Board picks Santoro, W&M's Healy in Interim

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS (CPS)—In a poll of 1,000 Texas, California and Connecticut students, Professor Francis Harrold found that the majority of collegians believe in creationism.

BAYLOR UNIVERSITY (CPS)—President Herbert Reynolds, who during last semester's Welcome Week asserted there was no homosexuality at Baylor, recently told two dorm residents to stop making and selling "Herb Says No Homos" t-shirts to help fund their group ZAQ, which stands for "Zoo against Queers."

OBERLIN COLLEGE (CPS)—Officials recently discovered that one of the men who had loyally cleaned its bathrooms for the last 29 years, custodian John Mason, had escaped from an Alabama prison in 1956.

College President Frederick Starr says he'll ask governors of Alabama and Ohio to consider Mason's three decades of good citizenship, and not seek to return him to finish the robbery sentence.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY (CPS)—University officials banned its marching band from taking the field in two games in November, retaliating against what Athletic Director Andy Geiger called "insulting and lewd" behavior at previous Southern Cal and University of Washington game performances.

Specifically, band members have dropped their pants, urinated on the field and formed four-letter words as part of their scrips this season. Dr. Anthony R. Santoro, President of a Maine college, was named CNC's fourth president in mid-December replacing President John E. Anderson, who tendered his resignation in the spring of last year.

Dr. Santoro is a native of Chicago and holds a Ph.D. in History from Rutgers University, an M.A. from the University of California and an A.B. from the College of the Holy Cross. He is currently president of Saint Joseph's College in Windham, Maine. He will assume the CNC presidency April 1.

"From the first I felt a warm and caring feeling in the people at Christopher Newport College," Dr. Santoro commented from his Maine office. "Their interest in service to the students impressed me and my wife. We look forward with great anticipation to joining the people at CNC in their fine work and in continuing the work which President Anderson has begun."

Dr. Anderson, often the center of controversy for his outspokenness and much-criticized management style, was president since 1980. Dr. Anderson spoke out against Old Dominion Universities' proposed Hampton graduate center and he resisted



staffing cuts proposed by the State Secretary of Education. The state eventually restored nearly two-thirds of the eliminated positions and the college avoided any layoffs.

Following Dr. Anderson's announced resignation, a faculty committee released the results of a college self-study in the Spring which criticized Anderson's "removed" administrative style.

CNC Rector William T. O'Neill praised Dr. Anderson for his efforts to assure the college's reaccreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, which occured in December. "The Board of Visitors deeply appreciates Dr. Anderson's leadership in the accreditation of CNC for the next ten years with virtually no deficiencies," he said.

Dr. George R. Healy, former Provost of The College of William and Mary, will serve as Acting President until Dr. Santoro assumes the presidency on April 1.

Dr. Healy, who served as Acting President of The College of William and Mary during 1985, is currently serving as Acting Editor for Eighteenth Century Life, a scholarly journal published by W&M. He holds a Ph.D. and M.A. from the University of Minnesota and a B.A. from Oberlin College.



You know what else? I've always wanted to try to cash one of those green "non-negotiable vouchers?" Have you?



While the majority of CNC students were living it up during their five week vacation, the men's and women's basketball teams were busy with practice and games.

Having two away games and one home game over break, the Captains game schedule wasn't too heavy, but they were up against some tough competition.

On Dec. 20 the Captains were at William and Mary and lost by a score of 70-55. CNC then hosted Houghton on Jan. 2. Here, the Captains received their only win, 62-51, for the holidays. Finally, the men went to Averett on Jan. 9 and received another loss, 80-71.

The Lade Captains' schedule was a little heavier, with five games to play over break. The ladies won three of these games and lost.

On Dec. 27 and 28 the Lady Captains were at the Salem St. (Mass.) Tournament where they lost to Salem St., 66-57, and defeated Bowdoin, 54-39.

CNC hosted Averett on Jan. 6 and the ladies were victorious by a bouncing score of 105-27. On Jan. 9 the Lady Captains were at Averett and once again were victorious 86-34.

Scott to be in half marathon Event to be hosted by Anheuser-Busch

WILLIAMSBURG, VA—Dave Scott, fivetime winner of the Bud Light Ironman Triathlon World Championship in Hawaii, will promote and participate in the ninth annual Anheuser-Busch Colonial Half Marathon, Sunday, Feb. 22.

Jim Johnson, assistant manager of Employee Relations at the Anheuser-Busch Williamsburg Brewery, said the 13.1-mile course will begin on the College of William and Mary Campus at 1:00 p.m. The course will follow the Colonial Parkway along the James River and return through Williamsburg to William and Mary Hall.

Proceeds from the race go to the College of William and Mary Educational Foundation.

Scott will host a "Carbo-Loading" pre-race pasta dinner for all participants in the marathon at the George Washington Inn on Feb. 21. He will be available throughout the evening to answer questions regarding health, nutrition and marathon training.

Called the "Babe Ruth" of triathlon racing by NEWSWEEK magazine, Scott devastated the Ironman record (8:50:54) by 22 minutes with a time of 8:28:37.5 last October. The Bud Light Ironman Triathlon World Championship, one of the most grueling races for any athlete, consists of a 2.4-mile swim, a 112-mile bike leg and a 26.2-mile run.

In addition to his triathlon accomplishments, Scott is nationally recognized as a racing consultant. He recently published a book, DAVE SCOTT'S TRIATHLON TRAINING, and has authored many articles on fitness for triathlon magazines.
