Dear Colleague:

Please help us reach undergraduate teachers interested in an opportunity to undertake summer study to invigorate their teaching.

Study Grants provide \$3,000 to free teachers from other responsibilities for six consecutive weeks of full-time summer study. The aim is to rekindle, through study of significant texts and topics, the teacher's engagement with the humanities; this in turn will enrich the teacher's undergraduate teaching.

Strong preference is given to undergraduate humanities teachers with heavy teaching responsibilities. Also receiving preference are teachers who have been in the classroom full-time for more than two years who do <u>not</u> have frequent opportunities for independent study.

Self-designed projects are for intensive study rather than research intended for publication. Course preparation or other responses to curricular demands fall outside the aims of Study Grants. Projects address a well-defined inquiry with specific aims to a reading list of primary and secondary works. Strongly encouraged are projects which examine significant texts, topics, and figures in the humanities.

Most undergraduate teachers, including those holding administrative and adjunct appointments, are eligible.

Among winners in the last competition were teachers at California State Fresno (CA), Talladega College (AL), Western Carolina State University (NC), Skidmore College (NY), Wheaton College (IL), Valencia Community College (FL), and the University of Wisconsin at Stout (WI).

Please tell teachers about this opportunity; we would especially appreciate display of the enclosed Study Grants poster. The next deadline, August 15, 1994, is for projects in the summer of 1995.
