarella was elected to fill a vacancy on the Faculty Evaluation Committee.
 - C. Drs. Maniyar and Weiss were elected to fill vacancies on the Faculty Hearing Committee.
 - D. This item of business was completed at the regular October meeting held on October 14, 1983.
 - E. The Curriculum Committee recommended approval of the following five courses:

Honors 290, Great Trials in History (3,3,0).

An interdisciplinary course designed to consider issues in a series of great trials.

Honors 291, Seminar in the Social Sciences (1,1,0).

An in-depth look at a limited issue, problem, technique, or topic in the social sciences.

Honors 292, Seminars in the Arts (1,1,0).

An in-depth look at limited issue, problem, series of works, or a consideration of techniques in the humanities or the arts.

Honors 293, Seminar in the Natural and Quantitative Sciences (1,1,0).

An in-depth look at a limited issue, problem, subject, or technique in the natural or quantitative sciences.

Honors 490, Changing Models in Civilization (3,3,0).

This course is designed to integrate the students' exposure to the distribution areas. It is an interdisciplinary course which relates different areas to one another, and takes the perspective of changes in human affairs over time. Specific topics will vary, depending upon the fields of the instructors.

Dr. Webb moved that "(open only to Styron Scholars)" be included after "(3,3,0)" for the first course, Honors 290. This motion was seconded and passed. Subsequently, the Curriculum Committee's amended recommendation for approval of the five courses as described above was passed.

F. Prof. Mary Lu Royall, the Director of the SACS Self Study, presented the following resolution:

Be It Resolved; That, the faculty of Christopher Newport College respectfully request that President John Anderson cast a negative vote on the proposed criteria for accreditation at the An-

nual College Delegate Assembly in New Orleans in December, 1983.

The Faculty of Christopher Newport College commends the efforts of the Commission and Task Force for its work on revision of the standards, and supports the reorganization of the proposed document. However, the CNC faculty expresses objections to being one of the first institutions to be evaluated under the "new criteria" without the accompanying manual to the criteria document and without the results of the two pilot studies the College Commission is conducting.

This motion was passed and the resolution as amended was also passed.

G. Dr. Daly, the Chairman of the Faculty Advisory Committee, presented the following motion:

That the Faculty Advisory Committee and the Vice Chairman of the Faculty constitute an ad hoc Faculty College Handbook Review Committee empowered to represent and speak for the Faculty as the official input group to the College Handbook Committee and the President regarding matters pertaining to the revision of the College Handbook. This group will invite input from members of the Faculty.

An editorial change for the word "input" was moved by Dr. Saunders. His motion was to change the word "Input" for "Faculty" in the first instance and to "reactions and suggestions" in the second instance. This motion passed.

A second motion to amend was made by Dr. Sacks. The motion was to change the initial wording from "that" to "empowered" to read as follows:

That the Faculty constitute an <u>ad hoc</u> Faculty College Handbook Review Committee, comprising the Faculty Advisory Committee and the Vice Chairman of the Faculty, "

This motion passed.

The original motion, as amended above, was then passed by the Faculty.

- H. The resolution offered by Profs. Pugh and Daly was passed.
- VI. Brief announcements were made by Dr. Miller, Dr. Petruchyk and Dr. Summerville.

Dr. Miller announced that the questionnaire distributed at the beginning of this meeting was to be completed and returned at the conclusion.

Dr. Petruchyk made the following announcement:

The Art Department has in its care several prize winning paintings that are part of the College collection. In order that they may be seen and appreciated, we are offering to loan them out to interested faculty or staff members for display in offices or other secure areas. Anyone desirous of acquiring one of these paintings on loan should contact David Alexick or Jon Petruchyk, Gosnold 143-C, ex. 7090.

- Case #1 Student petitioned to have data processing courses from TNCC evaluated as CPSC 210. Committee action: Recommend approval based on Computer Science Dept.'s evaluation.
- Case #2 Student petitioned to have courses taken prior to status change to classified status be counted toward 30-hour residency requirement.

Committee action: Recommend approval based on departmental request and student's record.

- Case #3 Student petitioned to be exempt from second natural science sequence requirement for the B.S.
- Committee action: Recommend approval based on error in 1982-83 CNC Catalog.
- Case #4 Student petitioned to use ENGL 201 and 207 to satisfy the Humanities requirement. Committee action: Recommend approval based on student's circumstances and departmental consent.
- Case #5 Student petitioned to join biology and chemistry course and lab sequences from VPI to satisfy the Natural Science requirement.
- Committee action: Recommend approval based on departmental consent and student's record in science courses.
- Case #6 Student petitioned to be released from the Physical Education requirement.

 Committee action: Recommend approval in the form of substitution of health, music or art practice as stipulated in college policy (physician's note attached).
- Case #7 Student petitioned to transfer CPSC 430 back to CNC following relocation in Texas. Committee action: Recommend approval on the basis of personal circumstances and the Computer Science Department's consent.
- Case #8 Student with an Accounting concentration petitioned to waive the Humanities requirement.

Committee action: Recommend approval based on error in the 1982 CNC Catalog.
