

1982-83 CNC Catalogue Correction

In the 1981-82 CNC <u>Catalogue</u> the following sentence appears (p. 37) at the end of the statement governing the natural science distribution requirement for the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees:

A two-semester course in a second field will be required for a B.S. degree (see the specific requirements for the appropriate department).

This sentence was omitted from the corresponding place (p. 37) in the 1982-83 revision of the Catalogue. The omission was the result of a typesetting error. There has been no change in the natural science distribution requirement; the requirement for a two-semester course in a second field for students pursuing a B.S. degree remains in effect.

REMINDER ABOUT BOOK ORDERS

It is time once again for faculty members to begin considering their book requests for the next academic year. The Faculty-Library Coordinators are now meeting to allocate departmental library funds which will be determined by the library materials allocation formula. Book request slips will be distributed in faculty mailboxes on April 16, 1981, and additional request slips may be picked up at any time from the Acquisitions Department of the Library. Department chairmen will be notified of departmental allocations as soon as possible. Book requests should be turned in to the Faculty-Library Coordinators by May 14th. The coordinators will review departmental book requests and turn them in to the Library on May 19th. No spring book orders will be honored after May 19, and departments will forfeit all remaining departmental library funds, above the 10% portion of each allocation which may be retained for the fall book order.

In order to evaluate the usefulness of the book reviews which have been distributed to departments from the <u>Choice-on-Cards</u> service, we ask that you indicate that source on those book request slips which were generated from the Choice reviews.

REQUESTS FOR NEW PERIODICAL SUBSCRIPTIONS

All requests for new periodical subscriptions must be submitted to Faculty-Library Coordinators by department chairmen. Prior to the fall of 1980, the periodicals request policy allowed each faculty member to submit requests directly to his Faculty-Library Coordinator without first having the request reviewed by his department. However, due to the fact that financial constraints limit the number of periodical subscriptions that can be added each year, the procedure was changed to insure that requests reflect the needs of the department as a whole instead of that of individual faculty members only. Requests for new periodical subscriptions may be submitted to the Faculty-Library Coordinators with the Spring Book Orders or may be submitted to the Coordinators early in the fall when they will meet to review requests for new periodicals. Department chairmen are reminded, however, that funds to cover the cost of a new periodical subscription should it be approved must be reserved from the departmental allocation and that requests for new periodical subscriptions should be kept to a minimum.

As always, requests for back issues of periodicals to which the library subscribes do not need the approval of the Coordinators since this is a one-time only purchase, is charged to departmental allocations, and therefore will not involve future expenditure of library funds.
