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Utilization of Equipment and Tools from the Building & Grounds Department

Increasing losses of equipment and tools borrowed from the Buildings and Grounds Department have caused an unjustified expense and delay in accomplishing our mission.

Effective immediately, equipment or tools shall be loaned only if approved by the Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds, Maintenance Supervisor, or Grounds Foreman. Items to be placed on loan shall be documented on a hand receipt and signed for by an authorized repre-

sentative of the borrowing department. The most expedited method shall be used to replace lost items, including charge-back of replacements to the borrowing department.

Certain items may not be loaned, e.g. electric extension cords and power tools.

COMMITTEE INFORMATION & FACULTY BUSINESS

Minutes of the Regular December Meeting of the Christopher Newport College Faculty

This meeting was called to order at 3:05 p.m. on December 9, 1983, in Room 105 of the Administration Building. Dr. Pugh presided.

- I. The minutes of the November 11, 1983 meeting of this body were approved as recorded in the Chronicle issue #36, December 2, 1983 (p.3).

President John Anderson spoke to the assembly on the fate of the proposal for the establishment of graduate level programs at CNC. Although the proposal was turned down by a vote of 8 to 2 at the December 7, 1983 meeting of SCHEV, President Anderson expressed his resolution to continue the quest for eventual acceptance. The President requested the continued support of the faculty in this endeavor.

- II. There was no report from any of the Faculty Committees listed under items A through G in the published agenda.
- III. A. This motion, made by Dr. Paul for the Degrees Committee, was approved.

- B. This motion, as presented and clarified by Dr. Paul for the Degrees Committee, was passed without dissent.
- IV. Dr. Daly, speaking for the Faculty Handbook Committee, announced that written suggestions will be accepted by the Committee through December 23, 1983.
- IV(A) Dr. Sacks made a motion which would request a report from President Anderson on the status of the RIF Committee. After some discussion, Dr. Sacks moved to table his motion; this motion was approved.
- V. This meeting was officially adjourned at 4:00 p.m.

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Curriculum Committee Report

1. The Committee will meet each week this semester on Monday at noon in N214. Anyone with business to bring before the Committee should contact Tim Morgan, Chairman, by noon the Friday preceding the next Monday meeting.

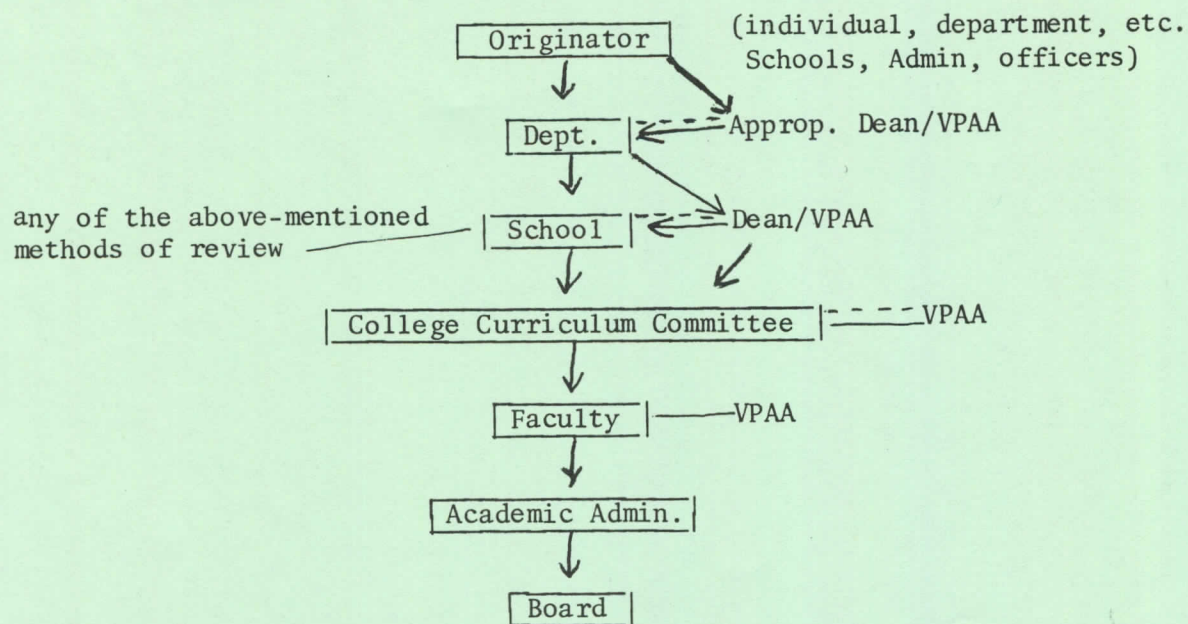
2. The Committee will recommend for Faculty approval at the February meeting the following course:

FNAR 389 (3,0,6). Crafts. Prerequisites: FNAR 218, 219, or junior standing. A course that explores the fundamentals of several basic craft processes and materials. This is a course suitable for teachers or others interested in learning about basic craft techniques. Possible projects include weaving, copper enameling, woodcarving, and simple jewelry making.

3. The Committee has encountered confusion on the part of the Faculty respecting the channels through which curricular matters flow. The Committee decided last fall that the newly created Schools should be substituted for the now-defunct Divisions. The Schools may devise their own system for curricular review, and there are several options each School may choose:

- a. Review by the whole School;
- b. Review by the School's Curriculum Committee;
- c. Review by the School's Department Chairmen.
