State Vehicles

Cards containing procedures to be followed in the event of an accident have been recently placed in all State-owned vehicles operated by the College. Please make a diligent attempt to follow these procedures in the event you are involved in an accident involving a State owned vehicle. We have also placed an $\frac{ACORD}{all}$ Claim Form (3 copies) in each vehicle. This form should be promptly completed with $\frac{all}{all}$ available data and two copies forwarded to the Nationwide Mutual Insurance Company as soon as possible after an accident. The third copy of the form should be forwarded to the Office of the Vice President for Financial Affairs.

Please also note that it is a requirement for any operator of a State-owned vehicle to possess a <u>valid operator's license</u>. Mrs. Rash will be asking to see your license before issuing keys for fleet car pool vehicles.

Finally, it is college policy for the driver and occupants of any State owned vehicle to fasten seat belts, if available, before any vehicle is placed in motion.
