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Fulbright Program with the German Democratic Republic - 1987-1988 & 1988-1989

Contingent upon successful completion of negotiations to establish a new program of Fulbright exchanges with the German Democratic Republic, awards will be offered in 1987-88 and 1988-89 for research and university lecturing in the GDR. CIES participates with USIA in administering the Fulbright Scholar Awards in research and university lecturing abroad.

Of the six awards offered for each academic year, three are for lecturing in any field and three are for research in any field. The academic year in the GDR is September through June. Major universities of the GDR are located in Berlin, Leipzig, Rostock, Gera, Jena, Dresden, and Greisswald. Housing may be difficult for large families. School for dependent children is available only in German.

Research Awards. Three awards for research in any field for three to ten months. Knowledge of German is required. (Award Code #8621)

Lectureships. Three awards for either or both semesters.

Any Field. Lecture in any field. Areas of particular interest include American Studies, U.S. history, economics, architecture and city planning, sociology, environmental studies, and art history. Applications in other fields are also welcome. Although the application of candidates with an ability to lecture in German is especially encouraged, lecturing in English may also be possible in some cases. Either or both semesters of the academic year. (Award Code #8622)

American Literature. Lecture in American literature. Lectures may be given in English. Either or both semesters of the academic year. (Award Code #8623)

Benefits:

\$1,200 to \$1,300 per month (in U.S. dollars) for researchers and \$1,700 to \$1,800 per month (in U.S. dollars) for lecturers, plus initial allowance of approximately \$4,100 to \$6,150 to cover such items as international travel, excess baggage, settling in, books and services, based on number of dependents and grant category. In addition, host university provides housing for grantee and dependents at no cost, plus stipend in local currency. Tuition reimbursement for accompanying K-12 children to \$12,000 for grants of nine months and over, or \$8,000 for shorter grants.

Eligibility:

- *United States citizenship at time of application
- *For lecturing, usually postdoctoral college or university teaching experience at the level and in the field of the lectureship sought
- *For research, a doctorate at the time of application, or comparable professional qualifications
- *Persons who have lived abroad for the full ten-year period immediately preceding the time of application are ineligible
