## Beyond the Dream Teleconference

On February 1, 1989, the Minority Student Association, the Student Government Association and the Division of Student Affairs will sponsor a national teleconference as a part of National Black History Month. The teleconference will be in room A-105 (Anderson Auditorium) from 1:00 P.M. to 3:00 P.M.

This interactive teleconference, entitled "Beyond the Dream," will bring together distinguished experts on the contributions of Blacks to this country with audiences at colleges and universities, military installations, secondary schools, national associations and federal and state agencies. The two hour program is divided into six segments:

- 1. Education---speakers include Mary Hatwood Futrell, President of the National Education Association; Judith Eaton, President of the Community College of Philadelphia and Board Chair of the American Council on Education; and Donald M. Stewart, President of the College Board.
- 2. Politics---speakers include Representative Cardiss Collins (D-Illinois); The Honorable Cleo Fields, State Senator in Louisiana; and Yvonne Brathwaite Burke, former Congresswoman (D-California).

- 3. Business and Economics---speakers include Joshua Smith, CEO and Chairman of Maxima, Inc.; Dorothy Brunson, CEO of Brunson Broadcasting; and Sybil Mobley, Dean of the School of Business and Commerce at Florida A&M University.
- 4. Social Issues---speakers include Marian Wright Edelman, President of the Children's Defense Fund; Dorothy Gilliam, Columnist for "The Washington Post"; and Asa Hilliard, Professor and Lecturer of Ancient Egyptian History.
- 5. Military---speakers include General Bernard Randolph, America's only Black active duty four-star general; Mae Jemison, America's first Black female astronaut; and Colonel Charles Bolden, USMC and a NASA astronaut.
- 6. Arts, Entertainment and Sports---Take 6, a contemporary Jazz/Gospel group, and The Winans, a contemporary Pop/Gospel group.

Other speakers include: John Hope Franklin, prominent scholar, author and pioneer historian; Derek Bok, President of Harvard University; and Ernest L. Boyer, President of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

### Student Activities Report - Fall 1988

During the Fall 1988 semester, 21 student organizations sponsored 72 activities with an average attendance of 156 people per event.

The Campus Activities Board (CAB) sponsored the most activities (9) with an average attendance of 147 people per event.

The top 3 events, in terms of open attendance:

375 CAB New Student Dance
344 Sigma Tau Gamma Rush Dance

27 Students organizations held a total of 267 meetings. The Karate Club sponsored the most meetings (31), while the median number of meetings per organization was 13 and the mode 2.

#### Activity Breakdown

- 2 Organizations reported sponsoring 2 philanthropic projects. Alpha Kappa Psi sponsored a blood drive, and Sigma Tau Gamma's Casiono Night supported the food bank.
- 10 Organizations sponsored 16 activities which focused on membership recruitment with an average attendance of 138 people per event.
- 8 Organizations had 11 fund raisers. The most common type of fund raiser activity was a bake sale.
- 2 Organizations sponsored entertainment events (Children's Series, concerts, a puppet show, comedian, and fall fest) with an average attendance of 99 people per event.
- 10 Organizations sponsored 22 social events with an average attendance of 173 people per event. The most common type of social function was a dance.

- 4 Organizations sponsored 5 activities involving a guest speaker with an average of 15 people per event.
- 2 Organizations sponsored 6 miscellaneous event; Voter Registration, Silk Screen Workshop, Mat Cutting Workshop, Trip to washington D.C., Alcohol Awareness week, TIPS Workshops.
