Funds for Special Olympics needed

CNC Police Department has been asked to coordinate Special Olympics fundraising for the college. CNC is a community within a larger community, and the Special Olympics are an opportunity for the CNC family to show the larger community its cohesiveness.

Monetary pledges are being requested. Special plaques and certificates of acknowledgement and in recognition of donations will be awarded at opening ceremonies following the annual Torch Run in June.

The Torch Run, endorsed by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the Virginia Association of

Chiefs of Police, will take place on June 6 and 7. Law enforcement officers from southeast Virginia will pass the Special Olympics torch in a relay which will culminate at the opening ceremonies in Richmond. Law enforcement officers from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and foreign countries will be participating in runs throughout 1991.

Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded for contributions of \$1000, \$500 and \$250, respectively. A certificate will be given for \$100 contributions, and donations of \$25 to \$75 will be recognized by a college certificate.

CNC Police Department is asking

for individual or group donations from departments, clubs and organizations. Special Olympics water bottles and Tshirts are also for sale to assist the tax-deductible, charitable organization.

Special Olympics International is the world's largest sports program for children and adults with mental retardation. Founded in 1968 by Eunice Kennedy Shriver, Special Olympics offers year-round training and competition in 22 official sports to more than one million special athletes ages eight and up, in more than 20,000 communities in the U.S. and 50 other countries.

Volunteerism not dead at CNC

Money is not the reason, so why do nine CNC students volunteer at the Virginia Living Museum?

"I think it was not only to educate me in expanding my biology field, it also helps me to teach others about the environment," says biology major and CNC sophomore La Daugn Nettleton. Nettleton has volunteered for nine months at the museum. "I interpret exhibits. Right now I interpret the geology and James River exhibit," says Nettleton.

Nettleton finds no problem fitting eight hours per week of volunteer work into her schedule. The museum "understands college schedules."

Sophomore John Vaughn, a volunteer for seven months, says, "For one thing, I wanted to work on my communication skills with the public, and I am a biology major." Vaughn works at the touch tank which deals with how life survives. He informs guests about the environment and gets "a lot of good questions" from visitors. Vaughn feels it's especially important to teach the school groups that visit the museum.

Junior Donald Watt, a criminology major, says, "I had an interest in the museum and enjoy working with the

public." He started volunteering as a freshman after seeing the "volunteers needed" sign. Watt works at the discovery center, a question and answer center. He also works outside on the trails and does animal shows. "I have a black rat snake. I do shows with it," says Watt. He will also work at the dinosaur exhibit scheduled to appear June 1 through Labor Day at Newmarket Fair mall.

"I thought, for one thing, it would give me experience talking with other people and also, I love animals," says Senior Rebecca Coats, a business administration major with a concentration in management. Coats, a volunteer since February, especially likes the animals. She walks around outside and talks to people, and tries to help guests enjoy their visit.

"It's tranquil and puts my mind at ease, " says Coats. "It's a great experience. I love it."

Senior Susan Murdock, a secondary education major with a biology con-

Silence Betrayed

This is a very hard subject to write about. A lot of people find "it" very embarrassing to talk about. It's a subject that many people believe doesn't exist...but it is society's most disturbing, pervasive, yet misunderstood problem! It's child sexual abuse!

Before you close your eyes and say this doesn't involve you, please grant me 15 more seconds of your time and then decide if you want to read the rest of this. Most of you are not even married and you have no children, but I dare say most of you are an older brother or sister, an uncle or aunt, or have some contact with young children. If you fall in one of these categories then you can't turn away from this painful subject until an estimated 39,000 children under the age o 6 are no longer sexually abused in this country each year.

I am going to talk to you about preventing this ugly problem.

How can we prevent a problem that we find so embarrassing, so hard to believe that it is really happening? Some experts feel that if we can just teach our children to say "no" to adults who want sex, then the problem will be solved.

While trying to get the message across, several professionals have produced numerous materials, such as storybooks, movies, videotapes, television programs, even coloring books and comic books.

Their goal seems to be three important issues:

- Children need to be told that a child's body is the child's property.
- That a child can say "no" to an abusive adult.
- 3. That a child who is abused





CNC's sports highlights for the 1990-91 season

The biggest crowds in school history, the most successful year ever for men's basketball, and the national publicity generated by Lamont Strothers' efforts to reach the National Basketball Association (NBA) highlighted the 1990-91 athletic year at Christopher Nexport.

In the Fall, volleyball and cross country took the spotlight. An inexperienced volleyball team finished third in the Dixie Conference with some gritty conference victories, and placed two players on the first team All-Dixie Conference squad. Linda Machie and Jennifer Martin became the first pair of CNC players to win the honor in the same year.

Meanwhile cross country runner G.W. Dameron was off to an outstanding season. He became just the fourth male runner in CNC history to qualify for the Division III National Championships after one of the best seasons a CNC runner has ever had.

It was a down year in soccer for CNC, with the Captains recording a 6-10-3 record. But Coach Craig Rey-

nolds had a very young squad that hopefully will rebound next year.

But basketball was the story of 1990-91. Both the men's and women's teams had the greatest seasons in school history, including some outstanding individual accomplishments.

The men's team finished the season 24-5, setting many school records, and reaching the NCAA Division III National Tournament for the fifth time in the last six years. Not only did the team play in the NCAA Tournament, but it had a chance to host a game for the first time ever, and scored an 81-71 win over Emory & Henry before the largest crowd in Ratcliffe Gym history. The game was sold out more than 24 hours before tip-off. That win earned the Captains a spot in the Final 16 of the tournament, CNC's furthest advance ever. CNC also became the first team in the 28-year history of the Dixie Conference to go unbeaten in conference play.

Senior Lamont Strothers completed one of the greatest careers in Division III history, being named Player of the Year by Basketball Times Magazine, and first team All-America by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He finished as the third leading scorer in Division III history, with 2,709 points, and scored in double figures in 116 consecutive games, the most in NCAA history at any level.

The Lady Captains had a recordbreaking season as well. Their 20-7 record was the best in school history, and they, too, swept through the Dixie Conference regular season unbeaten. However, Greensboro College caught CNC on a flat night and won the Dixie tournament title.

Freshman Karen Barefoot had a sensational rookie season. She led the nation in assists in Division III and was also named to the All-Virginia Division II-III second team, and the All-Dixie Conference first team.

The indoor women's track team had another great season, finishing third at the Division III championship. Sandy Shelton won the national title in the long jump, and earned All-America honors in the 400 meters and with the 1600 meter relay team. In addition, Jennifer Martin was All-America at 55 meters, Barbara Robb in the 400 and Toni Bass in the triple jump. Shelton, Martin, Robb, and Candress Mitchell were on the 1600

meter relay team.

Ed Milling won All-America recognition again in his specialty, the 55-meters, while Anthony Mungin placed fifth in the same event.

In baseball, the Captains ran off a record, 12-game winning streak before settling in with a 19-16 record heading into the last week of the season.

The Lady Captain's softball team had another fine year with a 24-15 record. Jennifer Fields and Mary Carpenter each were voted to the Dixie Conference first team. CNC tied with Methodist for the regular season Dixie championship.

Veteran Mike Gibson won the Dixie No. 6 singles championship for the men's tennis team, while Holden Knight and Rush Cole took the No. 1 doubles crown.

The women's tennis team barely missed a .500 season with a 7-8 record, while the nationally-ranked golf team retained hopes of an NCAA bid. Jeff Holler and David Donovan played their way onto the All-Dixie Conference team, while Holler tied for medal honors.

Congratulations to all teams!

SPORTS BRIEFS

Baseball: The Captains scored an exciting extra-inning win over Salisbury St., but then lost a three-game Dixie Conference series to a tough N. C. Wesleyan squad. After surrendering four ninth-inning runs to Salisbury to tie the game 6-6, CNC strung together four hits in the tenth to take a 10-6 victory. Jasen Simpson led the way with three hits and two RBIs. However, the Captains were overpowered by the N.C. Wesleyan Bishops who are nationally ranked among Division III teams. The Bishops assaulted the Captains with 33 hits over the three-game series. Simpson again led the Captains with four hits over the three games, while Tab Pabst gave a strong pitching performance in the last game pitching five innings and allowing only three hits, despite getting the loss.

Softball: The Lady Captains faced a series of tough games in their final week, and wound up second in the Dixie Conference Tournament. The week began with a 3-1 loss to crosstown rival Hampton, and continued with a split of 3-2 games with powerful Elmira. In the conference tournament, CNC ousted Ferrum in an opening series shortened to one game by poor weather. Jennifer

Fields' homer in the bottom of the seventh put CNC into the finals opposite Methodist with a 5-4 win. But the Lady Captains came up short, dropping 9-2 and 4-1 decisions to the Lady Monarchs. Fields, pitcher Mary Carpenter, and outfielder Kristi Milby were all named to the first team All-Dixie Conference team, and were joined on the second team by outfielders Jennifer Bryant and Christy Byard and first baseman Kim Cason.

Women's Tennis: All three doubles teams were victorious in a 6-3 win over Randolph-Macon. In the Dixie tournament, CNC reached the finals in three flights but lost all matches to Methodist, the eventual champions. Stephanie Seward dropped a 3-6, 6-0, 3-6 decision at No. 2 singles, and combined with Amy Lawrence for a tough, 4-6, 6-4, 2-6 loss at No. 1 doubles. Amy Mayes and Lisa Lunde also reached the finals at No. 2 doubles before losing, 2-6, and 1-6.

Men's Tennis: The Captains won two championships, and lost in the finals of two other flights, finishing second to Methodist in the Dixie Conference championship. No. 6 Mike Gibson, who joined the team after the

season began, scored a 6-4, 4-6, 6-3 win to capture CNC's only singles crown, and the No. 1 doubles team of Holden Knight and Rush Cole took their flight, 7-5, 3-6, 6-4. CNC's two other doubles teams also reached the finals before bowing. Gibson and Fred Hunter lost at No. 2, 4-6, 6-4, 6-7, and Robert Dowen and George Davis dropped a 7-6, 2-6, 2-6 decision at No. 3 doubles.

Golf: David Donovan and Jeff Holler each earned All-Conference honors as CNC finished third at the Dixie Conference Tournament. Donovan had a pair of 79s, and Holler an 84 and a 74 in recording 158s, good for a tie for fourth place. CNC shot 643 to finish third behind Methodist, 623, and Greensboro, 626.

Track: The Captains produced some good performances at the Liberty Invitational. G.W. Dameron won the 10,000 meters in 32:02, and Jerome Valree took the 800 meters in 1:53.7. On the women's side, Lisa Molineaux won the shot put with a toss of 38-4, Candress Mitchell took the long jump at 16-7, as well as the triple jump at 33-4. Cynthia Bryant qualified for the

Division III nationals in the 100 meter hurdles, with a time of 14.7, finishing second.

Note: To All Cyclists: The College Bicycle Club needs your help convincing Samuel Skinner, secretary of transportation, to help us help the environment. Our cycling presence needs to be called to national attention. The Department of Transportation in 1948 had a goal of an interstate highway system. Log editor looks back on year's ups and downs

It's that time of year once again—the time when the newspaper shuts down production in preparation for next year.

During the past year, *The Captain's Log* has pleased and upset some individuals. One of the most divided issues which centered around us concerned the article published Jan. 24. Our opinions editor, Peggy Bernhardt, peeved some people on campus this year. One student who responded to our survey on the newspaper wrote: "Drop Peggy Bernhardt! (Her) naivete is nauseating, her ingnorance (sic), obscene." Peggy created a small controversy on campus, which was only paralleled by myself.

Continued from Page 1 must immediately tell someone who will do something about it.

Some of these materials are lacking in the ability to get the message across to our children.

One of the biggest selling children's books on sexual abuse is Never Talk to Strangers published by the Golden books. It is even approved by Dr. Spock (a well-known baby doctor) because it tells its message in a "non-

threatening" way, it does not use the humans as the strangers or abusersit uses animals, such as a rhinoceros wearing a tutu. The book tells the children "If you are hanging from a trapeze, and up sneaks a camel with bony knees, remember this rule if you please, Never talk to strangers!" Now is that reality? How many children do you know who are afraid of camels with bony knees? The children think these stories are funny and don't relate sex abuse with the story. I agree with the children.

Another big selling book is It's O.K.

to Say No! The short-coming of this book is that it mostly warns children about bad guys who hang around restrooms, video arcades, and bowling alleys. There are very few remarks warning children about neighbors, teachers, babysitters, and relatives. The National Center on Child Abuse and Neglect reports that 75-80 percent of the abusers were known by the children before the abuse. The familiar images of perverts, molesters, and dirty old men are not accurate portraits of the majority of persons responsible for the sexual abuse of

children. The National Center goes on to report that 30-80 percent of the abusers are indeed family members. The book It's O.K. to Say No!, fails to tell the children what it is o.k. to say no to. This is where our embarrassment comes in. We are so use to referring to sex as "it" that we expect our children to know what "it" is.

We are telling our children that we want to talk to them about "it", that if they have any question about "it" I want you to ask me about "it", that it's not o.k. if someone does it to them, and if "it" happens to them we want them to know that it is not their fault, but what "it" means is so bad we can't even say the word!!

Many programs tell our children "don't let people touch you." What about when the abuser wants the child to rub them, or kiss them, or touch them? Do we warn our children about these matters? Most programs teach our children about bad guys who might "hurt" them, but most pedophiles don't use force or violence. They can sexually abuse our children without physically harming them. What about the psychological harm?


Another shortcoming of some prevention programs is that there is so much stress placed on not talking to strangers, not taking candy from strangers, and not getting in the car of a stranger that the message ends there. Children are told that only doctors and parents should touch their private parts. We are so embarrassed as adults, that we can't even say the real words - penis and vagina! The real problem is the vast number of cases, where the abuser is their father or mother or uncle or aunt. Another problem faced by professionals is people who say, "but we are a good, clean family; it would never happen to us." Over half of the reported cases are from middle to upper middle class families.

To date, most of the prevention programs are more effective in getting abused children to come forward to seek help. Children who are being abused recognize what the speaker is talking about. They finally see that they are not alone. They have someone who will believe them and support them. If these programs encourage one victim to come forward and report the abuse and receive the help that they so desperately need, then shouldn't that be reason enough to keep these programs and to start new programs?

We must not refuse to think about child sexual abuse, even though it sickens and frightens us. Because if we do we may not see it when it happens to our own children. Or even yours....
