Junior Year

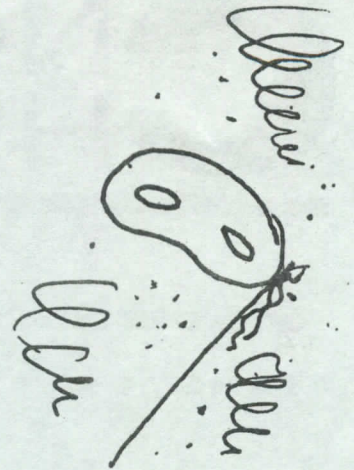
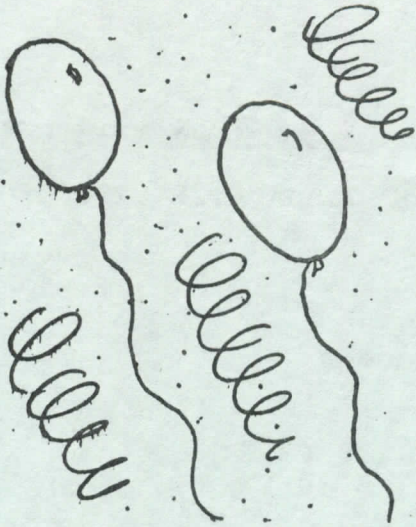
It has recently come to the attention of the Office of Career Planning and Placement that the Council of Higher Education for the Commonwealth of Virginia is offering two summer programs for students completing their junior year of undergraduate study. The two programs are: "The Summer Program for Undergraduate Virginians" and "The Summer Program for Minority Undergraduate Virginians." Both programs are promoting "Teaching as a Career" and they provide students with the opportunity to take at least one graduate level class and a seminar. The seminar will orient students to careers in higher education. The program will be approximately five to six weeks in duration. The Council of Higher Education will cover most costs along with providing a weekly stipend. Students who are interested must complete and mail all application materials by February 2, 1990. 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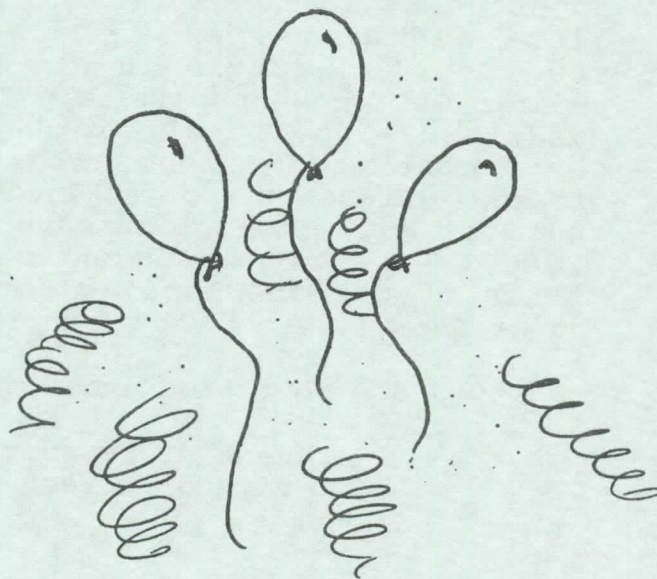

Due to the delay of the revision of the Purchase Requisition, FASB 7-20, Departmental Procurement of Goods, has been amended to reflect new procedures for processing and routing the PR. The most critical of these changes is that the PURCHASE REQUISITION IS AN INTERNAL DOCUMENT ONLY AND SHOULD NOT BE MAILED TO ANY VENDORS. Routine purchases should be completed on the PR and forwarded to the Purchasing Office. If a vendor requests a purchase order, a buyer from Purchasing Office will transfer the necessary information to a purchase order and forward it to the Vendor.

Each account manager should receive a copy of the revised FASB within the week.
