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Biomedical Ethics Dialogue

The Peninsula Area Chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews has developed a series of programs designed to help our community come to grips with a number of critical issues in Biomedical Ethics. The first program is at Christopher Newport College on Thursday, Oct. 18, at 7:30 P.M. in A-105. Its title is "Genetics, Pregnancy and Abortion: The Ethical Issues." Featured speakers are Dr. Stanton Hoegerman, a professor of genetics at William & Mary, and Dr. Margaret Smith, a local physician specializing in Rheumatology. The response panel comprises Dr. F. W. 'Ted' Gray, a retired physician, the Rev. J. W. Johnson, pastor of Mt. Nebo Baptist Church in Surry, and Ms. Janet I. Farquharson, an associate with the firm of Patten, Wornam, and Watkins. There will be an opportunity for those attending to direct questions to the speakers and panel.

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ROTC Scholarship Funds

This semester over \$40,000 dollars of ROTC scholarship funds were awarded to CNC students. These scholarships were won through national competition, or by attending ROTC Basic Camp at Fort Knox, Kentucky. The three-year scholarships were won by Jo Ann Poole and James Parker and will provide these students with all tuition fees, book allowance, and a tax-free subsistence allowance. Three out of four CNC Basic Camp attendees won two-year Advance ROTC program scholarships. The one exception was not eligible for a scholarship. Currently eleven (11) out of sixty (60) full-time CNC ROTC students have two- and three-year scholarships.

Please advise your students it is now time to apply for three-year scholarships. They must pass standard Army medical exams and have a minimum of 27 credit hours including Spring Term SY 84-85. Candidates for scholarships should have as minimum GPA of 2.3-2.4 for high-tech disciplines for two and three-year scholarships, with SAT scores of 1100 or ACT of 24; 2.9 for a non-high-tech discipline for a three-year scholarship; and 2.7 for a non-high-tech discipline for a two-year scholarship. COMMITTEE INFORMATION & FACULTY BUSINESS

Approved Curriculum Committee Meeting Minutes - October 1, 1984

Present: Sanderlin, Olson, Hunter, Mathews, Davidson, King, Royall, Powell, Barbour

1. Minutes of the 9/17/84 meeting were approved with correction (Item 3C changed from "passed" to "discussed").
2. Minutes of the 9/24/84 meeting were approved as submitted.
3. A request from the School of Business & Economics to change course names and prerequisites for several courses was accepted by the Committee and is herein acknowledged.
4. Dr. Durel reported to the committee that the Nursing Program has received a positive recommendation from SCHEV Staff and will be presented on Oct. 3rd with action delayed until the November meeting.
5. Curriculum Debate
 - A. On a motion by Mathews (second Davidson) the committee unanimously approved the following motion:
All students must show verbal skills proficiency as a requirement for graduation. Students should achieve and demonstrate such proficiency as early as possible in their courses of study. All students must pass a Verbal Skills Proficiency Examination to be developed by the School of Letters & Natural Sciences. This exam must be completed at the end of English 102 or 104 (as part of the Final Exam) or, for transfer students, before the 84th hour or upon admission after the 84th hour. English 102 or 104 should be completed as early as possible and MUST be completed before the 84th hour.
 - B. The committee unanimously passed the following motion by Olson (second Hunter):
Placement in Math 105 or above is determined by a satisfactory score on a REQUIRED Math placement test or successful completion of Math 100.
 - C. By a vote of 8 to 1 the committee passed the following motion by Royall (second Park):
A student must complete two Math courses or Math 140 only, from the following courses: Math 105, Math 110, Math 125, Math 130, Math 135, Math 140.
6. After considerable discussion regarding math proficiency exams, and with a charge to Dean Powell to collect information on the subject, the committee adjourned at 4:59 pm.
