

Some time in the near future the staff of the James C. Windsor Student Development Center will be conducting a brief written "student attitude survey" of students at Christopher Newport College. The survey will be very similar to the one that was conducted last spring. CNC's Critical Thinking Conference Draws International Speakers

The Center for Critical Thinking at Christopher Newport College will bring Europe's leading authorities in critical thinking to the Peninsula in April, announced the Director, Dr. John Hoaglund.

The Dutch philosophers are part of twenty internationally recognized speakers who will present over 75 lectures, addresses, workshops and videotape presentations during the Conference on Critical Thinking at CNC on April 7-10.

"A major emphasis of the Virginia State Department of Education, for this school year, is integrating thinking skills across the curriculum," said Dr. Hoaglund. "The conference will address the issues, strategies, and the program plans to achieve the necessary goals for practical reasoning, problem solving, and cognitive skills development in American schools."

Drs. Frans vanEemeren and Rob Grootendorst of the Netherlands, Europe's two leading innovators in critical thinking, have recently published four major works and they will discuss their work in the field of argumentative theory.

Dr. Richard Paul of Sonoma State University, Rohnert Park, CA, will demonstrate how lesson plans from kindergarten through Grade 6 can be remodeled to incorporate critical thinking objectives. He has just completed two books on this subject and will present several lectures and workshops.

Dr. Barry Beyer of George Mason University, whose focus is primary and secondary education, will draw material from his two recently published books for presentations on the development of a thinking skills program, including strategies for the teaching of thinking. Dr. Beyer's field includes assessment of student competence in thinking skills.

The internationally known philosopher, Dr. Matthew Lipman, whose books are translated into more than twenty languages, will share his reflections on what critical thinking means to education and the curriculum today. The creator of the Philosophy for Children's programs, Dr. Beyer's field includes assessment of student competence in thinking skills.

"The recent surge of interest in critical thinking has spurred other leaders to revise and update their ideas to improve education through thinking skills," explained CNC's Hoaglund. "Dr. Ralph Johnson, a pioneering developer of informal logic, will present a new development in logic techniques.

The format of the conference encourages the personal interaction of those attending with the program presenters.

There will be lectures with questions from the audience, workshops, video-tapes of critical thinking classroom techniques, and panel discussions. Coffee breaks, and the conference reception and dinner will offer many opportunities for informal interaction between the experts and participants.
