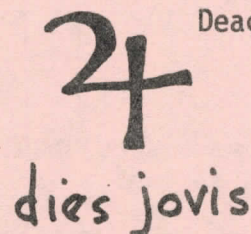

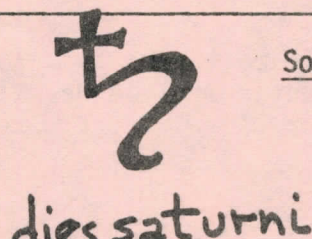

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Notice to Advisers

Please inform your advisees about a new topics course being offered by the English Department this spring.

English 495, "The Theme of Justice," will approach a number of works through their treatment of a single theme. Each work will be seen as a whole, but all will treat the issue of justice as a central concern. The course will ask the questions "Is justice definable?" and "Is justice attainable?" through discussions of such works as Plato's Republic, The Book of Job, Medea, The Knight's Tale, Crime and Punishment, The Trial, and The Ox-Bow Incident, among others. A student need not be an English major to enjoy the course, as technical aspects will not be emphasized.

The course will be taught as a seminar, with a maximum of student participation. The instructor will be Dr. William Wolf.

The English Department also will offer English 209, Advanced Composition, for the spring semester 1977.

Dr. William Wolf will teach the course, which will emphasize strengthening writing skills for college students above the freshman level. It should be especially valuable for students having difficulty with formal writing assignments--essay examinations, summaries, reports, critical papers, and the like. Writing practice and individual attention will make up the main course content, with the major stress on attaining practical competence rather than rhetorical theory.

FACULTY NEWS

DR. BRUNO KOCH, the new Director of Theatre at CNC, attended the Joint Convention of The Virginia Theatre Association and The Virginia Speech and Drama Association on October 14-16 in Richmond. He joined a committee which is to develop suitable criteria for lower-level theatre courses facilitating more readily transfer from one college to another.

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DR. WILLIAM WOLF (English) presented a paper entitled "Anthony Munday as Popular Artist" on October 21 at the Rocky Mountain Modern Language Association meeting in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Dr. Wolf's paper explored the possibilities of examining Munday's life and work as a paradigm of his age, and as a useful background for teaching the "high art" of the Renaissance to 20th century undergraduates. Dr. Wolf also appeared on Harriet Passarelli's Midday program on Wednesday, October 27. Dr. Wolf reviewed E. L. Doctorow's best-selling novel Ragtime.

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MARVIN BROWN served as special assistant to the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction vocational education staff as they hosted the 1976 Southern Region Conference, National Distributive Education Clubs of America, October 20-24th. Thirteen states were represented in the Asheville Conference, held at the Grove Park Inn. Over 500 participants were involved. One of the CNC retailing students, serving as a national officer in the organization, had a significant role in the conference program.

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Family From India Among Those Sworn In as Citizens

Mr. and Mrs. Mohan Mehta and the oldest of their four children, who came to the United States from India nine years ago, were among over 80 people sworn in as citizens in U.S. District Court here recently.

The Mehtas, who reside at 195 Summit street, are from Udaipur, India.

Mr. Mehta received most of his education in India. In this country, he attended Baruch college in New York city and Ohio university. He was an assistant pro-

fessor of business at Fairfield university and is now an assistant professor in accounting and finance at Christopher Newport college in Newport News, Va.

Mrs. Mehta attended adult education classes in Bridgeport to learn English and prepare for citizenship. She presently attends Central high school adult education classes and will graduate in May.

Anita Mehta, 19, who was sworn in as a citizen, is studying for a masters degree at the University of Bridgeport. She received her bachelor's degree at Fairfield university. Her brother, Ashok, 15, is a senior at Central high school and is completing his secondary education in three years instead of four. Another brother, Alok, 13, is a freshman at Central, and the youngest child, Alka, is in the sixth grade at Read school. Ashok, Alka and Alok received first honors in their respective classes this year. Because they are under 18 years of age, they automatically became American citizens through their parents.

GRANTS & FELLOWSHIPS, ETC.

A reminder--the Development Office is located in 160 (rear), Administration Building, and the phone is 7038. I might call attention to a memo from President Windsor, dated September 1, and entitled "Functions of the Development Office in regard to gifts and grants.

Department heads should be aware that, once again, CNC is not eligible to apply for Title VI-A grants for instructional equipment (for two reasons: 1) the government pays only 50% of the cost, and we have no funds to make up the other 50%, and 2) we have a minus budget figure for "maintenance of effort"--this means that our budget for instructional support other than salary is less this year than it was last year. Although our salary total for instruction and library is up by more than \$100,000 all other instructional spending is down by almost \$10,000. In the terms of Title VI-A, then, our maintenance of effort is a minus \$109,000. Them as has, gits! Them as hasn't, is out of luck!)

In the science departments, you might want to look into NSF Instructional Equipment Grants (deadline February 4); however, these grants are definitely for carefully planned projects to improve instruction and not for cases of financial need.

Deadlines:

Dec 1 NSF/Research equipment in environmental biology;

Dec 3 NSF/National Needs Post-doc Fellowships--for those who have received doctorates within past 5 years (not to be confused with National Needs Graduate Traineeships, for which we are not eligible);

Jan 1 HEW/Fellowships--twenty fellows assigned for one year to intern in HEW office.

no deadline NSF/Population biology and physiological ecology--research will be supported in population genetics, plant and animal demography, etc.

NOTE: The NSF equipment grant for environmental biology has limited funds and is expected to be highly competitive, which means that one will be mixing it up with Berkeley, Michigan, MIT, and the like.
