will be funds available, and you won't know if you qualify unless you apply.

This year, Christopher Newport College's local chapter of the S. V. E. A. has been very active and has made a tremendous upswing in membership. Eagle accepts appointment

James D. Eagle has accepted the appointment as Vice President for Financial Affairs of Christopher Newport College to be effective January 1, 1982.

Eagle, a graduate of Duke University, holds a M.S. degree in Administration from George Washington University.

Eagle's appointment culminates a national search to replace Calvin E. Hones who retired as Vice President for Financial Affairs in June. Eagle previously served for three years as Budget Director for the College and has been Active Vice President for Financial Affairs since July 1.

Eagle who has had a broad range of administrative experience, will assume management duties as well as fiscal responsibility. In addition to the Controller, Budget, and Business Office, seven other department heads will report to him. They are the heads of Personnel, Purchasing, Capital Outlay, Bookstore, Building and Grounds, Security, Automated Data Processing.

Eagle sees Christopher Newport College moving into a second wave of high growth and maturity in the 1990's and he hopes to have a solid framework of resources ready for that growth.

"We serve an otherwise unmet need," Eagle explained. "We have a very high quality staff and faculty. Geographically the College is superbly located."

"We have had a successful twenty-year growth. I feel that there are three important factors which will stimulate a strong wave of growth at CNC in the '90's; these factors are the economy, the energy shortage and the third, the post World War II Baby Boom's children who will be of college age in seven or eight years," Eagl said.

Eagle has three children: two sons, age 23 and 18 and a daughter who is 21. His wife Doris is a broker with Harrison and Lear. They make their home in Hampton.

Darkroom available through club

The CNC Photographic Facility in the Campus Center is a unique and widely-useful students' resource. It was designed, managed and promoted by the late William Polis, former Dean of Student Affairs. Dean Polis understood the power of photography as a communication tool; he was always ready and eager to instill that understanding in his students.

The facility serves the College in diverse ways. It is the laboratory for the formal photographic courses of instruction; it is essential to the several school publications; it is also available to the entire student body, via the CNC Camera Club.

Two darkrooms, fully equipped with five enlargers with as many as 10 lenses and film carriers for all usual negative sizes comprise the facility. There are plentiful supplies of trays and tanks for processing print and film as well as print and film washers, an electric print-dryer, cutting boards, a mounting press, etc. For students wishing to make slides for seminar presentations, there is a copy stand. A stock of processing chemicals is always available, ready to use. The Camera Club maintains a modest library of books and periodicals.

In years past, the Camera Club has held photographic exhibits, organized field trips, sponsored lectures and demonstrations. It has served the college and its students by making individual and group pictures at graduation time. The pictures in the College Catalog are the work of Club members.

The Camera Club meets at the Campus Center, usually once a week, usually during the lunch hour. But, as is the case with all CNC student organizations, finding a meeting time that accommodates all members is virtually impossible. There is simply too wide a variation in the campus schedules of CNC students. So, at the beginning of each semester, the Club determines a meeting time that is the most convenient and agreeable for the maximum number of members.

The first Camera Club meeting of the spring semester will be announced in *The Captain's Log*. All members of the CNC community who have an interest in photography, who wish to learn more, or to help fellow members learn more about picture making, should attend this first meeting. The Camera Club invites all, whatever their level of photographic experience and competence, to join their fellow students who share a common interest.

The opening band for the States at their Chamberlin Hotel show on January 8, the Passions, show a definite quality in their sound. Their blues-wave was the perfect blend to lead off States.

It was an "educational experience to open for the States," comments Versprille modestly. His raspy speaking voice, when amplified and added to the guitars of Red Howard and Skip Perdue, makes for a refreshing blend. Bassist Frank Corletta adds the finishing touches, or the icing on the musical cake, as it were.

With a little support from those CNC students who heard the Passions, and a little ear chewing on our part, we will attempt a special weekend show to fit in with the Passions' schedule. Let the people at the Campus Program Board know how you feel.

The States, as usual, performed exceptionally. A few mechanical failures, a little

beer in Steve Chandler's monitor, and what had to have been the record for broken strings, represent the few flaws in the show. But "The Boys" were in rare form. From this reporter's vantage point, the carryings on of the group were audible but not repeatable here. The jumping and dancing around was more enthusiastic, and even the quiet State, Germano, did a little hell raising.

The band performed many new tracks from an as yet unreleased LP. The cut "I've Got An Angel" from their Christmas 45 was done better at the show than on the disc.

The Wallerstein Scholarship is administered by the Virginia Municipal League and the Institute of Government, University of Virginia.

An applicant must be an employee or official of a Virginia municipality who would like to spend a year at the University of Virginia engaged in research and study with the Institute of Government, or a person, preferably an employee or official of a Virginia municipality, seeking to undertake graduate work at the University of Virginia in a field related to municipal government. It is hoped, but not required, that the recipient intends to re-enter Virginia municipal government service upon completion of the graduate work.

All applications must be submitted no later than February 1, 1982. An applicant may be invited to attend a personal interview held either at the Institute or the Virginia Municipal League. For further information, contact the Placement Office.
