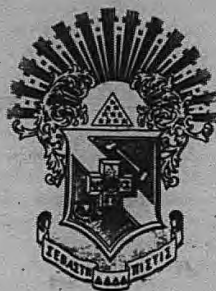
Sigma Pi Fraternity adds Alpha class

On the campus of CNC, there are approximately 4,100 students, among these are 38 that belong to a select group. The organization referred to is the Sigma Pi Fraternity, which went national on April 27, 1980. It was on that day that they became the 138th chapter of Sigma Pi. Their alumni, The Chesapeake Bay Alumni Association, joined the National Sigma Pi Alumni on the same day.

This was the first time in the history of Sigma Pi that this sort of event occurred. The meeting of what was to become the Sigma Pi Fraternity of the United States was held on February 26, 1897 at Vincennes University.

During the first few weeks of the semester, Sigma Pi had three events in which to attain new pledges. The first of these events was a meeting, or rather a party; the second a 3-D movie to which the "rushees" were taken. The third and last event was a dance which featured the band "Kick". A pledge class lasts until November 14, also known as Hell Night. This year there are nine pledges.



While pledging, they must complete several tasks both collectively and individually. They must learn the Greek alphabet as well as the local and national history of the fraternity. Projects related to the school, fraternity, and community are required of the pledge.

Students who join the fraternity gain many personal benefits from the local chapter. One very important thing that they learn is the true feeling of brotherhood. The national chapter helps members in acquiring scholarships. The cost of

being a pledge is \$35 for an initiation fee and \$80 for a pledge fee. All of the fraternity brothers are required to pay their dues, to come to the meetings and to work on different committees. The brothers' major obligation is to support each other.

Sigma Pi was the first social fraternity on the campus to become nationally known. It was also number one last year in national growth with a 54 percent increase. The executives of the fraternity are sage, Jeff Thomas; second council, Dave Cronk; third council, Mike Hogge; fourth council, K. C. Laporte; and first council, Kendall Kellum. The pledge master is Scott McPherson. The fraternity takes pledges each semester.

Being a national chapter also helps members to become eligible for awards given by the Byron R. Lewis Educational Fund of Sigma Pi Fraternity which presents awards in scholarship, service and leadership. The National Sigma Pi Fraternity has approximately 45,000 members which are welcome where ever a Sigma Pi chapter exists.

CNC parking

The parking situation was one of the topics discussed at the Traffic Control Committee meeting on September 15. The committee recommended that temporary parking be made available west of Radcliffe Gym. The conversion of mainly faculty/staff spaces to open spaces and the progress of the commuter board were also discussed.

The 50-60 open spaces will have a white mark painted on them. All students, faculty and staff whose vehicles have the appropriate stickers will be able to use the spaces. These spaces will be in effect as soon as they are approved. Approximately 100 new spaces will be created with the temporary lot and the open spaces.

On October 1, the campus police will be enforcing parking. It is imperative that all students, faculty and staff obtain parking stickers. It will also be beneficial if everyone will park in their assigned space.

The commuter board is in its finishing stages. It should be up by the first of October. This board will help people find rides to and from the campus.

Campus police gain more authority

The campus police are pretty unobtrusive, in fact they are almost invisible, it seems. You might see them driving by your classroom or perhaps in the morning rush to get a parking space you catch a glimpse of an officer in the back of the lot. They are on duty 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. They open and close the buildings and turn the parking lot lights on and off, as well as issuing tickets.

Don't assume that they can't do anything more than issue parking tickets. They can perform an arrest, a search and seizure, or anything else a city police officer can do. If you are arrested, you are taken to Newport News police headquarters, likewise, if you are given a moving violation falling in the boundaries of reckless driving, you are dealt your punishment through the city's traffic court.

According to the head of the campus police, Mr. J. L. Capehart, there have been four parking tickets issued so far this semester.

In the last issue of *The Captain's Log*, there was an editorial on the parking problem. Capehart read it and agrees with it; there is a serious problem. This is why he is somewhat understanding (at least so far) of those who have parked along side the curbs, but there will be a crack down. If you've searched the whole parking lot and couldn't find a space, such an explanation could be accepted once, perhaps twice, but not habitually. However, Capehart says that there is no excuse for parking there at 8 a.m. If you do it, you'll be slapped with a ticket sooner or later. Remember, every ticket doubles the previous fine. That can get rather expensive.

If you wish to add to the CNC police coffers by collecting tickets, you can add quite a lot, very quickly. But, they would rather you just be a safe and courteous driver, and it's less expensive too!

Cable television to come to Christopher Newport

The Tidewater Consortium for Higher Education, an organization consisting of Tidewater colleges and universities, is attempting to establish a cable television channel. At present, Cox Cable has provided such a station for the area of southside Tidewater, which includes Virginia Beach, Chesapeake, Portsmouth, and Norfolk. The colleges which are not involved include Old Dominion, Tidewater Community College, Norfolk State, and the Christian Broadcasting Network University. The channel originates at the Tidewater Community College.

The station in the southside is presented on channel 31 and is called "THE Channel" (Tidewater Higher Education). The channel is on the air for 24 hours and provides only instructional programs.

Future plans provide for the inclusion of sporting events, lectures, concerts, and drama productions.

The instructional programs can actually be used for college credit and may help draw students to the college, according to Frank Edgecombe, head of the media department. Some people may not feel comfortable in the classroom environment initially. These programs are designed to be viewed on television and to help people adjust to college and, then, to eventually attend the college.

CNC is provided with outlets for cable and also has the capacity for 2-way cable so that programs can be broadcast from here. Student support is appreciated but actual student participation with the channel cannot occur until spring, when, hopefully, the program will be initiated.

Regional workshop

Christopher Newport College is hosting this year's regional Counselor Workshop for Eastern Virginia on October 1. This program will bring some 100 guests to the campus, for whom parking spaces will be required. Arrangements have been made to reserve parking spaces that day in the vicinity of the Administrative building and the Library. Since this will probably involve student as well as staff spaces, anyone who may be inconvenienced should understand that this will be for only one day and is in the best interest of the college as a whole.

For the CNC students who are looking for a way to nurture their spiritual needs while attending college, there is an on-campus organization called the Inter-varsity Christian Fellowship.

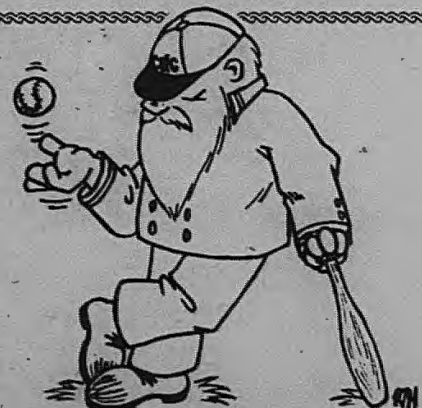

Your scholarly achievements can qualify you for membership in the Virginia Zeta Chapter of Alpha Chi at Christopher Newport College. Alpha Chi is a coeducational society whose purpose is to promote academic excellence and exemplary character among college and university students and to honor those achieving such distinction. Its name is derived from the initial letters of the Greek words *Aletheia* and *Charakter*, meaning *Truth* and *Character*. An honor society as opposed to a recognition society, Alpha Chi predicates its membership upon accomplishment rather than mere interest or participation. A general honor society as contrasted with a specialized one, it admits to membership students from all academic disciplines rather than a single area of study. Members of Alpha Chi are required to be juniors or seniors in the upper 10 percent of their class and to have taken at least 30 hours at CNC.

The chapter at Christopher Newport College was chartered on November 20, 1977. The first meeting of this semester will be held today at noon in the Admiralty Room (Campus Center).

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

Listed below is the Notification Concerning the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, submitted by Robert Netter, Registrar.

The College is to inform enrolled students annually of their rights under the terms of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. The Act does not apply to students admitted to the College who have not officially enrolled.

It is hereby reaffirmed that the College's policies and procedures are in full compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, whereby each student's right to the privacy of his or her official College records and access to the same is assured.

Enrolled students have the following rights under the law:

1. *The right of access to his or her official College records. Under terms of the Act the College is not required to make available to students the following materials:*

a. *Confidential letters of recommendation placed in the student's files before January 1, 1975, and those letters for which student has signed a waiver of his or her right of access.*

b. *Parents' confidential financial statements.*

c. *Medical, psychiatric, or similar records "which are created, maintained, or used only in connection with the provision of treatment to the student and are not available to anyone other than persons providing such treatment; provided, however, that such records can be personally reviewed by a physician or other appropriate professional of the student's choice."*

d. *Personal files and records of members of faculty or administrative personnel, "which are in the sole possession of the maker thereof and which are not accessible or revealed to any person except a substitute."*

Planning and Placement

The Department of State and Commerce and the International Communication Agency are currently recruiting to fill positions in the Foreign Service. Applications for the examination which covers these positions must be received by the Educational Testing Service by October 23, 1981. For further information, contact the Placement Office.

The nationwide filing period for this year's PACE Program is September 14 through October 13. Due to the high volume of competition for Air Traffic Controller positions, OPM is delaying its testing program for PACE Positions. The new testing schedule is January 2, 1982 to February 17, 1982. An amendment to the PACE Announcement will provide this information to interested persons.

The Office of Career Planning and Placement of Christopher Newport College receives microfiche from the New-

port News Virginia Employment Commission.

Mr. Frank Green of the Newport News Virginia Employment Commission staff is responsible for sending the microfiche weekly. The microfiche contains a list of job openings on the Peninsula. Mr. Green States, "By forwarding the microfiche to the Office of Career Planning and Placement, it speeds up the process of placing CNC graduates in jobs here on the Peninsula."

The Agency for International Development (AID) invites postgraduates to apply to its International Development Intern (IDI) Program — an individually tailored, three-year training program, leading to a career as a Foreign Service Officer with AID. The Agency for International Development is now beginning consideration for the Winter 1983 class (interns would enter on duty in January 1983); applicants must submit letters of inquiry and resume no later than February 15, 1982. It came when Sean Gatz connected half-way through the first 45 minutes, tying the score at 1-1. With time running out in the first half, the Captains got a chance to take the lead when Damian Decell was awarded a penalty kick. He didn't miss, and the Captains took the lead, 2-1. The win was insured when freshman Brian Cheatham added the last goal in the second half and CNC had its first win, 3-1.

In the first game against VCU on Sunday, CNC coach Howard Wiseman started his more experienced players. The Captains collected 11 hits off the VCU pitchers, scoring three runs while holding VCU to only eight hits. CNC left baserunners stranded on bases on many occasions.

Islanders, Sigma Pi earn 1st win in Intramural Football

The 1981 Intramural Football season opened with two games Sunday morning at Ferguson High School.

The first game between the Islanders and the No Names turned out to be a real defensive struggle. With the exception of a 60 yard bomb from No Name quarterback Mike Wacławski to receiver Leigh Smith, the offensives provided little excitement.

The only score of the game came in the first half when Islander quarterback Johnny Wallace threw an interception to Richard Gould who ran untouched into the end zone. The attempt at the extra point failed.

Both teams did manage to put together drives that brought them within the opposition's 10 yard line and to what seemed sure scoring opportunities, but each time they left unrewarded. Final score was No Names 6 - Islanders 0.

The second game matched the Over-The-Hill-Gang and Sigma Pi in a game

which over the years has become a contest of bitter rivals.

Although neither offensive could seem to get a track, the defenses provided the fireworks to keep the game interesting. On the third play from scrimmage, OTHG quarterback Dusty Stanoway rifled a pass into the waiting arms of Sigma Pi defensive back David Edgerton, who scampered 20 yards into the end zone for the first score of the game. The extra point was good, so chalk up seven for Sigma Pi.

On their next possession, OTHG managed to march down to the Sigma Pi 10 yard line only to be turned away when Scott McPherson intercepted a Stanoway pass on the five yard line.

The defenses of both teams stiffened in the second half and virtually shut down every offensive play. On a highly contested play, Sigma Pi running back Rich Able ran for a 70 yard touchdown after a penalty flag had mistakenly been dropped on the play. The OTHG defensive then

Since they just started pledging September 16, many of their group activities are still in the planning stages. They want to raise the level of social activities on CNC's campus. They tentatively plan to do this by sponsoring dances and movies.

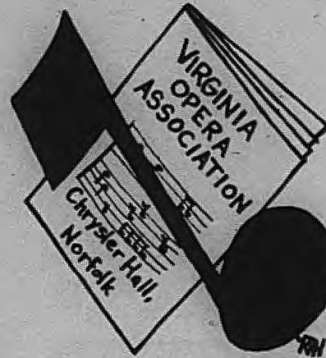
They would also like to see more interaction between clubs, such as more participation in the intramural football games.

Next month the drama department of CNC, under the direction of Dr. Bruno Koch, will present the enchanting musical *You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown*. The play was first performed in New York in 1967, produced by Arthur Whitelaw and Gene Persson. Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

e. Records of the Admissions Office concerning students admitted but not yet enrolled at the College. Letters of recommendation are removed from the Admissions files before the files are forwarded to the Registrar's Office.

2. The right to inspect and review his or her official College records.

3. The right to a response from the College to reasonable requests for explanations and interpretations of his or her official records.

4. The right to an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the accuracy or appropriateness of his or her official records. The hearing procedures are available through the Office of Student Affairs.

5. Christopher Newport College accords all rights under the law to students who are declared independent. No one outside the institution shall have access to nor will the institution disclose any information from students' education records without the written consent of the students except to personnel within the institution, to officials of other institutions in which students seek to enroll, to persons or organizations providing students financial aid, to accrediting agencies carrying out their accreditation function, to persons in compliance with judicial order, and to persons in an emergency in order to protect the health or safety of students or other persons. All these exceptions are permitted under the Act.

Within the Christopher Newport College community, only those members, individually or collectively, acting in the students' educational interest are allowed access to student education records. These members include personnel in the office of Vice President for Student Affairs, counselors, Offices of the Registrar, Business Affairs, Financial Aid, Admissions, and academic personnel with the limitations of their need to know.

The College has designated the following information as "Directory Information" which may be released to the public:

1. Student's name, address, telephone number [permanent and local].
2. Student's birthdate.
3. Dates of Attendance at the College, field of concentration, current classification, degrees awarded.
4. Previous schools attended and degrees awarded.
5. Honors or special recognition.
6. Height and weight of members of athletic teams.

A student who does not want the above information made public must file notice in writing of this request to the Vice President for Student Affairs, 50 Shoe Lane, Newport News, Virginia, no later than the 4th week of classes. This request must be made annually. (It must be pointed out

that if the student requests this information to be confidential it will remain so no matter what the circumstances, i.e., death in the family, fire, or any emergency.)

A student wishing to review his or her College records must consult the directory of official student records in the Vice President for Student Affairs' office. The directory lists the offices where official student records are maintained and the name of the official responsible for the maintenance and release of each type of record, and to whom requests for access should be made.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act is a complex law and new guidelines and interpretations are still forthcoming.

If any of the rights guaranteed are violated, a complaint may be submitted in writing to: FERPA Office, 330 Independence Ave. S.W., Washington, D.C. 20201 explaining the alleged violations.
