### Change in Christmas Holiday Leave

Traditionally, Governors have authorized State Government office to be closed for one-half day on Christmas Eve, December 24. This practice was taken into consideration for the holiday schedule previously published in a memorandum dated August 15, 1980.

This year Governor Dalton has authorized offices to be closed all day on Friday, December 26, 1980 and Friday, January 2, 1981 instead of one-half day on December 24. Since December 25, 26, 29, 30, 31, and January 1 are already authorized holidays for classified employees, the two additional days the Governor has authorized will be observed on Wednesday, December 24, 1980 and Friday, January 2, 1981.

The College will close at 5:00 P.M. on December 23, and remain closed until 8:00 A.M. on January 5, 1981. All days are authorized holidays and annual leave is not charged. Necessary services shall, of course, be maintained and all employees required to work on these days are eligible for compensatory leave.

### Admissions Office Report

Slightly more than one-half of the students who enter CNC each year have attended at least one other college or university. Almost 10% hold bachelor's degrees from other institutions. COMMITTEE REPORTSFaculty Advisory Committee

Summary Report of the FAC Liaison Members meeting with the Board of Visitors November 13, 1980.

1. Academic Affairs Committee: Dr. Marshall Booker, Liaison
    - a) Student Association representatives reported on two major issues:
      1. concern over book pricing policies at College Bookstore
      2. concern over discrepancies between uniform faculty evaluation form recommended by the ad hoc committee and the form being presented to the Board for adoption
    - b) Vice President Edwards filed and commented on a comprehensive report on student enrollment, rated and actual faculty totals. Reported further on status of new and proposed degree program.
  2. Student Affairs Committee: Dr. William Winter, Liaison
    - a) Vice President for Student Affairs reported on the following:
      1. The developing relationship between the College and local clergy.
      2. The development of a Greek Council at the College
      3. The adoption of the crow as the official college bird.
      4. The progress of the CNC Baseball Club.
    - b) Student Association representatives reported on the following:
      1. book pricing (see above)
      2. uniform faculty evaluation form (see above) commenting on their objection that new questions could lead to ranking of the faculty and that several of the questions are not specific.
    - c) Mrs. Haskins, Manager of the College Bookstore reported on the pricing policies of the Bookstore and on some of the problems causing price increases. A major problem is the cost of freight on returned books which is made necessary by a lack of storage space on campus.
  3. Committee on Development and College Relations: Dr. Elizabeth Daly, Liaison
    - a) Report of the Public Relations Officer on two fall press conferences, the publicity campaign for the Presidential Inauguration, and involvement of the PR Office in Campus Activities.
    - b) Report by Dr. Hines concerning community service activities of the Music Department.
    - c) Announcement of Mr. Barry Wood's imminent appointment as Director of Development.
    - d) Discussion by Mr. Godfrey Smith, life insurance underwriter, concerning effective means and rationale for soliciting contributions to the College.
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
